

Import Value & Collections

Import value was \$1.98 Trillion at Year End FY 2010.

On a Typical Day, CBP:
Processes \$5.4 Billion in
Imports
&
Collects an estimated \$87
Million in duties, fees and
taxes

- The total import value for FY 2010 increased by 15.79%
 - Entry volume also increased by 9.6% as the economy rebounded from the severe global recession
- CBP collected an estimated \$31.75 Billion in duties, fees and taxes during FY 2010
- This is an increase in duty collections of 7.63% compared to the previous year
- CBP also collected an estimated \$293 Million in Anti-Dumping and deposits in FY 2010

Entry Processing

CBP interacted with 756,119 importers/consignees in FY 2010.

- The top 3000 of these consignees accounted for 76% of all import value and 55% of all entries
- CBP also processed a projected 28.3 Million Entry Summaries in FY 2010
- A typical Entry is first screened for examination prior to receiving conditional release from CBP
- An Entry Summary is then filed, at which time the import data is finalized and duty collections are made
