### II. Suggested article description(s) for enactment (including appropriate HTS subheading(s)):

Warp knit open-work fabrics of synthetic fibers, unbleached or bleached, other than fabrics of headings 6001 to 6004 (provided for in subheading 6005.31.00)

### III. Other product information, including uses/applications and source(s) of imports

The subject products are warp knit open-work fabrics in which synthetic fibers predominate by weight. They may be used in a variety of applications, including fasteners for disposable baby diapers (the use of the interested entity), anti-hail netting used to cover crops, and reinforcing scrim used in the production of sails. The largest supplier of the subject fabric is Israel, imports of which enter duty-free under the U.S.-Israel Free Trade Agreement. The next largest supplying countries are Portugal, China, and Korea. Opposition to this bill is noted in the Contacts table below.

Our positions on Batch 6 are as follows;

- H.R. 5300-5302 (These are not on the Ways and Means list and appear to be duplicates for 5491-5493.) No position.
- H.R. 5379 (Reusable grocery bags) AMTAC objects. Unifi produces recycled yarns for this end use.
- H.R. 5459 (Non-woven fiberglass sheets) AMTAC has no position. Note there is no HTS code given in the bill making it difficult to fully vet.
- H.R. 5485 (Narrow woven fabrics) AMTAC objects. Unifi makes yarn for this product. 

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

**3** SECTION 1. CERTAIN WARP KNIT OPEN-WORK FABRICS.

4 (a) IN GENERAL.—Subchapter II of chapter 99 of
5 the Harmonized Tariff Schedule of the United States is
6 amended by inserting in numerical sequence the following
7 new heading:

(b) EFFECTIVE DATE.—The amendment made by
 subsection (a) applies to articles entered, or withdrawn
