CITES

Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora

175 Parties (member countries)

To ensure that international trade in
animals and plants
does not threaten species survival in the wild.



CITES as a Conservation Tool

- ▶ Ensure that international trade is conducted **legally** and in a **non-detrimental, sustainable** manner.
- ▶ CITES establishes an **international legal framework** for trade with **common procedures and mechanisms**.

CITES Appendices

► Appendix I

Species threatened with extinction, no commercial trade, import & export permit required - 2/3 majority vote at a CITES CoP
(953 taxa & populations)

► Appendix II

Currently not at risk of extinction, may be due to similarity of appearance, trade allowed with monitoring, export permit required - 2/3 majority vote at a CITES CoP
(33,078 taxa & populations)

► Appendix III

Unilateral listing, legally acquired/non-biological finding, export certificate only - no voting/unilateral listing by Parties
(171 taxa & populations)



CITES FAQs

- *Does CITES regulate domestic use or domestic trade? No*
 - > CITES does not apply to purely domestic activities, but regulatory coverage extends to activities with an international component.
- *Does CITES ban trade in listed species? No*
 - > CITES regulates international trade in listed species through a permit system.



Misconceptions about CITES

Listing species on the CITES Appendices should be done sequentially

e.g. Appendix III -- II -- I FALSE

- Each Appendix offers a different mechanism for trade control.
- Which Appendix is used should reflect species status, trade levels, and legal protections.



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


CITES FAQs

Does CITES support sustainable use ? YES

- CITES Appendix-II species **may be traded** internationally if accompanied by the appropriate **permits**.

Example: CITES Appendix II - American Alligator



U.S. Turtles: Federal Status

- ▶ Tortoises – All CITES and some/full ESA protection
- ▶ Marine Turtles – All CITES Appendix I and ESA-listed
- ▶ Terrestrial & Freshwater Turtles
 - Bog turtle - Appendix I
 - Box & Wood turtles - Appendix II
 - Alligator snapper & map turtles - Appendix III
 - Alabama red-bellied, Bog, Flattened musk, Plymouth red-bellied, Ringed map & Yellow-blotched map - ESA
 - Remaining ~31 species have no Federal status




