Designed for anyone who prepares or reviews program planning and budgets, this course will give you the insight to apply Comptroller General Decisions to organizational activities in your agency and library. Using lectures and classroom exercises, the course reviews the legal framework for agency fiscal operations and discusses

- o the legality of proposed actions
- o the propriety of administrative decisions
- o use of annual, multi-year and no-year appropriations
