#### II. Suggested article description(s) for enactment (including appropriate HTS subheading(s)):

Synthetic filament yarn (other than sewing thread) not put up for retail sale, single, of decitex sizes of 23 to 850, with from 4 through 68 filaments, untwisted, of nylon or other polyamides, containing 10 percent or more by weight of nylon 12 (provided for in subheading 5402.45.90)

(If enacted, the tariff relief provided for in this bill would be available to any entity that imports the product that is covered by the bill.)

#### III. Other product information, including uses/applications and source(s) of imports

The subject yarn is used as a "separation" yarn that is woven into certain knitted fabrics during production at specified points. These filament yarns melt at high temperatures, destroying them when the fabric is treated with water vapor at 95 degrees C. or higher and separating the knitted fabric into panels of the desired lengths. This filament yarn is also used as a fusible bonding yarn, to bind edges and selvedges of fabric. Imports are primarily from Switzerland.
