III. Other product information, including uses/applications and source(s) of imports

The subject product is a synthetic organic chemical raw material used to make certain herbicides, which are used on canola, cereals, corn, certain cotton varieties, tree nut and vine crops, and potatoes. It is imported from Germany.

In addition to extending the temporary duty reduction, this bill would also change the rate of duty of the Chapter 99 provision from 1.7 percent to 2.8 percent.

1	Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

4	(a) In General.—Heading 9902.10.79 of the Har-

7	(1) by striking " 1.7% " and inserting " 2.8% ";
