sustain and preserve a universal collection of law for future generations. The library is composed of three sections: the Legal Research Directorate, the Library Services Directorate and the Global Legal Information Network (GLIN). The Research Directorate, with its multilingual staff of foreign law specialists, provides original, independent legal analysis, reports and publications on issues and developments in foreign and comparative law. The Library Services Directorate, with its highly-trained specialists, provide access to and assistance using legal information in print, electronic and other formats in response to requests made by phone, e-mail, fax and in person. GLIN, a unique public resource for laws, regulations, judicial decisions and other legal material from around the world, is available as a searchable, full-text online database. The Law Library of Congress currently maintains over 2.65 million volumes.
