Egg hunt, Community Fun Fair set for March 31

FORT LEONARD WOOD, Mo. – Fort Leonard Wood will be hoppin' with kids March 31 with an Easter Egg Hunt, followed by a Community Fun Fair.

This will be the fourth year Family and Morale, Welfare and Recreation has hosted an Easter Egg Hunt on post. This year, the hunt is scheduled at 10 a.m. in Colyer Park.

Warren Britton, a certified program planner for FMWR, said when the weather is nice, about 3,000 kids usually participate.

"We will have two different egg hunting areas; zero to 3 years of age and 4 to 12 years of age. In the zero to 3 years of age we will allow the parents to escort as needed, but will not be allowing strollers into the area. The 4 to 12 years of age will be kids-only zoning," Britton said. "Some eggs will have coins in them that can be exchanged for trinkets."

"Children can take their picture with the Easter Bunny with their private camera. We will have a few games to participate in, too," he added.

Photos with the Easter Bunny will begin at 9 a.m. The Easter Egg Hunt is free, and kids need to bring their own basket.

"I would advise everyone to be there early as the egg hunting will start at 10 a.m. sharp and will not last 10 minutes, as it does not take long for 15,000 eggs to be picked up by the Fort Leonard Wood children," Britton said. "It is another great event that allows families to enjoy some quality time together."

The rain date for the Easter Egg Hunt is April 7.

After the egg hunt, the 18th Annual Community Fun Fair will begin at 11 a.m. at The Child Development Center, Bldg. 615 and School-Age Services, Bldg. 616 on Replacement Avenue.

The fun fair's theme this year is "The Great Adventure." The fair is scheduled to last until 3 p.m. A car seat and bike-helmet inspection station will be set up across Replacement Avenue at Building 470.

"Phyllis Jones from Health Promotions is hosting a Bicycle Rodeo and Car Seat check. The children and youth need to bring their own bike to participate," said Millie Justus, Child, Youth & School Services lead training and curriculum specialist.

"The Community Fun Fair will provide a forum for Fort Leonard Wood and the local civilian agencies to come together for the purpose of promoting Month of the Military Child and Child Abuse Prevention Month. The Fun Fair will promote family wellness, child development issues, parenting skills and child abuse prevention awareness through the distribution of materials and activities conducted in a festive manner," Justus said. "The Great Adventure activities planned consist of: The Amazing Hat Making Shop, a cake walk, free popcorn, balloons and food, Robotic Systems Joint Project Office will be in attendance with their robots, Amazing Baby Room, inflatables, information tables, Kid ID, and much more."

Justus' favorite thing about the fun fair is "The smiles, giggles and delights of children and their families," she said.
