Advocacy: the voice of small business in government

North Carolina

North Carolina's 778,027 small businesses provide economic opportunities to diverse groups of people and bring innovative products and services to the marketplace.* This profile from the Office of Advocacy compiles the latest facts and figures on the status and role of small business in the state. (Note that a small business is defined here as one with fewer than 500 employees.)

• North Carolina had 173,409 small employers in 2006, representing 98.1% of the state's employers and 48.6% of its privatesector employment.

• The health care and social assistance industry was the state's largest small business employer in 2006; manufacturing was the largest overall employer (Table 1).

• Small businesses created 54.8% of the state's net new jobs from 2004 to 2005 (Table 2).

• North Carolina's real gross state product increased by 2.2% in 2007. By comparison, growth in the Southeast region was 1.5% and the United States, 2.0%. (Source: U.S. Dept. of Commerce: Bureau of Economic Analysis)
