

### West Point Band History

West Point Band Mission: To provide world-class music to educate, train, and inspire the Corps of Cadets and to serve as ambassadors of the United States Military Academy to the local, national, and international communities.

The West Point Band, the U.S. Army's oldest active band and the oldest unit at the United States Military Academy, traces its roots to the Revolutionary War. At that time, fifers and drummers were stationed with companies of minutemen on Constitution Island, across the river from West Point. In 1778, General Samuel Holden Parsons' 1st Connecticut Brigade crossed the Hudson River and established West Point as a permanent military post. After the American Revolution, Congress disbanded most of the Continental Army, but "the 55 men at West Point," members of the 2nd Continental Artillery, remained. Among their ranks stood at least one drummer and one fifer, who alone maintained the tradition of military music at West Point.

With the establishment of the United States Military Academy in 1802 came an increased demand for military music. As the academy grew, it needed fifers, drummers and buglers to drill the new cadets and provide an audible order to their duty day. In 1817 the ensemble was named the "West Point Band," and by this time was performing on a full range of instruments, which included two bassoons, two Royal Kent bugles, a tenor bugle, ten clarinets, three French horns, a serpent (an early bass horn), cymbals, a bass drum, eight flutes, and two trumpets.

Today's band consists of four components: the Concert Band, the Jazz Knights, the Hellcats, and Support Staff. They combine to form the Marching Band. The organization fulfills all of the official musical requirements of the Academy, including military and patriotic ceremonies, public concerts, sporting events, and radio and television broadcasts, as well as social activities for the Corps of Cadets and the West Point community.

As the senior premier musical representative of the United States Army, the band has appeared at many historical events. It performed at the dedication of the Erie Canal; at the Chicago and New York World's Fairs; and for the funerals of Ulysses S. Grant and Franklin D. Roosevelt as well as the inaugurations of numerous presidents. Additionally, the West Point Band has collaborated with some of the finest musical ensembles in the country, including the New York Philharmonic and the Boston Pops. Members of the West Point Band have also been showcased in Carnegie Hall and featured on The Today Show, 60 Minutes, Dateline NBC as well as on documentaries occurring on The History and Discovery Channels.

Comprised of graduates from America's finest music schools, the musicians of the West Point Band continue to present provocative performances while providing the Corps of Cadets with a piece of living history.

### NASA Featured Guests



Soloist, researcher and pedagogue Claude Delangle stands out as the master of the French saxophone. Privileged interpreter for classic works, he enriches the repertoire and encourages creation by collaborating with the most renowned composers, including L. Berio, P. Boulez, Toru Takemitsu, A. Piazzolla, and by promoting the youngest. Since 1986, he is the invited

saxophonist in the Ensemble Intercontemporain; he also appears as soloist with the most prestigious orchestras (London BBC, Radio France, Radio of Finland, WDR Köln, Berlin Philharmonic, Kioi Tokyo) and works with D. Robertson, P. Eötvös, K. Nagano, E.P. Salonen, Miung Wung Chung, G. Bernstein, and many other conductors.

Delangle has also been invited to important festivals such as the Zagreb Bienniale, Présences of Radio France and the Musica Nova Festival. The Festival Musica of Strasbourg invited him recently to offer the world premiere of the programme "Tango Futur," interpreted afterwards at the Festival Aix en Musique and at the Theatre of the Palais Royal in Paris.

Passionate for his instrument, he goes beyond the work of the soloist and frequents the Musical Acoustic Laboratories of the University of Paris 7. The results of his research on specific acoustics of the saxophone will be a precious asset in his collaboration with composers.

His recordings for <u>BIS</u>, Deutsche Grammophon, Harmonia Mundi, Erato, and Verany expose French music while revealing new musical horizons from the repertoire created by the brilliant Adolphe Sax, to avantgarde works and the popular repertoire.

After obtaining several outstanding *Premiers Prix* at the Conservatoire National Supérieur de Musique of Paris, Claude Delangle was appointed professor in 1988, where he has created the most prestigious saxophone class in the world. Pupils of all nationalities long to receive this education, which combines concerts with the possibility of studying with important composers, and offers a large range of interdisciplinary activities. In Europe, North America, South America, Australia, and Asia, Claude Delangle is requested for interpretation courses.

He is currently in charge of a collection at Henri-Lemoine-Paris publications, where he works for the publishing of new repertoire and for the republishing of classic works, as well as pedagogical works.



Saxophonist, composer and author Walt Weiskopf began his New York career performing with the Buddy Rich Big Band in 1981 at the age of 21. Since then, he has made an impressive mark as both a leader and sideman with 12 critically-acclaimed CDs and countless sideman credits, including performing and recording with Frank Sinatra, Steely Dan, Donald Fagen, and Steve Smith's Jazz Legacy. A dynamic player with enormous technical prowess, Walt is equally well-regarded as a composer and his CDs contain predominantly original work. His five books on advanced topics in improvisation are among the most respected in the field. Walt was a visiting Associate Professor at the Eastman

School of Music from 2001 to 2008. He is currently teaching part-time at Temple University in Philadelphia.

In 1983, Walt began a fourteen-year association with jazz pianist and arranger Toshiko Akiyoshi, making seven recordings and touring the United States, Japan, and Europe several times with her orchestra. During this time, he began recording his own material.

Whether for quartet, nonet, or any configuration in between, Walt's compositions and arrangements have attracted fans and critical notice. Simplicity, (Criss Cross Jazz - 1993), Walt's first CD as a leader, met with immediate success. It was number one on Eurojazz radio for four straight weeks and caused Mel Martin of Saxophone Journal to write: "Walt Weiskopf's prime influence as a player appears to be John Coltrane, but he is no slavish imitator. He ... gets to musical matters in a powerful and positive way, asserting a definite viewpoint ... He displays much technical accomplishment, yet makes it sound basic and accessible."

Walt's Song for My Mother (Criss Cross Jazz - 1994) was awarded four stars in Downbeat. Bret Primack of Jazz Central Station listed Song for My Mother as one of the ten best jazz albums of 1997 and Crusader magazine chose this recording as its number one Jazz Pick of the Year.

Pianist Bill Cunliffe, winner of the International Thelonious Monk competition, said simply, "Walt Weiskopf is one of the great composers of modern jazz" (L.A. Jazz Scene, 1997); Zan Stewart called him "a consummate saxophonist, composer and arranger" (Downbeat, 2003). Chris Hovan proclaimed Walt to be "easily one of the most mature and fully individualistic saxophonists and composers to come along in the last 10 years" (All About Jazz, 2002).

Walt has received multiple performance grants from the National Endowment for the Arts. He also was awarded funding for the creation and recording of his 2004 sextet recording *Sight to Sound* from the Doris Duke Charitable Foundation and Chamber Music America. This suite of ten movements was inspired by the work of visual artists Dali, Picasso, Van Gogh, Miro, and others.

### West Point Band Command Staff



In July of 2010, Lt. Col. Jim Keene assumed command as the 23rd Leader of the United States Military Academy Band, West Point, New York, where the band has been in continuous residence since 1817. A Native of Albuquerque, New Mexico, Lt. Col. Keene previously served as Commandant of the Army School of Music at Norfolk, Virginia. Lt. Col. Keene's military service has also included duties at The United States Army Band "Pershing's Own," Washington, DC.; the U.S. Army Europe Band and Chorus, Heidelberg, Germany; and the Army Ground Forces Band, Atlanta, Georgia.

As music director of The U.S. Army Strings and the U.S. Army Chorus in Washington, DC., Lt. Col. Keene arranged and produced performances for international military and civilian leaders, dignitaries, and heads of state. He led The U.S. Army Chorus in performances at the interments of former Presidents Ronald Reagan in Simi Valley, California, and Gerald R. Ford in Grand Rapids, Michigan. In the Army, he has conducted the Dallas Wind Symphony and the Cincinnati Pops orchestra. Other

highlights include performances for six U.S. presidents and music planning for the 1996 Summer Olympic Games in Atlanta, the dedication of the National WWII Memorial, the one year anniversary of 9/11, the "Kennedy Center Honors," "Spirit of America," and the Memorial Day "Times of Remembrance."

Prior to joining the Army, Lt. Col. Keene served as assistant conductor of the Southern Methodist University (SMU) Symphony and was orchestra conductor on staff of the SMU International Conservatory Summer Festival in Taos, New Mexico. A multifaceted musician, Lt. Col. Keene worked as a violinist, pianist, and music director of the Albuquerque Civic Light Opera. He has worked as an audition accompanist at the Eastman School of Music, the Juilliard School, and at the Manhattan School of Music, Lt. Col. Keene holds a Bachelor of Music in Piano Performance from the University of New Mexico and a Master of Music with highest honors in Orchestral Conducting from the Meadows School of the Arts at Southern Methodist University, Dallas, Texas.



Captain Dae Kim is currently Deputy
Commander and Associate Conductor
of the United States Military Academy
Band, West Point, New York. A native of
Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, Capt. Kim is a
graduate of Temple University, from which
he holds Bachelor and Master of Arts in
Music degrees, having studied conducting with Luis Biava, Arthur Chodoroff, and
Timothy Oliver. While at Temple University,
Capt. Kim was conductor of the Col Legno
Chamber Winds, as well as associate conductor of the Wind Ensemble and Concert
Band.

An accomplished clarinetist, Capt. Kim has performed under many noted conductors, including Christoph Eschenbach, Wolfgang Sawallisch, and Leonard Slatkin. Solo and festival appearances include the Academy of Music, Aspen Music Festival, and the National Orchestral Institute. His principal teachers were Samuel Caviezel and Ronald Reuben.

Capt. Kim's military training includes the Officer Candidate School, Fort Benning,

Georgia, where he was a Distinguished Military Graduate; Basic Officer Leader Course, Fort Sill, Oklahoma; and the Army Band Officer Course, Little Creek, Virginia. His most recent assignment was as Executive Officer of the Army Ground Forces Band, Fort McPherson, Georgia. While stationed there, Capt. Kim also served as director of the Wind Orchestra at Georgia State University.



Chief Warrant Officer David Downer joined the staff of the United States Military Academy Band in December of 2010 as Associate Bandmaster and Officer-In-Charge of the Jazz Knights. Originally from Hope Mills, North Carolina, Mr. Downer enlisted in the United States Army in 1997 as a piano player. He has served as a pianist, saxophonist, conductor, and arranger in a variety of assignments to include Fort Gordon, Georgia; Camp Zama, Japan; and the Continental Army Band at Fort Monroe, Virginia.

In 2004, Mr. Downer was selected for training as a Warrant Officer Bandmaster and attended Warrant Officer Candidate School at Fort Rucker, Alabama and the Army Warrant Officer Bandmaster course at the Army School of Music in Norfolk, Virginia. As a Warrant Officer, Mr. Downer has served as the commander of the I Corps Band at Fort Lewis, Washington, the Fires Center of Excellence Band at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, and the 2nd Infantry Division Band located in Uijeongbu, Korea.

Mr. Downer holds a Bachelor of Music Education degree from Lee University. His military awards include the Meritorious Service Medal with Oak Leaf Cluster, the Army Commendation Medal with two Oak Leaf Clusters, the Army Achievement Medal with Oak Leaf Cluster, and the Global War on Terrorism Service Medal.



#### Command Sergeant Major Cal

Christensen was appointed to the position of Band Command Sergeant Major in June of 2007. Originally from Browns Valley, Minnesota, he attended the band instrument repair course at Red Wing Vocational Institute in Red Wing, Minnesota in 1979. At the conclusion of his training in 1980, he was employed by Cassinat's Music in Riverton, Wyoming as their repair technician.

Command Sergeant Major Christensen joined the West Point Band in 1988 as a repair technician. He has held many additional duties including Reception Day NCOIC for Thayer Hall Inprocessing and Facilities Manager. In 2005, he became the Support Staff group leader and was assigned to the additional duty position of Logistics & Resource Management Division Sergeant Major in 2006.

Command Sergeant Major Christensen's awards include the Meritorious Service Medal, the Army Commendation Medal with two Oak Leaf Clusters and the Army Achievement Medal with five Oak Leaf Clusters.

## The West Point Saxophone Quartet



The West Point Saxophone Quartet is comprised of members of the West Point Concert Band saxophone section. In addition to maintaining an active schedule of school and community performances, the West Point Saxophone Quartet regularly appears at national and regional conferences of note, as performers and clinicians.

The West Point Saxophone Quartet has appeared in a number of high profile and significant venues, including major universities throughout the country. Performances have included collaborations with the UNCG Wind Ensemble, the Long Island Symphonic Winds, and the Virginia Wind Symphony. The quartet has also appeared

as featured performers on the prestigious Barge Music Series.

Well-versed in historically significant saxophone quartet repertoire, the group focuses on a repertoire of modern music. Recently, the West Point Saxophone Quartet has presented the music of monumental twentieth-century composers, performing lannis Xenakis' XAS at the 2007 Midwest Clinic and Gyorgy Ligeti's Six Bagatelles at the 2008 NASA Biennial Conference at the University of South Carolina.

In 2002, the West Point Saxophone Quartet released its first compact disc, Fault Lines. This recording features standard saxophone quartet repertoire as well as premiere recordings of compositions by Perry Goldstein, David Kechley, and David Froom as well as original arrangements by Mark Vinci and Joseph Abramo. The West Point Saxophone Quartet followed this compact disc with the premiere recording of Perry Goldstein's Abundant Air: Concerto for Saxophone Quartet and Band on the West Point Band's 2005 compact disc Should This Be Found.

Hailed as a "young saxophone virtuoso," Staff Sgt. Stacy Wilson is a saxophonist with the West Point Concert Band and soprano saxophonist with the West Point Saxophone Quartet in New York. Prior to her appointment, she served as an Associate Instructor of Saxophone at Indiana University's Jacobs School of Music from 2003-2008. A recipient of Indiana University's highest performance award, the Performer's Certificate, Stacy has garnered top prizes in many national and international competitions including the prestigious Gaudeamus International Interpreter's Competition in Amsterdam, William Byrd International Competition, MTNA Young Artist Competition, Indianapolis Matinee Musicale Competition, NASA Young Artist Competition, IU Woodwind Competition, and she was a semi-finalist in the Jean-Marie Londeix International Saxophone Competition in Thailand. She is the soprano saxophonist with the award-winning Zzyzx Quartet which won 2nd Prize in the inaugural NASA Quartet Competition in 2008. ZQ's debut CD, Zzyzx Road, was released in 2010 featuring premiere recordings by Piet Swerts, Erik Norman, and John Leszczynski as well as works by Ida Gotkovsky and Thierry Escaich. Stacy's debut solo CD, L'Incandescence will be available in 2011. www.stacy-wilson.com

Master Sqt. Wayne Tice is the principal saxophonist, section leader and a frequent soloist with the West Point Band. Since joining the band in 1995, he has performed extensively at home and abroad. In October 2004, Master Sgt. Tice traveled to Beijing to become the first saxophone soloist to perform with the People's Liberation Army Band, the only state-level professional military band in the Chinese Republic. Other international performances featuring Tice as a soloist include the 2003 World Association of Symphonic Bands and Ensembles conference in Jonkoping, Sweden and the 12th World Saxophone Congress in Montreal at which he performed the world premiere of David Kechley's award-winning Restless Birds Before the Dark Moon.

The most recent concerto premiere came in 2010, when he performed Evan Chambers' new work, *This is Not the Blues*, and repeated that concerto at the 2010 Biennial North American Saxophone Alliance (NASA) national conference. As the soprano saxophonist with the West Point

Saxophone Quartet, Tice premiered Perry Goldstein's Abundant Air. This saxophone concerto was dedicated to the West Point Saxophone Quartet and performed at the 2004 Biennial NASA conference. Master Sgt. Tice can be heard performing soprano and alto saxophones on the compact disc Fault Lines with the West Point Saxophone Quartet and also on his debut solo CD, Wayne Tice Plays the Music of Yusef Lateef.

Sgt. 1st Class Brian Broelmann has been a member of the West Point Band since 2001. He holds degrees in music education and performance from the Crane School of Music at SUNY Potsdam, where he studied with Dr. Timothy McAllister. Sgt. 1st Class Broelmann has appeared both as a soloist and in chamber settings at numerous professional conferences throughout the country. Recent projects include performing with New York City cabaret sensation Jenna Esposito, appearing on her CDs 13 Men and Me! and Jenna Esposito Sings Connie Francis. In addition to his duties as saxophonist, Sgt. 1st Class Broelmann frequently performs with the Concert Band on plucked strings, including guitar, banjo and mandolin. He is also the saxophonist with the West Point Band's Quintette 7, appearing on their debut CD Quintette 7 Plays the Music of Raymond Scott.

Sgt. 1st Class Christopher Rettie is a native of Hopkinsville, Kentucky. He received a Doctor of Musical Arts from Louisiana State University in saxophone performance with a minor in wind conducting. Additionally, he holds a master's degree from LSU and a bachelor's degree from Murray State University, both in saxophone performance. His primary teachers and mentors include Griffin Campbell, Frank Wickes, Scott Erickson, and Dennis Johnson. Chris has been a member of the West Point Saxophone Quartet since his arrival to the band in 2001 and is also a co-founder of the award-winning Red Stick Saxophone Quartet. As both a soloist and a chamber musician, he has performed in recitals and concerts and given masterclasses throughout the country. His performances of world and American premieres include works by Paul Hayden, Jacob Ter Veldhuis, Perry Goldstein, Stephen David Beck, and Dinos Constantinides. Additionally, Chris has been a featured performer with the West Point Band, University of North Carolina-Greensboro Wind Ensemble, Long Island Symphonic Winds, Virginia Wind Symphony, Louisiana Sinfonietta, Louisiana State University Wind Ensemble, Louisiana State University Orchestra, and the Murray State University Wind Ensemble. His recordings can be heard on the West Point, Louisiana State University, New Tertian, and Caliente labels.

Chris' other musical interests include conducting chamber ensembles from the West Point Band in repertoire from the harmoniemusik era to the present day. In addition, he is the instructor of saxophone, clarinet, and woodwind ensemble at Marist College in Poughkeepsie, New York.

### Performer Biographies

**Ed Bingham** is Professor of Saxophone and Director of Jazz Studies at Marshall University where he directs the Marshall University Jazz Ensemble and is a founding member of Marshall's faculty jazz ensemble, Bluetrane.

They have received recognition as semi-finalists in the world's most prestigious saxophone competitions including the Adolphe Sax International Competition, the Jean-Marie Londeix International Competition and the Aeolus International Competition.
