III. Other product information, including uses/applications and source(s) of imports

The subject products are prepared artichokes. Although artichokes are grown in California, such artichokes are sold to the fresh market and are not used to produce preserved or prepared artichokes. Artichokes and artichoke hearts of this tariff line are more commonly used to cook with than the "marinated" artichokes of tariff line 2001.90.25. They are commonly used in dips, spreads, as pizza toppings, in pasta dishes, or served with sauce or butter. Peru is the primary source of imports, followed by Spain, Egypt, Chile, Italy, and Ecuador.



3 (b) EFFECTIVE DATE.—The amendment made by
4 subsection (a) applies to goods entered, or withdrawn from
5 warehouse for consumption, on or after the 15th day after
6 the date of the enactment of this Act.
