3 SECTION 1. CERTAIN FOOTWEAR WITH OUTER SOLES AND
4 UPPERS OF RUBBER OR PLASTICS, COV5 ERING THE ANKLE, OTHER THAN WORK
6 FOOTWEAR.

7 (a) IN GENERAL.—Subchapter II of chapter 99 of
8 the Harmonized Tariff Schedule of the United States is
9 amended by inserting in numerical sequence the following
