Advocacy: the voice of small business in government

Wisconsin

Wisconsin's 439,190 small businesses provide economic opportunities to diverse groups of people and bring innovative products and services to the marketplace.* This profile from the Office of Advocacy compiles the latest facts and figures on the status and role of small business in the state. (Note that a small business is defined here as one with fewer than 500 employees.)

- Wisconsin had 115,541 small employers in 2006, representing 98.0% of the state's employers and 53.4% of its private-sector employment.
- The manufacturing industry was the state's largest small business and overall employer in 2006 (Table 1).
- Small businesses created all of the state's net new jobs from 2004 to 2005 (Table 2).
- Wisconsin's real gross state product increased by 1.0% in 2007. By comparison, growth in the Great Lakes regon was 0.5% and the United States, 2.0%. (Source: U.S. Dept. of Commerce: Bureau of Economic Analysis)
