III. Other product information, including uses/applications and source(s) of imports

The subject products are specialty micro-porous, ultrafine, spherical polyamide powders of modified nylon-6, nylon-12, and nylon-6,12 copolymer. These nylon powders are used in niche market areas of the cosmetics industry as a carrier of pigments and as an absorbent of oils on the skin, and also to provide a "soft-to-the-touch" feel in cosmetics and other personal care markets. The products are also used in industrial coatings, paints, and varnishes in niche market areas to increase abrasion resistance, texturing, and gloss control in UV-cured coatings. These products are imported principally from Germany.
