#### II. Suggested article description(s) for enactment (including appropriate HTS subheading(s)):

2-Hydroxypropylmethyl cellulose containing a hydroxypropyl content of 7–17 percent by weight and a methoxyl content of 28–30 percent by weight per ASTM D–2363 (CAS No. 9004–65–3) (provided for in subheading 3912.39.00)

#### III. Other product information, including uses/applications and source(s) of imports

The product is a cellulose ether polymer in white powder form which swells in water, producing clear to opalescent, viscous, colloidal solutions. This polymer is known generically as hydroxypropyl methylcellulose in the industry. It is used as an excipient (inactive ingredient) in drug formulations and as a protective surface coating for tableted drugs, or as a sustained release (time release) agent in certain drugs. The product is also used in food products as a thickening agent, stabilizer, and emulsifier, and as a binder in colored pencil lead and other items. Germany, Japan, and Belgium are major sources.
