PERSONAL AND CONFIDENTIAL

Reference is made to Bureau letter of October 12, 1951, requesting to be advised as to the reason for the low voluntary overtime performed by Mr. FELT during October, November and December 1950, and requesting that a special performance rating report be submitted on him. Former SAC J. B. WILCOX submitted these under date of October 16, 1951.

Reference is made to SAC Letter #110, 11/13/51, advising as to my responsibility for initiating action recommending personnel for Grade 13 who have completed one year of continuous full-time supervisory assignment. Mr. FELT is in this classification.

The reason for this communication is to advise the Bureau that in reviewing the personnel files of the many people of this office, that of Mr. FELT was included. I am very much impressed not only with the systems that Mr. FELT has worked out in connection with the handling of the very irritating, sudden and high-volume changes in the applicant cases, but also with the high morale that he has developed and maintained among the members of that squad, as well as among the clerical personnel who necessarily are pushed and harassed by the sudden and unexpected volume of work necessary to the smooth handling of the applicant cases. Mr. FELT is doing to my mind an entirely satisfactory job in every respect as an applicant supervisor, and I feel that his suggestions, interest and whole-hearted loyalty make him a much better than average supervisor.

Mr. FELT to me is the career type of employee who follows in the best traditions of the Bureau, and I feel that the Bureau should be heavily influenced by his very excellent attitude in connection with its consideration of this employee for Grade GS-13, which is heartily recommended by me.

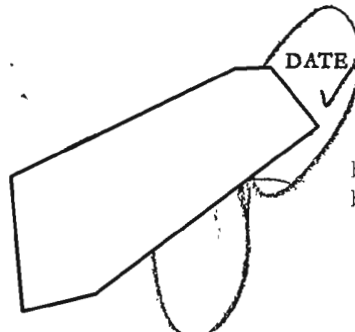

PERSONNEL ADVANCEMENT

Re SAC Letter No. 121, Series 1951, dated 12-20-51.

As the Bureau is aware, it is somewhat difficult for me, with the short space of time I have been in Seattle, to prepare a proper full letter in connection with this matter. However, I find I am personally acquainted with some of the more promising agents of the office and I have reviewed the previous selections emanating from Seattle in our letters of September 6, 1950, and April 23, 1951, headed "PERSONNEL—ADVANCEMENT" and "SPECIAL AGENT PERSONNEL—ADVANCEMENT" respectively, and I feel that the Bureau should have additional comments concerning the Special Agents involved than those furnished, as follows:

SA W. MARK FELT

SA FELT is presently functioning as the full time applicant supervisor of this office. I consider this as a very important position, particularly due to the unusual relationship which this office has with the Atomic Energy installation at Richland, and which will become increasingly important due to the increased volume therefrom in the near future because of a projected establishment of at least several more reactors. Mr. FELT has studied the particular problems in connection with the applicant volume here to a point where a system has been set up by him which is now very advantageously being utilized for greater efficiency in the handling of this classification.

Mr. FELT is very industrious, utilizes good intelligence and apparently handles his supervisory duties with a minimum amount of supervision being necessary and I am greatly impressed with him.

The Bureau will remember that Mr. FELT has had previous supervisory service at the Bureau headquarters and I feel that his present utilization is an excellent intermediate step to further develop him for additional responsibilities at some time in the future, but not at the present as I believe that it will take some little time for him to fully explore the possibilities of the handling of the Atomic Energy work in his present assignment, which is one of the most important things of this office.

In an effort to function well in this regard, Mr. FELT has toured the Atomic Energy installation at Richland, developed good personal contacts in connection with the officials there to a point where the relationship is developing nicely for our benefit.

Re: Personnel Advancement

There has been instituted in the office in an effort by him to properly handle the large volume, which has gotten to the point of closing one thousand cases a month at some times, a system of green-slipping for resident agent dictation, which permits the dictation to be specially routed for quick handling at the headquarters city, and an informal previous deadline limit to that set by the Bureau in an effort to better distribute the load for the stenographic pool by previous preparation for unusual volume. Accordingly I feel that FELT has good potentialities in every respect for further advancement but do not believe that such additional development requires more Bureau supervisory service, i.e., it is felt that with some additional seasoning as supervisor of the applicant work here, he will be qualified for direct ASAC assignment within several years.

SA CHARLES H. DE FORD

Mr. DeFORD was listed on the previous communications from this office and while I have known this agent for some time and have great respect for, and confidence in, his abilities, I do not feel that he should be considered at the present time for additional advancement. Mr. DeFORD is completely and thoroughly grounded in Bureau policies and experience, and had considerable Bureau supervisory service at headquarters, the results of which reflect daily in his handling.

Mr. DeFORD is the supervisor of the security work of this office and we are at the present time in the process of revamping this desk because of the large scale work and problems contained thereon. I personally feel, as does Mr. DeFORD, that there is considerable room for additional and more expeditious handling in connection with the security desk of this office. We are presently starting a new liaison arrangement with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police at Vancouver and Victoria, B.C. as to their internal security problems, and we find there is currently a considerable amount of relationship and good which can come of this liaison as it develops. There are several areas in the state handled under this division, which to my mind are susceptible of additional work in connection with internal security as to Communist Party activities generally. While the coverage that this office has through its headquarters is apparently excellent, I feel there is still room for additional work as we can get more personnel to function on this assignment. It appears to me that the security work of this division which is being handled by Mr. DeFORD should be considered as a major supervisory assignment by the Bureau due to the importance of the area and the amount of hard core communist matters contained therein, and I feel that Mr. DeFORD's present assignment will season him considerably, permit his additional development and should not be subject to change at this phase of handling.

In this regard I might comment for the Bureau that Mr. DeFORD has at the present time developed an extensive scalp eczema, which I am informed is the result of nerves and tension due to the concentration and long hours which this Special Agent has given to his assignment. Because of this condition I do not feel that the Bureau would be well advised to change Mr. DeFORD into additional responsibilities until this condition is ameliorated. Mr. DeFORD is handling this condition as a personal matter and it will shortly be corrected.

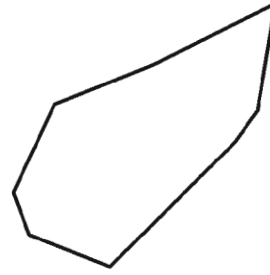



Enclosed is Form CC-270 reflecting the results of this Agent's physical examination, including a four lead electro-cardiograph at the Naval Air Station, Seattle, Washington.

Also enclosed is a detailed Cardiac Evaluation for this Agent, which was conducted at the Naval Hospital Heart Station, Bremerton, Washington.

I arranged for the detailed Cardiac Evaluation because of the preliminary diagnosis at the Naval Air Station of Anguina Pectoris type pain. As will be noted, the Cardiac Evaluation appears to exclude the possibility of cardiac involvement. The heart specialist at Bremerton comments that he sees no reason to restrict this Agent's physical activity.

SA FELT has consulted his personal physician concerning this situation at various times during the past year. An electro-cardiograph one year ago was normal, as were other routine tests. FELT's personal physician also feels that there is no cardiac involvement and attributes the symptoms to neuritis or to some disturbance in the cervical region of the spine, causing pressure on the nerve which would result in symptoms approximating those evidenced, both of which conditions would be aggravated by nervous tension.

Inasmuch as all phases of this examination and specialized tests are completely normal, I contemplate no further immediate action in the matter. I will, however, arrange for a re-check physical examination for Agent FELT at the end of one year, or sooner if indicated, and will promptly advise the Bureau of any further developments.

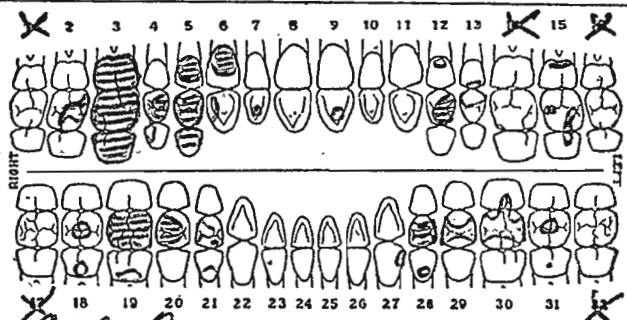

Cardiac Evaluation

This 38 year old investigator of the F.B.I. was referred here for cardiac examination and evaluation.

Complete physical examination as well as clinical history revealed no evidence of past or present heart disease. Because of his history of recurrent periodic attacks of left upper chest pain and associated distress in his left arm, a more complete laboratory study was done. The nature of the precordial and arm distress this man experiences is not typical of Angina Pectoris or coronary pain. There is no relation to physical exertion, however, a very definite relationship has been noted with motion or movement of his arm in specific positions. He has noted an increased frequency and severity of his pain during or right after periods of nervous tension. There has never occurred an episode of excruciating pain requiring a hypo for relief, nor has this pain ever awakened him from his sleep or caused him to perspire profusely or become nauseated or vomit because of severity. He has not taken any medication for relief of this distress. This man is able to ascend with impunity the hills and streets in downtown Seattle and experiences no pain or aggravation of existing distress during such efforts. He doesn't become unduly short of breath following such exertion nor has he ever had other objective evidences of cardiac decompensation.

A complete electrocardiogram including standard, augmented extremity, and unipolar precordial leads was completely normal. A Ballistocardiogram was normal. An exercise tolerance test (Master 2-Step Test) was performed Double the required number of ascents for a man of this age and weight (The successful completion of a normal double Master Test is believed to exclude coronary artery disease) without subjective symptoms and without significant changes in the electrocardiogram. A Blood Cholesterol was 209 mgm% (Normal).

Impression: I do not believe this man has significant coronary artery disease nor Angina Pectoris and I can see no indication of necessity for restriction of his physical activity.

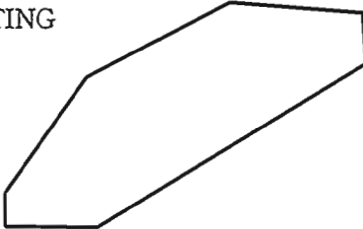

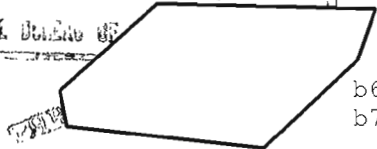



It is understood and agreed that the sum tendered herewith is a voluntary, gratuitous contribution to said fund which I understand is to be administered in the following manner. MacMAHON, who advised me that the biopsy disclosed the cause of FELT's difficulty to be a fat pad in the abdominal area which had become twisted in such a manner as to cut off its blood supply. The pad was removed during the course of the operation.

Dr. MacMAHON assured me that SA FELT will suffer absolutely no ill effects and that after his period of convalescence his condition will be completely normal.

I spoke to Mr. Felt during his attendance at the Two-day Supervisors' Conference at the Seat of Government and Mr. Felt indicated he was very much interested in advancing in the Bureau's service. At the time of the interview Mr. Felt had a pencil in his outside coat pocket and I suggested to him that as a matter of appearance he not carry his pencil on the outside of his coat. During the years a practice has grown up in many Bureau Field Offices of referring to individuals who furnished unsolicited information, either by telephone or personally at the field office, as "complainants". Interviews with these individuals are referred to as "complaints"; the interviews are handled in "complaint rooms"; the information is recorded on a "complaint form" and the Agent assigned to this type of duty is referred to as the "complaint agent".

Many responsible citizens voluntarily furnish information to the various field offices and while we refer to this practice as "complaints" I am sure that the bulk of these individuals do not regard their calls as complaints in any sense of the word and they might be somewhat hurt if allowed to feel that the Bureau so regarded their activity along this line. In other words, I feel that it is unfortunate for these individuals to overhear in the office any reference to their visit as a complaint or to see notations being made on a form headed or referred to as a "complaint form".

Because we have so long used these expressions within the office, I am wondering if there is not a tendency to inadvertently use these terms in front of the individuals who have come to the office to furnish information.

Accordingly, Supervisor MARK FELT of this office suggests that consideration be given to eliminating the use of the word "complaint" in any of its forms and substituting instead the word "interview" where applicable. For example, the following could be used: Interview Room, Interview Form, Interview Duty, etc. His suggestion would also be that the word "complainant" be eliminated entirely and that instead these individuals be referred to only by name.

The Bureau is advised that as far as the Seattle Office is concerned, almost the total credit for the obtaining of this material belongs to Special Agent [redacted] of this office who developed this situation from the very beginning merely as an academic and extra-curricular interest, since at the time he began the development of this phase the Japanese official family in Seattle had not even yet been re-established here but were merely in the planning stage concerning which there had been some newspaper publicity. From this beginning, [redacted] worked up the situation under the supervision of Supervisor W. MARK FELT of this office to a point where the results are as specified above. (C)

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

R. D. Auerbach, SAC, Seattle, since 10-22-51.
John A. Holtzman, ASAC, since 5-4-53.

PHYSICAL CONDITION AND MAINTENANCE.....EXCELLENT ✓

Space, in Federal Reserve Building, has not changed since last inspection. It is adequate and in excellent shape. 64 square feet per employee. Two minor deficiencies found in 10 automobiles, neither of which affected safety. Corrections made. Check automobile register reflected mileage of cars noted incorrectly on 2 occasions. Corrections made. 71 automobiles assigned Seattle for use of 108 investigative personnel. Four cars (3 1948 Buicks and 1 1948 Ford) have over 60,000 miles and are not adequate for pursuit purposes. However, SAC desires to keep them, inasmuch as they are valuable for Communist surveillance purposes. Inspector agrees. No delinquencies noted in firearms, and one minor delinquency noted in photographic equipment.

INVESTIGATIVE OPERATIONS.....FAIR ✓

As of 6-1-54 there were 2304 pending cases, with 762, or 36.5%, delinquency. The following important classifications carried a delinquency which was higher than the over-all index: Of the 5 Extortion cases pending two, or 40%, were delinquent; of the 61 White Slave Traffic Act cases pending 26, or 42.6%, were delinquent; of the 35 Theft of Government Property cases 17, or 48.6%, were delinquent; of the 366 security (100 classification) cases 137, or 37.4%, were delinquent; of the 65 security (105 classification) 42, or 64.6%, were delinquent; and of the 37 Plant Informant cases pending 24, or 64.9%, were delinquent. The over-all high delinquency and extremely high individual classification delinquencies referred to above caused in part by the sudden and high increase of Atomic Energy Act cases received recently.

As of 6-9-54 there were 516 Atomic Energy Act cases pending. On that date it was estimated 110 more would be received from the Bureau to be completed during current fiscal year (prior to 7-1-54). Of this 516 pending cases in approximately 50% the deadline had been missed. As a result of this suddenly increased applicant-type case load, 5 stenographers were sent to Seattle on "special" for a period of 30 days. 38 Agents were sent to Richland, Washington, during week of 7/1-8/54, where the bulk of the work was to be done. A streamlined program was set up whereby each Agent was handling approximately 1.3 case investigations per work day. Estimated this program will make it possible that all Atomic Energy Act cases received and anticipated from the Bureau, as noted above, would be completed by 7/1/54.

Another reason given for the high investigative case delinquency was the acceleration of the summary report program in security cases. As of June 8 there were approximately 90 to be completed. This program has target date for completion of July 14, and Seattle Office expects to make it.

Estimated 51 Agent days pending accounting work in 5 files. Eight accountants assigned Seattle Division, four of whom not fully qualified to handle all investigations. SAC directed to give these four opportunity to work with fully qualified accountants to add to their experience.

In investigation of top hoodlum program Seattle Office had opened 16 independent files (One on each person designated as a top hoodlum). This not in accordance with SAC Letter #53-58 dated 8-25-53, which instructs such cases should be a subfile to the General Investigative Intelligence File. These 16 files ordered closed by Inspector and subfiles opened in conformance with present rules.

2304 pending investigative cases in Seattle Office, of which 197 were fugitive cases. Of this 197, fourteen, or 7.1%, had leads which had not been covered within 30 days of their receipt. In 1149 pending cases reviewed (This excludes security-type matters.) 138 over one year old. Of this 138 twelve, or 8.6%, were delinquent.

Of the 1534 total pending cases reviewed, errors of substance were found in 3, or .19%. Of the 360 closed files reviewed, an error of form was found in one, or .27%.

Of 500 closed files reviewed
no errors of form noted.

In the 1534 pending files reviewed, errors of form were found in 153, or 9.97%. Too high. SAC directed to reduce. Of these errors of form, 59.3% were attributable to Agents and 40.7% attributable to Clerks.

Increase in Party members noted above estimated by Seattle Office to be reregistrations and other members brought back under Communist Party control during year and to fact that sources of information regarding Party numbers better now than then. Decrease in number of security informants caused by loss occasioned through use of informants as witnesses in Smith Act trials April - October, 1953. SAC advised that 4 missing key figures must be located. Security informants evaluated: 2 excellent; 11 very good; and 9 good. Potential security informants evaluated: 1 excellent; 1 very good; 5 good; 4 fair; 1 poor, and 5 had insufficient information to evaluate.

Criminal informants. At time of current inspection there were 31 qualified criminal informants, as compared to 29 at time of last inspection. There were 122 potential criminal informants at the time of this inspection, as compared to 93 at the time of the last inspection. CI's and PCI's were evaluated as follows:

Criminal informant coverage well distributed geographically. Weaknesses exist in coverage in Resident Agencies of the following classifications: Theft From Interstate Shipment, Interstate Transportation of Obscene Matter, Interstate Transportation of Lottery Tickets, Interstate Transportation of Gambling Devices. There has been very little information concerning any violations of this nature existing.

At quarter ending 3-20-54 the Seattle Office had developed 1672 plant informants in 222 plants. 70 informants had been developed at the Boeing Airplane Company, which has 35,000 employees. SAC directed to develop additional and "round-the-clock" informants in this plant.

IN AUTO CASE

During fiscal year 1953 Seattle recovered 169 autos (for relative standing of 42nd among all field offices) and obtained 44 convictions. During first 10 months of fiscal year 1954 139 automobiles were recovered (for relative standing of 43rd). During latter period 27 convictions obtained for 19.35%. This percentage is below the average of 28% established for all field divisions (SAC Letter 54-8). Delinquency in this category on June 1 was 36.5%. There were 10 criminal informants, 11 potential criminal informants and 6 confidential sources in position to report data concerning these violations to the office.

During first 11 months fiscal year 1954, 7 convictions have been obtained in White Slave Traffic Act cases. Eight persons are under indictment and presently awaiting trial. Eight more cases are ready for presentation to next grand jury. This situation shows outstanding improvement over total convictions of 2 during fiscal year 1953.

Investigative operations of Seattle Office rated fair in view of delinquency in criminal investigative work and Atomic Energy Act investigations. This situation believed temporary and should be completely relieved by 7-15-54.

ADMINISTRATIVE OPERATIONS.....GOOD ✓

SAC supervises 98 important criminal and security files. 18% delinquency. ASAC John A. Holtzman supervises 436 criminal-type investigations. Had 24% delinquency. SA [redacted] supervised 391 criminal-type investigations. Had 26% delinquency. SA Charles H. DeFord supervises 524 security-type investigations and had 26% delinquency. SA W. Mark Felt supervises 851 applicant-type cases and had delinquency of 46%. Case load, which was 2304 on 6/1/54, will probably decrease by approximately 600 when Atomic Energy Act cases are completed (target date 7/1/54). When this takes place, re-evaluation of supervisory staff should be made and consideration be given to deleting one. It is noted that during inspection Supervisor [redacted] retired from Bureau. Consideration should be given to consolidating his desk with the others presently existing and not replacing him.

Stenographic work current but, as noted above, 5 stenos had been transferred in from surrounding offices for one month "special," beginning 6/7/54, due to increased load of Atomic Energy Act cases. Stenographic production 3.26 pages per hour per stenographer. Typist production 3 pages per hour per typist. Clerical work on current basis.

Time in office for various squads for three-months period of March, April and May, 1954, as follows: (1) Criminal Squad #1 - 16%; (2) Criminal Squad #2 - 13%; (3) Security Squad - 51% (caused by security summary program to be finished by 7/14/54); and (4) Applicant Squad - 14%.

Productivity of Agents. On 6/2/54 average case load of Agents was 21.3 cases and their production in May, 1954, averaged 9.37 cases closed per Agent. Two administrative projects pending Chief Clerk's Office: (1) Consolidation of indices in which 5½ drawers had been completed out of 159 to be done; (2) Consolidation of files which could be completed by one person in approximately one month working full time, but at present rate estimated will be completed in one year.

Of 4000 index cards reviewed, 16 were found to be out of sequence for a delinquency of .4%.

Survey of No. 1 Register for the month of May, 1954, reflected 6 instances where employees failed to indicate when signing out that they were going on sick leave during day and 3 instances where they failed to indicate when signing out that they were going on annual leave during day. SAC directed to bring this to the attention of all personnel. Six errors of minor nature noted on No. 3 Cards for employees for month of May. All corrected.

Communications costs. Average monthly communications costs per Special Agent for the months of July through September, 1953, was \$152.35. For a comparable period of February through April, 1954, it was \$168.59 per Special Agent. SAC directed to reverse this increasing trend.

The above indicates favorable trend in all except one category - Autos Recovered.

Eligibility list - stenographers and clerks. A control file and an eligibility list box is maintained in Seattle Office in accordance with SAC Letter 113 dated 10-24-52 and SAC Letter 54-29 dated 6-8-54. A review of these at time of inspection reflected no individuals who were then eligible and available for immediate employment. SAC Auerbach explained that eligibility lists have been maintained and are used but was depleted at time of inspection by reason that Seattle Office had to draw on it for 14 new employees during past 4 months. Investigations were under way at time of inspection to replenish this list.

PERSONNEL MATTERSVERY GOOD. ✓

All employees passed examinations with the exception of RCO [redacted] who failed to pass the radio sending test but in view of exceptionally bad atmospheric conditions at the time and in accordance with the recommendation of the SAC, no failure is recorded and the episode is considered "no test." A re-examination will be provided. Morale good. No complaints. Good training programs for both investigative and noninvestigative personnel. Of the 108 Agents in office 33 had not testified in U. S. District Court; 20 had not appeared before Federal Grand Jury; 9 had not been before a U. S. Commissioner; and 25 had not participated in a raid. SAC directed to so assign work that all Agents receive this valuable experience.

Adequacy of personnel. 108 Agents, including SAC, ASAC and supervisory staff. This number adequate. Three Special

Employees, two of whom work on technical surveillance and one on general assignment. A fourth one lost to office during past year, and SAC feels it would be of benefit to the Bureau to replace him. Inspector feels his replacement not necessary. Two radio operators adequate. 18 stenographers presently in office, and Bureau authority requested to employ two more. This number adequate but not excessive. Two typists. Adequate. 34 clerical employees. Adequate. Clerk-Agent ratio 48.6%.

Overtime. Overtime for Agents for three months of March, April and May was 2 hrs. 24 minutes; for SAC 3 hrs. 1 min.; ASAC 3 hrs. 8 min.; for Supervisor Felt 2 hrs. 51 min.; Supervisors Rich 2 hrs. 18 min., and De Ford 4 hrs. 13 min.

During two months prior to inspection only 4 articles worthy of publication had been submitted to Bureau for "Investigator," indicating poor showing. SAC directed to step up this program.

CONTACTS.....VERY GOOD

129 SAC contacts: 117 developed by SAC Auerbach and all known to him. One special service contact, who is valuable and was utilized frequently during past year. Very good American Legion program. During 1953 116 speeches were given. Thus far, during the calendar year 1954, 77 have been given. They have been well distributed, both geographically and as to type of audience. Forty National Academy graduates in Seattle territory engaged in law enforcement. 27 are in executive-type positions. During calendar year 1953, 41 police schools given. Thus far in 1954 31 have been given. These consist of all types and were well distributed. Good publicity resulted from it. SAC's relationship with judges, U. S. Attorneys, law enforcement officers, newspapers and influential men in community is excellent.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. SAC R. D. Auerbach.....none. Not on probation. Nonveteran. He is an excellent contact man. He has firm grip on administration and investigative operations of his office. The inspection reflected investigative work unusually delinquent but

due in part to Atomic Energy Act program. This situation temporary and should be relieved by middle of July, 1954.

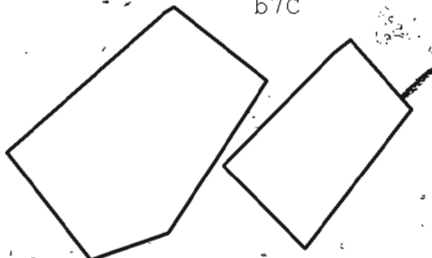

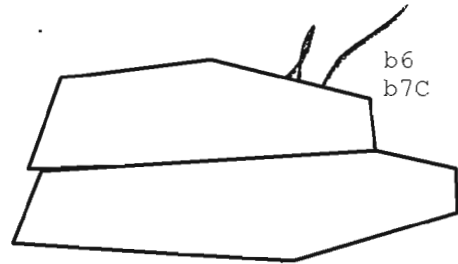

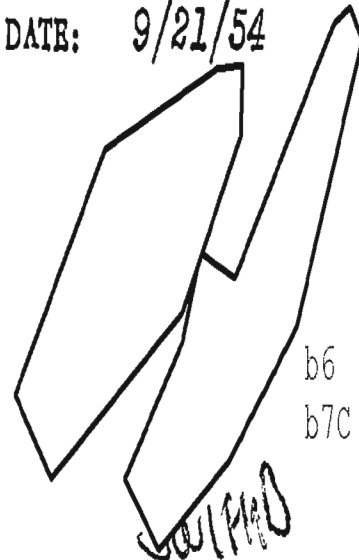

Pursuant to your instruction, this memorandum is to set forth an explanation for the error which appeared in the letter to San Francisco bearing the above caption, dated 9/27/54, which I prepared.

On September 23rd, last, a teletype was received from Inspector [redacted], captioned as above, setting forth a large number of statistics relative to personnel, total cases, caseload per agent, cases closed per agent, delinquency, time in the office and voluntary overtime. Similar statistics were set out concerning each squad in the office.

My instruction was to prepare a summary of the teletype and for brevity I prepared a tabulation. The teletype indicated the time in the office for the Criminal Squad as "sixteen point thirty six percent" and in transposing this into numerals for the tabulation I incorrectly used the last three words only, omitting the first two words of that portion of the teletype, so that it ultimately read "36%."

The letter was prepared at the same time and similar figures concerning the time in the office percentage of the Criminal Squad were utilized.

There is no good excuse I can offer for this and you can be sure that this is the last time I will permit such an error to occur.

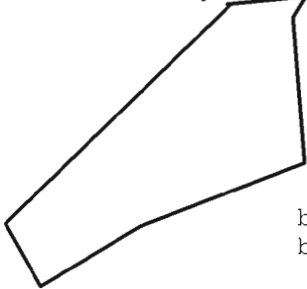

Inspector [redacted] was instructed to determine the adequacy of personnel in the San Francisco Office; he submitted a teletype 9/23/54, with his findings contained therein. Line 16, page 1, of the teletype in referring to the General Criminal Squad of the San Francisco Office reports time in office as "sixteen point thirty six percent." Mr. Felt was instructed to prepare a table incorporating the various findings of Inspector [redacted] and he did so in a memorandum from Mr. Harbo to Mr. Tolson 9/24/54. A table in this memorandum shows sixty-six sets of figures; however, the time in the office for the Criminal Squad is shown as 36%. Obviously, Mr. Felt overlooked in his dictation the correct figure which was 16.36%. This same error was carried through by Mr. Felt in a letter to SAC Whelan dated 9/27/54, where the following comment appears: "Particular effort should be made to reduce the time in the office of the Criminal Squad, which was 36%. This squad should be far below the office average."

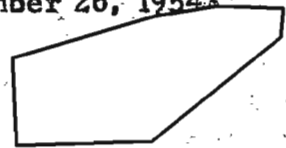

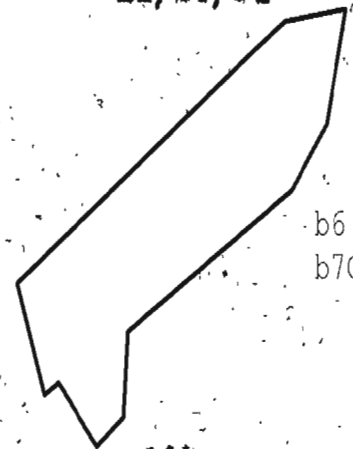

The Bureau has carefully analyzed the facts developed regarding the handling in the New Orleans Division of the receipt of allegations made against unidentified FBI Agents in Washington, D. C., by [redacted] and you are considered to have been derelict in your supervision of this matter. Specifically, it is noted that you were in charge of the office on December 27, 1954, when [redacted] was interviewed by a Special Agent, at which time the fact that his allegations were baseless was not developed although [redacted] upon subsequent interview by agents of another division admitted that his charges were entirely unfounded. You should have seen to it that the interrogation of this complainant was handled with sufficient initiative and thoroughness to have arrived at the truth without unnecessary delay.

Furthermore, when you revised the New Orleans communication to the Bureau dated December 29, 1954, setting forth [redacted] allegations you neglected to see to it that reference was made therein to the fact that [redacted] had been previously interviewed at the Baton Rouge Resident Agency on December 23, 1954.

As reflected in the attached memorandum of the Investigative Division of 2/7/55 [REDACTED], a deaf-mute and alleged homosexual, complained to the New Orleans Office on 12/27/54 that while in Washington, D. C., to assist a friend who had been hurt in an automobile accident, [REDACTED] was picked up by 2 FBI agents, questioned 7 hours and sent back to New Orleans. On 1/18/55 [REDACTED] signed a statement admitting these allegations were a complete hoax. U. S. Attorneys at New Orleans and District of Columbia declined prosecution on Giving False Information violation. On 1/21/55 Washington Field Office advised the Bureau [REDACTED] had stated he initially made his complaint to the Baton Rouge Resident Agency on 12/31/54 before making it to the New Orleans Office on 12/27/54.

SAC, New Orleans, has advised that on 12/23/54 [REDACTED] and his mother were interviewed by SA Heatherly at Baton Rouge Resident Agency, the mother acting as interpreter and SA Heatherly taking copious notes. During the interview [REDACTED] appeared evasive to his mother's questions and some confusion arose as to a long-distance telephone call from Washington, D. C., which resulted in [REDACTED] trip to Washington. [REDACTED] suggested she go to New Orleans and clarify the matter and then contact the New Orleans Office. Accordingly, SA Heatherly forwarded his notes by routing slip to the New Orleans Office and arrangements were made to continue the interview of [REDACTED] and his mother which was done on 12/27. SAC Chiles advised that the practice of sending notes from resident agencies to the field office is not a usual one in his office, he has admonished SA Heatherly and recommends that Heatherly be censured for failure to reduce his interview to memorandum form. SA [] interviewed the [] at New Orleans on 12/27 and prepared a communication to the Bureau setting forth their allegation against Washington agents. SA [] had SA Heatherly's notes while handling the matter but did not include in the letter the fact that the [] had initially been interviewed at the Baton Rouge Resident Agency on 12/23. ASAC Felt made some revisions in the outgoing letter and SAC Chiles initialed it.

Several Bureau requests of pertinent information were necessary before complete facts were received by teletype of 2/4/55.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

(1) SAC Chiles, New Orleans, recommended that SA Heatherly be censured for failure to reduce notes of [] interview to memorandum form. Investigative Division concurs, also recommending that the censure include criticism for not thoroughly interviewing [] in order that the Bureau could be advised at the outset of allegations against Bureau agents. Mr. Boardman concurred with the Investigative Division.

The Administrative Division recommends no action against SA Heatherly since full and accurate details could not be obtained during the Baton Rouge interview of 12/23/54 and SA Heatherly arranged for the [] to secure clarifying information in New Orleans and then report to the New Orleans Office. SA Heatherly sent his notes of the interview to the office and they were actually utilized when the second interview was conducted, on 12/27/54, the next working day after the 3-day Christmas holiday.

(2) Investigative Division also recommends that SA [] be censured for failing to interview [] with sufficient thoroughness.

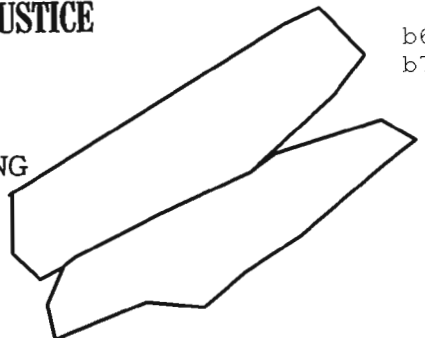

C., to assist a friend, [redacted], who had been hurt in an automobile accident. [redacted] alleged while in Washington, he was picked up by two FBI Agents, questioned seven hours, and sent back to New Orleans. In subsequent investigation, [redacted] gave signed statement to Agents of the Washington Field Office (WFO) admitting allegations against Agents were complete hoax and gave story to angered mother to cover up trip to Washington. Facts presented to U. S. Attorney (USA) New Orleans and District of Columbia, who declined prosecution on Title 18, Section 1001 (Giving False Information, U. S. Code). On 1/21/55, WFO advised in interview of [redacted] he alleged he made the same complaint to the Baton Pougé Resident Agency (RA) on 12/21/54 as he had made to the New Orleans Office on 12/27/54. b6 b7C

By teletype 1/21/55, SAC New Orleans instructed to obtain facts concerning the alleged complaint given by [redacted] to Baton Rouge RA. By letter dated 1/24/55, SAC Chiles, New Orleans, advised that [redacted], mother of [redacted], telephonically contacted the Baton Rouge RA and requested an appointment. On 12/23/54, she and her son appeared at RA and were interviewed by SA Von Perry Heatherly, [redacted] acting as interpreter, at which time Heatherly took copious notes. [redacted], during the interview, appeared evasive to mother's questions, and there appeared to be some confusion as to the long-distance telephone call from Washington, D. C., to [redacted], which was taken by [redacted]. In view of confusion in mind of [redacted], she suggested that she proceed to New Orleans and after clarification of long-distance call through [redacted], she would contact the New Orleans Office. SA Heatherly then forwarded his notes by routing slip to the New Orleans Office and arrangements were made to continue the inquiry upon the arrival of [redacted] and her son in New Orleans. b6 b7C

At 4:00 p.m., 12/27/54, [redacted] and her son, together with [redacted], another deaf-mute, and [redacted] arrived at the New Orleans Office and were interviewed by SA [redacted]. b6 b7C

By teletype 1/26/55, SAC New Orleans requested to submit detailed explanations from SA Von Perry Heatherly, supervisory personnel, and himself concerning the procedure surrounding [redacted] interview and the forwarding of Agent's notes to the New Orleans Office. The Bureau asked if it was a usual practice to forward notes without memorandum and as to why action was not taken to immediately notify the Bureau regarding [redacted] allegations against Bureau Agents. b6 b7C

Memorandum to Mr. Rosen

By teletype 1/28/55, SAC New Orleans advised that in interview of [redacted] by SA Heatherly at Baton Rouge RA on 12/23/54, [redacted] became agitated over her son's evasive attitude about his alleged trip to Washington, and she suggested that she proceed to New Orleans after the Christmas holidays and attempt to obtain more specific information. SA Heatherly's notes of the interview were forwarded to the New Orleans Office by routing slip for the benefit of the Agent who would conduct interview of the [redacted] when they arrived at the office after the Christmas holidays. These notes were received by ASAC W. Mark Felt on the afternoon of 12/27/54, at which time he handed them to an Agent and instructed that if [redacted] called at the office, the interview should be definitely conducted and the issues resolved and that if she did not call at the office within a day, an attempt should be made to locate her and obtain facts. SAC Chiles advised that the practice of sending notes from the RA to field office was not a usual practice in his office and he could recall no other similar instance. He advised that he admonished Agent Heatherly and recommended that Agent Heatherly be censured for failure to reduce his interview to memorandum form. ASAC Felt advised that on late afternoon 1/27/54, this matter again came to his attention when the outgoing communication to the Bureau covering the interview came across his desk, at which time he revised the letter. ASAC Felt failed to have the interview of [redacted] on 12/23/54 included in this letter. In response to Bureau inquiry, on 2/4/55, SAC Chiles said he was away from Headquarters City on 12/27 and 28/54 and had no knowledge of the interview of [redacted] until the communication came across his desk for initialing. Chiles said [redacted] did have the benefit of Heatherly's notes, who through inadvertence, failed to make reference to them in the letter of 12/29/54, advising the Bureau of [redacted] complaint.

By letter 2-25-55 New Orleans forwarded a manuscript prepared by SA [redacted] and requested that [redacted] be approved as a general police instructor. Bulet 3-2-25 advised New Orleans that [redacted] manuscript would be reviewed but that prior to considering the request Bureau desired that instructions set forth in SAC Letter 54-32 be complied with. That SAC Letter lists the conditions under which Bureau will approve additional police instructors and contains instructions relative to the auditing of lecture by the Agent based on his manuscript.

By letter 3-7-55 New Orleans furnished information as to the need for additional police instructors but failed to furnish data as to [redacted] delivery of his lecture. By Bureau letter 3-14-55, New Orleans was advised that the manuscript had been approved. It was pointed out that New Orleans had failed to furnish information regarding [redacted] lecture. SAC Chiles was instructed to forward that information and to obtain explanations from individuals responsible for failing to comply with Bureau instructions.

By letter 3-16-55 Chiles explained that ASAC Felt had handled the matter, that Felt was of the opinion that [redacted], who was being considered as a potential police instructor, was to be given additional training after which his lecture would be monitored and the Bureau notified. Chiles recommended no action against Felt.

OBSERVATIONS: Although New Orleans by Bulet 3-2-55 was specifically instructed to comply with the SAC Letter's instructions and their failure to do so has caused additional correspondence, it is believed that Felt's position has some merit to it. The SAC Letter refers to training potential police instructors which could be interpreted to mean that the information



Reference is made to the Bureau's memorandum of March 9, 1955, requesting an explanation for certain errors appearing in the report of SA A. HARRY ROBERTS dated 2/21/55.

The above case was under the supervision of ASAC W. MARK [redacted] and instant report was approved by him. SA ROBERTS has advised there were approximately 4,000 one-dollar bills recovered in instant robbery, and that the personnel assigned to the investigation was working almost on a twenty-four hour a day basis attempting to pursue a great many urgent matters in collecting and obtaining the evidence. He stated that he made a very conscientious effort to adequately count the money when it was originally recovered, and that the first count was considered by him as a tentative one. The money was later placed in sequence and the count was made by SA [redacted], together with officials of the Bossier Bank and Trust Company.

SA ROBERTS advises that the parole report figure should read \$10,827, and the report referred to in referenced communication should be changed to reflect this figure.

With reference to the verification of the payment to the American Loan Company, SA ROBERTS advised that at the time it was his opinion that no benefit would be achieved from such investigation. He pointed out that the payment to the First National Life Insurance Company was verified.

RECOMMENDATION

From the above, it is apparent that errors were made, both in the investigative and the parole reports, of SA A. HARRY ROBERTS. Because of these errors, it is recommended that he be censured by the Bureau to use more care in investigative matters and in his report.

Reference is made to Bureau memorandum of April 1, 1955, which made reference to the report of SA J. WOODROW GILMORE dated March 14, 1955 at New Orleans. A review of this file reflects that this report was reviewed and approved by ASAC/W. MARK FELT. As instructed by the Bureau, amended pages are being prepared for appropriate substitution in this report to reflect the Bureau's most recent sketch of the Progressive Party and to incorporate a complete historical sketch of the Progressive Party on a local level.

SA GILMORE explained these errors as follows:

1. T-2 advised in rerep, "In 1949 subject attended several Progressive Party meetings in New Orleans which were dominated by the Communist Party leaders and functionaries." It is noted the informant neither stated nor is in a position to state that the subject was a member of the Progressive Party. The subject was merely known by the informant to have attended certain meetings in 1949 which the informant characterized as "Progressive Party meetings which were dominated by Communist Party leaders and functionaries." It was felt that this sketch of the meetings was sufficient. We have no other individual or informant who saw the subject at these particular meetings or who might better characterize or sketch these particular meetings.

A complete historical sketch of the Progressive Party on a local level has been prepared and incorporated into the amended pages. It may be noted this sketch is cumulative and in line with the local sketch of the 1949 meetings given by the informant.

2. SA GILMORE states that he now recalls that the Bureau had furnished a more recent sketch of the Progressive Party but he inadvertently overlooked the use in his report of the more recent sketch. The matter has been corrected and he has given every assurance that it will not again occur.

The New Orleans office submitted a report in this case dated 3-24-55 which, upon review at the Bureau, was found to contain four discrepancies. By letter dated 4-5-55, the Bureau instructed the SAC, New Orleans, to obtain explanations from responsible personnel and forward same to the Bureau together with his recommendations regarding administrative action. Two of the discrepancies referred to above are explained in a separate communication from the New Orleans office, handled separately, and found not to be in error. The other two discrepancies, found to be in error, were: (1) failure to cite the source for a list of the subject's contacts; and (2) failure to identify a source in the Administrative Section.

By letter dated 4-11-55 the SAC in New Orleans has advised that both the agent who prepared the report, SA [redacted], and the Supervisor who approved this report, ASAC W. Mark Felt, have acknowledged the errors in question and have stated that every effort will be made to avoid such errors in the future. The SAC, New Orleans has advised that [redacted] and Felt have been reprimanded for the errors in question and has recommended that SA [redacted] be censured. The SAC, New Orleans has not recommended any further administrative action against ASAC Felt, pointing out that Felt normally supervises criminal cases at New Orleans and that therefore the various ramifications of security work are outside his usual duties.

The Domestic Intelligence Division recommends that a letter of censure be delivered to SA [redacted] for improper preparation of the report in question and that a letter of censure also be delivered to ASAC Felt in view of his failure to detect the errors in the report.

This report was approved by ASAC W. Mark Felt. Upon review of this report at Seat of Government, it was found to contain a number of errors. These errors were: (1) Inadequate documentation (characterization of the former [redacted] without showing source or elaborating. (2) Failure to list source of descriptive data regarding subject. (3) Poor organization of background data regarding the subject. In addition, form errors consisting of two incorrect dates and three minor grammatical errors were detected.

SAC H. P. Chiles, New Orleans, advised that the report in question has been rewritten and the errors corrected. He pointed out this report was one of several reports written by SA [redacted] and approved by ASAC Felt which were prepared hurriedly during the latter part of March, 1955, in an effort to reduce New Orleans' delinquency. He has reprimanded both SA [redacted] and ASAC Felt for the errors noted by the Bureau and has advised that they have no excuse in this matter other than their haste to bring several matters out of delinquency status. He pointed out further that both Felt and [redacted] have been previously censured for errors in reports prepared by SA [redacted] in late March, 1955. However, he recommended that the Bureau again consider censuring SA [redacted] and ASAC Felt in connection with instant matter. Domestic Intelligence Division, Mr. Boardman concurring, recommended that ASAC Felt and SA [redacted] be censured for the substantive errors listed above.

Upon the death of any Special Agent who is a member of said fund the appointed committee will consider the case and submit a recommendation to the Director as to its conclusions. Reference is made to the Bureau's memorandum of 6/16/55, instructing that this office furnish the reason for the failure to advise the Bureau concerning the above proposed fingerprint school thirty days prior to the date thereof.

This file reveals that the New Orleans memorandum dated 6/13/55 advised the Bureau of the fingerprint school at Natchez, Mississippi, for July 5 to 8, 1955. The file further reflects that on May 17, 1955, SA [redacted] advised that several police administrators in the vicinity of Natchez, Mississippi, had requested a fingerprint school in that area, and that it had been agreed among these officers that the school should be from July 5 through July 8, 1955.

This memorandum was routed to SA ROBERT E. LEE, who has been assigned to coordinate the police schools in this division, at which time he rough drafted a memorandum to the Bureau, setting out the proposed schedule and designating SA JAMES E. SCHMIDT, Jr. as instructor. This rough draft memorandum was reviewed by ASAC W. MARK FELT, who found that the work load of SA JAMES E. SCHMIDT, Jr. was extremely heavy in view of the number of urgent accounting cases in the office, whereupon he returned the rough draft to SA LEE, suggesting that SA [redacted], another fingerprint instructor, be contacted for the purpose of determining whether his commitments would allow him to handle this school.

SA LEE was on leave between 5/26/55 and 5/31/55, and found this memorandum upon his return with a notation to discuss the matter with ASAC FELT. In the meantime, ASAC FELT was on a speaking tour in Southern Louisiana and did not return until June 2, 1955. It was determined by SA LEE in the meantime that SA [redacted] could handle this school, and after discussing the matter with ASAC FELT, the rough draft was changed and sent through for typing.

A review of the relative standing of the field divisions as of June, 1955, reveals that the New Orleans Division during the fiscal year 1955 handled cases in which there were 414 convictions. This number of convictions placed the New Orleans Division the second highest among all the Bureau's divisions, and was an increase of 26 over 1954, an increase of 84 over 1953, and an increase of 125 over 1952.

This excellent achievement has been brought about by the close supervision and outstanding work of ASAC/W. MARK FELT and Supervisor G. MYRYWIN ALDERSON, who handle a majority of the criminal matters in this division. Their performance in this field is particularly significant in view of the fact that approximately twenty per cent of the personnel of this office has been utilized on security investigations where no convictions are reflected.

Accordingly, it is recommended that the Bureau commend ASAC FELT and Supervisor ALDERSON for the manner in which they have supervised criminal investigations during the past year, bringing about these excellent results as far as convictions are concerned.

SAC at New Orleans personally supervising bank robbery which occurred at [redacted] Louisiana, and left office about 1:30 for this purpose. ASAC was in office coordinating roadblocks and handling liaison with local police on bank robbery, and, in addition, coordinating and planning surveillance. Agent [redacted] designated as Agent in Charge of surveillance and was surveilling [redacted]. After his car was joined by other surveilling car, he proceeded to previously selected position adjacent to park swimming pool. Upon arrival there subject was observed in a car which immediately drove at high speed, across lawn, jumping curb and leaving park through an unblocked exit which was to be closed by car surveilling [redacted]. [redacted] car pursued subject on same route and although his radio transmitting equipment good up to this point, transmission became garbled and unintelligible when his car jumped curb pursuing subject. Later determined that tube in radio damaged and radio no longer operative. [redacted] and Agent assisting him pursued subject to a main thoroughfare where they were forced to slow down to avoid jeopardizing life and property and subject thereafter eluded Agents. [redacted] abandoned five minutes later by a surveilling car and subsequent search of area by police and Agents failed to locate subject.

DETAILS

Agents New Orleans Office instituted surveillance 5/16/55 to effect arrest of [redacted]

[redacted]. Before [redacted] able to meet [redacted], latter fled from park in car, later determined to be stolen, as one of surveilling cars approached area. [redacted], who escaped from a [redacted] prison camp [redacted]/55, eluded pursuing Agents on main thoroughfare adjoining park when Agents had to decrease speed of their car to avoid jeopardizing life and property. b6 b7C b7D

Above information furnished in New Orleans teletype of 5/17/55. On same date New Orleans instructed to furnish complete details of incident together with memoranda of explanations from participating Agents and recommendations as to administrative action. In teletypes of 5/17, 18/55, supported by memoranda from participating agents, SAC, New Orleans, advised [redacted]

[redacted]. Surveillance put on [redacted] as [redacted]. SAC Chiles was personally supervising investigation of bank robbery which occurred at 1:30 p.m. at [redacted], Louisiana, on afternoon of this date. ASAC was in office coordinating road blocks and handling liaison with state and local police in Louisiana and Mississippi on bank robbery and coordinating and planning surveillance. [redacted] b6 b7C b7D

In the meantime, car number one, containing two Agents, took concealed position in park to view bus loop and block exits from park to north and west. Car number two, with two Agents, surveilled a public phone booth which subject had used to make earlier call to [redacted]. Car number three surveilled [redacted].

After [redacted] [redacted], car number two left phone booth surveillance and joined car number three surveilling [redacted]. When Agents in both cars satisfied subject not [redacted], car number three immediately proceeded to park, leaving car number two to continue surveillance of [redacted]. Agent [redacted], designated as Agent in charge of surveillance, was in car number three. This car proceeded to previously selected parking area adjoining park swimming pool where bus loop and park bus stop could be observed. As Bureau car number three entered parking area, Agents in this car observed subject in a black Chevrolet, who at that moment drove his car at a high rate of speed across park lawn, jumping a curb and coming out on [redacted]. Agents pursued subject, taking same route and advising other cars of situation. At this point, radio transmission from this car became garbled and for approximately 60 seconds neither of the other cars were able to understand transmission. b6 b7C b7D

It is not clear if the radio transmission from this car had been good. It was subsequently determined that a tube in radio transmitter had apparently shorted out when this car jumped curb following subject. Approximately one minute after Agents in car three began pursuing subject, other cars were able to detect words "[redacted] Street toward [redacted]" and immediately proceeded in that direction, assuming car number three had located and was pursuing subject. Transmitter in car number three (the key car) became permanently inoperative after first few unintelligible garbled messages. b6 b7C

At time subject fled from area, car number two was still surveilling [redacted] as bus had not yet reached park. This car was not then in position to block east exit from park as had previously been planned. Car number one was blocking exits to north and west and did not observe activity of subject's car and car number three. This car, (car number three) the only one having observed subject, pursued him to [redacted], a main thoroughfare, where Agents were forced to decrease speed to avoid jeopardizing life and property. Subject made two turns, the second not within view of Agents. He abandoned car on dead end street and fled on foot. His car located five minutes after abandonment by one of surveilling cars and immediate search of surrounding area by Agents and New Orleans Police failed to result in location of [redacted]. SAC Chiles recommended no administrative action, stating "failure to apprehend [redacted] directly attributable to failure of radio transmitter." b6 b7C b7D

OBSERVATIONS:

[redacted] is [redacted] public park. As SAC Chiles stated, radio transmitter in car number three apparently rendered inoperative when car had to jump curb pursuing subject. At all times prior to this incident, car radio had worked satisfactorily. Malfunction of car radio after this incident caused a minute delay before other two cars could understand Agents in car three and at that time only heard words "[redacted] Street toward [redacted]." These cars then proceeded in that direction. It would appear, however, that subject would not have observed activity which caused him to flee if car number three had approached parking area in a cautious manner. Car number three occupied by Agents Robert E. Lee and [redacted], the latter in charge of surveillance. Further, surveillance plan called for car number two, surveilling [redacted], to block east exit from park. The fact that [redacted] fled through this exit, which was not blocked from the outset, indicated improper planning. Car number one occupied by Agents Charles R. Carson and Sims F. Regard. Car number two occupied by Agents [redacted] and Will Hayden Griffin. b6 b7C b7D

REALLOCATION

ASAC Felt is presently in Grade GS-13, \$9420 per annum and is being considered for reallocation to GS-14, \$10,320 per annum based upon a recommendation submitted by SAC Chiles on July 20, 1955.

Mr. Felt has been ASAC at New Orleans since December 16, 1954, and this was his first assignment as an ASAC. He has been censured on six occasions since he assumed his duties as ASAC. On February 17, 1955, he was censured for improper supervision of a matter involving the interview of an individual who made allegations against unidentified FBI Agents in Washington. On May 2, 1955, May 12, 1955, and June 8, 1955, he was censured for approving various reports containing errors. On May 27, 1955, he was censured for his failure to properly coordinate and plan a surveillance. On July 22, 1955, he was censured after it was learned that he had initialed for file a memorandum dated February 25, 1955, which set forth derogatory information concerning a Deputy U. S. Marshal. This information should have been furnished to the Bureau along with an evaluation of the source of the information.

The New Orleans Office has not been inspected since ASAC Felt assumed his duties but is due for an inspection in the near future.

RECOMMENDATION

In view of the administrative action taken against ASAC Felt, I recommend no action be taken toward his reallocation at this time.

In the referenced Bureau communication instructions were set out to advise the Bureau as to whether certain allegations concerning Deputy U. S. Marshal [redacted] had previously been furnished to the Bureau. b6 b7C

A review of this matter reflects that the allegations against [redacted] were reported in a memorandum dated 2/25/55 by SA [redacted], which was initialled by ASAC W. MARK FELT. Based on the information contained in this memorandum, entitled "[redacted] POTENTIAL CRIMINAL INFORMANT", the file was closed because information had substantiated the fact that [redacted] was unreliable, exaggerated the truth and was a "terrific liar". Memoranda of SA [redacted] and ASAC W. MARK FELT concerning reasons why the Bureau was not advised of this allegation are attached. b6 b7C b7D

It appears that the information furnished by [redacted] is erroneous and without foundation, and that SA [redacted] and ASAC FELT were justified in taking no action upon the apparently fabricated story of [redacted]. Based on this and other unreliable information, [redacted] was dropped as a PCI. b6 b7C b7D

There is also attached a memorandum of SA [redacted] as to his reason for placing this unreliable information in the General Investigative Intelligence Report. It should be noted that SA [redacted] prepared the General Investigative Intelligence Report for the Gulfport Resident Agency in the absence of SA [redacted], who was at the Bureau on a special assignment. He took data from the General Investigative Intelligence file and incorporated it into the general report and was not familiar with the unreliability of former PCI [redacted], accordingly, failed to point this out when setting forth information furnished by [redacted]. b6 b7C b7D

RECOMMENDATIONS SAC NEW ORLEANS:

The SAC advises the pertinent part of the GIIF report was prepared by SA [redacted], during the absence of SA [redacted] on special assignment at the Bureau. It was approved by Relief Supervisor [redacted]. The original information concerning [redacted] was contained in a memorandum of SA [redacted] of 2-25-55 in which he recommended the discontinuance of the PCI because she was known to exaggerate and was described as a "terrific liar" and information furnished by her was unreliable. This memorandum also revealed instance where the PCI had furnished false information and recommended that the file on her be closed. This memorandum was initialed by ASAC W. Mark Felt. The SAC at New Orleans is of the opinion that SA [redacted] and ASAC Felt were justified in taking no action on this matter in view of the apparent fabricated story of the PCI. He advises that SA [redacted] was at fault in not properly qualifying the information in the GIIF report to show that it was unfounded and he has reprimanded this Agent. He recommends no further action concerning SA [redacted]. Relief Supervisor [redacted] has advised he did not have the PCI's file available when approving the GIIF report and was unaware of her unreliability.

Investigative Division feels that this information should have been sent to the Bureau with the reliability of the source being indicated so that we could have discharged our responsibility for disseminating the material. It is also believed that the GIIF Report should have reflected the evaluation of the source of this information. For these reasons it is recommended that a letter of censure be sent to ASAC W. Mark Felt, who initialed the original information for the file without taking appropriate action on it, to SA [redacted] who dictated the GIIF Report without including evaluating information, and to SA [redacted] who approved this report. No action is recommended as to SA [redacted] as he promptly dictated an appropriate memorandum making this information available to the New Orleans Office immediately after it was received.

SAC, New Orleans, by letter 7-11-55, has recommended commendation for ASAC W. Mark Felt and Supervisor G. Myrwin Alderson for their close supervision and outstanding work in supervising criminal investigations which resulted in 414 convictions being obtained by the New Orleans Division during fiscal 1955. This placed New Orleans second highest among Bureau divisions and was an increase of 26 over fiscal 1954.

Analysis of the statistical accomplishments of the New Orleans Division for fiscal 1955 reflects that the New Orleans Division had the following record:

Errors of form amounted to 14.05 per cent in cases supervised by you. The errors in criminal informant files were a primary factor in causing this condition to exist. You must see that agents record the necessary data, as required, in these informant files. I shall expect your supervision to be much closer to prevent such errors.

It is necessary that you and the other supervisory officials in the office use the periodic file reviews with agents as a means of directing the investigation and correcting any deficiencies found to exist.

Reference is made to Butel dated November 7, 1955. Attached are the explanations of SA [redacted], ASAC W. MARK FELT and Stenographer [redacted]. The report of SA [redacted] dated November 5, 1955 in instant case reveals the magnitude of this investigation and the explanations reveal the extended effort made by the Special Agents to meet the deadline placed by the Bureau. The explanations also reveal a number of other duties and responsibilities which must necessarily have been met during the period of investigation. Notwithstanding these other objectives, the agents assigned to the investigation were working long hours and were able to complete the investigation and prepare a 75-page rough draft which was forwarded to headquarters city by mail. This rough draft was received and because of its length and because of the congestion in the stenographic pool caused by the emergency operation of one of the stenographers and because of other deadline assignments being prepared, it became physically impossible to meet the Bureau deadline of November 1. ASAC FELT, of course, should have immediately advised the Bureau that the investigation had been completed, but because of the lengthy report, faced with other emergency matters, the report would not reach the Bureau on the date set in Bureau airtel dated October 22, 1955. As indicated by him, because of the pressure of other work, he neglected through inadvertence to prepare the necessary communication to the Bureau.

It appears that the delay has not embarrassed the Bureau nor affected the outcome of any possible prosecutive action in connection with these allegations. Accordingly, the errors appear to be in the nature of form errors rather than errors of substance. ASAC FELT, as well as other personnel involved in this matter, has been reprimanded by me for failure in properly notifying the Bureau that the deadline could not be met and errors of this nature will be avoided in the future. In view of the fact that the error noted is not of substance, no further administrative action is being recommended.

Upon receiving allegations that sheriff and county attorney had obtained a recording of statement given by Negroes regarding mixed swimming parties and victims' views regarding integration and had made such recording available to a mass meeting which adopted resolution that the victims who are white should leave the county because of their views on racial matters, investigation ordered and New Orleans was instructed to submit report to reach Bureau no later than 11/1/55.

Extensive investigation conducted by New Orleans Office and report dated 11/5/55 was received in Bureau on afternoon of 11/9/55. New Orleans did not advise Bureau of inability to meet deadline and it was necessary to follow the New Orleans Office in this matter.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF SAC NEW ORLEANS

SAC New Orleans recommends no action regarding employees involved as investigating Agent had other expedite duties and responsibilities even though SAC states that ASAC W. Mark Felt should have advised the Bureau that investigation had been completed but due to lengthy reports and other emergency matters report would not reach the Bureau by the deadline date. SAC stated that ASAC Felt neglected to advise the Bureau because of the pressure of other work and through inadvertence.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF INVESTIGATIVE DIVISION

(1) Investigative Division concurs with SAC New Orleans and recommends no administrative action regarding the stenographer or Agent to whom the case was assigned. The investigation was completed and rough draft forwarded to New Orleans Office by 10/29/55.

(2) Investigative Division recommends a letter of censure to ASAC Felt for his improper supervision in this matter in failing to advise the Bureau that investigation had been completed but report being delayed due to its length and other matters of an emergency nature which necessitated correspondence by the Bureau to follow the New Orleans Office.

Pursuant to your instructions, there is submitted the following explanation concerning my supervision of captioned case.

I took over supervision of this case mid-way during the investigation, when investigation was converted from a preliminary inquiry to a full field investigation, which was requested by Bureau airtel dated 10/22/55.

I discussed the scope of the investigation with SA [REDACTED], to whom this case is assigned, and arrangements were made to put all available man power in the Jackson Resident Agency on this case. During the period covered by this investigation we had firearms, the semi-annual agents' conference; the bank robbery conference at Jackson, Mississippi, the National Academy Associates meeting at Jackson, and other expedite matters. I instructed SA [REDACTED] to utilize all the agents in Jackson to the fullest possible extent and one agent was instructed to miss the October firearms and the semi-annual conference so that work on the case could be continued.

The rough draft report in this case came to the desk during the late afternoon of October 31, 1955. I do not recall specifically the exact time; however, mail from the Jackson Resident Agency customarily reaches the office about noon time. The block stamp on the rough draft report is dated October 31, 1955. I recall checking this rough draft about 5:30 PM and continuing until about 7:30 PM. I continued checking the voluminous rough draft the following morning and approved it for special typing.

Realizing that such a voluminous report would cause congestion in the steno pool, I discussed the matter with Stenographer [REDACTED], and she stated that two or three days would be necessary to type the report because it was so long. She pointed out that because of a large number of other expedite cases, including an extensive summary report on the Southern Educational Conference, Security Matter - C, case, it would not be possible to divide up instant report

I certainly should have advised the Bureau by airtel of the difficulties being encountered, and that the report would be delayed. I was handling a very large number of expedite matters, and I simply failed to realize at the time that the Bureau deadline was not being met. I was, however, doing everything physically possible to expedite the completion of the report.

[redacted] worked continuously on the report in this case on November 2, 3 and 4, at which time the report was substantially completed. On Saturday I reviewed the report and made a number of revisions and corrections. This necessitated retyping a number of pages, which was done Monday morning, November 7, 1955, at which time the corrected pages were inserted and the report was immediately furnished the Bureau.

I did not anticipate that it would take as long to type this report as it actually did. The reason is that the rough draft consisted of approximately 75 or 80 pages, and I felt that the completed report would run substantially less pages. As it turned out, the completed report is 65 pages in length.



REALLOCATION

The New Orleans Office was last inspected in August, 1955, and the Inspector found investigative operations good, personnel matters and administrative operations very good, and contacts and physical condition and maintenance excellent. The Inspector concluded that Mr. Felt was enthusiastic, had the best interests of the Bureau at heart, made an excellent personal appearance, and had a very good attitude toward his work. The Director saw SAC M. W. McFarlin of the Cincinnati Division on January 16, 1956, while McFarlin was attending two-day conference at the Seat of Government on January 16 and 17, 1956.
