Post schedules 'take back' program

Program provides safe, environmentally sound ways to dispose of unused or expired prescription drugs

FORT LEONARD WOOD, Mo. – General Leonard Wood Army Community Hospital assisted by local law enforcement agencies and the Pulaski County Health Department will participate in a legal collection of unused prescription drugs from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., on April 28.

This safe drug take back program will be held at the Fort Leonard Wood Commissary and Post Exchange. People may drop off unused or unwanted medication at any of the collection sites, with no questions asked.

Safe Take Back programs, now in their third year, serve two purposes. First is to reduce the risk of prescription drugs entering the water, potentially harming aquatic life or getting into the human water supply. People are not advised to get rid of unwanted or unused drugs by flushing them down the toilet, or mixing excess drugs in with kitty litter, coffee grounds and other household waste that goes to a landfill.

Second, the programs also reduce the risk of prescription drugs being consumed inappropriately either by accident or through illegal sale. The event is a first step in stopping what a DEA official referred to as a "worrisome trend in teen drug use," where illegal drug use occurs when teens raid friends' and relatives' medicine cabinets.

The first DEA Take Back program was held in September of 2010, and the United States Drug Enforcement Administration announced the overwhelmingly successful results of the first-ever national prescription drug Take Back campaign. The American public turned in more than 242,000 lbs. of prescription drugs for safe and proper disposal. More than 4,000 take back sites were available in all 50 states, and Americans responded in huge numbers. Approximately 300 lbs. of medications were collected in the Pulaski County area last year.
