
Rules for Medicare Plan Sales Agents

Medicare plans can start marketing for **Open Enrollment** on October 1. Protect yourself by knowing the rules about what Medicare plan sales agents can do. Sales agents CAN'T:



- Come to your home uninvited
- Approach you in parking lots, hallways or lobbies
- Offer you a gift worth more than \$15 to join their plan
- Provide meals at sales presentations
- Try to sell you a plan at educational events

Tax Benefits for Caregivers

If you provide care and financial support for an older adult, you may be eligible for certain tax breaks or other financial help. You may want to look into:

- Multiple Support Declaration
- Deductions for qualifying relatives
- Deductions for medical expenses
- Dependent Care Credit for paid caregivers
- Payments (in some states) for caregiving work
- Public benefits available in your state
