RE: Dry Adhesive Copolyamide Pellets Duty Suspension

Dear Ms. Copperthite:

Attached is the Arizona Chemical rebuttal of the Arkema proposal, HR 4688, sponsored by Representative Jim Gerlach (Republican) of Pennsylvania.

- Arizona Chemical is a domestic producer of polyamide (3908.90.7000 Polyamides in primary forms: Other: Other), which competes with equivalent imported materials on small margin diffrences. Though Arizona Chemical uses proprietary CAS numbers, our domestic products directly compete against the materials listed in this proposed bill. Accordingly, we object to a continued duty suspension for polyamides under 9902-40-63 of the Harmonized Tariff Schedule of the United States. The duty suspension will likely serve to increase trade imbalances.
- Arizona Chemical produces over 10,000 metric tons of polyamides domestically, primarily
 utilizing US biomass materials. As a producer of bio-based chemicals which does not receive
 bio-energy subsidies, we believe that additional assistance to our competitors is not
 warranted.
- We also believe that without the duty suspension in place, the US would receive revenue in excess of \$500,000 annually. Passage of HR 4688, therefore, would result in a loss to the US of more than \$1.5 million in duties over the life of the proposed suspension. Information from the PIERS database was used to make this estimate.
- There is no known benefit to Arizona Chemical if the duty suspension is granted. To the contrary, we believe that it would damage Arizona Chemical, who manufactures competitive polyamide in Dover, Ohio.
- Arizona Chemical has no formal affiliation with Arkema, though we sell materials to them domestically and in Europe.

A BILL

To extend the temporary suspension of duty on dry adhesive copolyamide pellets.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. DRY ADHESIVE COPOLYAMIDE PELLETS.
- 4 (a) In General.—Heading 9902.40.63 of the Har-
- 5 monized Tariff Schedule of the United States (relating to
- 6 piperazine co-polymerized copolyamide resin high tempera-
- 7 ture melt adhesive pellets) is amended by striking the date
- 8 in the effective period column and inserting "12/31/2015".
- 9 (b) Effective Date.—The amendment made by
- 10 subsection (a) applies to goods entered, or withdrawn from

- 1 warehouse for consumption, on or after the 15th day after
- 2 the date of the enactment of this Act.

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
