II. Suggested article description(s) for enactment (including appropriate HTS subheading(s)):

Ground fault circuit interrupter (GFCI) receptacles designed to prevent insertion of foreign objects, each with internal shutters and clearly marked with "TR" (tamper resistant), certified by the importer as meeting the 2008 National Electric Code Section 406.11 for 15 ampere or 20 ampere receptacles (provided for in subheading 8536.30.80)

(If enacted, the tariff relief provided for in this bill would be available to any entity that imports the product that is covered by the bill.)

III. Other product information, including uses/applications and source(s) of imports

The subject products are in-wall electrical outlets that have built-in tamper-resistant GFCI devices. A GFCI is a safety device used to reduce or prevent shocks to the user of grounded electrical cords or devices by interrupting the electrical current loading based on the normal level of electrical current drawn by the equipment. If the value of the ground current exceeds the predetermined value, the GFCI will automatically turn off the electrical current to the device to prevent electrical shock. GFCIs are most commonly used in areas where there is water. The subject power outlets are commonly used in various residential applications—namely, for swimming pool equipment and lighting; in kitchens, bathrooms, or wet bars; and in workshops or garages. The principal U.S. import sources of GFCIs are China and Mexico. Dutiable U.S. imports of all products classified in subheading 8536.30.80 (a broader group than is covered by this bill) totaled \$342 million in 2011.
