PREFACE

The Statistical Abstract of the United States, published annually since 1878, is the standard summary of statistics on the industrial, social, political, and economic organization of the United States. This book is designed to fulfill two functions: First, to serve as a convenient volume for statistical reference; and second, to serve as a guide to other statistical publications and sources.

The Statistical Abstract of the United States includes a representative selection of data from most of the important statistical publications, both governmental and private. These source publications are noted at the foot of each table. The publications cited usually contain additional statistical detail and a more complete discussion of relevant definitions and concepts than can be presented here. Where contributing agencies are cited as sources, without mention of publications, more detailed information frequently is available from their unpublished tabulations and records.

Emphasis in the *Statistical Abstract* is given primarily to national data. Data for regions and individual States are presented to a lesser extent. Data for cities or other geographic units appear only in a small number of instances.

1955 edition.—This edition, the seventy-sixth annual issue, presents data for the most recent year or period available during the early part of 1955. The title year "1955" refers both to the year during which compilation of the book was made and the year of publication.

Each year, an attempt is made to introduce new subject material of interest, data that are less timely are eliminated, and format and text changes are made where necessary. This year the text notes for the first half of the volume were revised to make them more comprehensive and consistent. The format of the Bibliography of Sources was extensively revised to improve readability. A number of new charts were included. In addition, many new tables were introduced.

There are, in addition, new tables on a number of other subjects.

Among tables shown in the last edition, 47 were omitted from this issue. Major omissions occurred in the Area and Population section and in the Labor Force, Employment, and Earnings section affecting 1950 Census of Population data; in the Vital Statistics, Health, and Nutrition section, affecting infant births and deaths; in the Forests and Forest Products section, affecting data on production of laths, shingles, and cooperage stock; and in the Foreign Commerce section, affecting data on aid programs shown for shipments and authorizations by commodity groups. Some of the information in the omitted tables was absorbed in other tables still present.

Supplements to the Abstract.—The Statistical Abstract, as an annual one-volume publication, is of necessity limited in amount of detail shown. Businessmen, teachers, librarians, public officials, professional workers, market researchers, and others often require data for individual cities, counties, metropolitan areas, and other small areas as well as for States. Economists, teachers, social scientists, historians, students, and others frequently need more historical information. To meet such requests for more detail, a series of supplements to the Abstract has been issued.

The County and City Data Book, 1952, a small-area supplement, issued in May 1953, brings together 128 items of information for each county, standard metropolitan area, and State; and 133 items for each of 484 cities with 25,000 inhabitants or more in 1950. Most of the statistics in this volume were obtained from the results of the 1950 Censuses of Agriculture, Population, and Housing. Other subjects covered include 1950 data for births, deaths, and marriages; bank deposits and E Bond sales; city government finances and employment; city school systems; farm-operator family level-of-living index; and other items of social and economic importance. Final figures for a number of items from the 1948 Census of Business and the 1947 Census of Manufactures are also shown. This volume is on sale by the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D. C., for \$4.25.

Historical Statistics of the United States, 1789–1945, a historical supplement, was published in July 1949. This volume presents, in compact form, approximately 3,000 statistical time series (mostly on an annual basis) which cover various periods from 1789 to 1945. These time series reflect economic, social, and political aspects of the development of the Nation since the Federal Government was formally established. In the preparation of this supplement the Bureau of the Census had the cooperation of a special committee of the Social Science Research Council set up to advise the Director of the Census on a source book of historical statistics and of the Committee on Research in Economic History under the auspices of the Social Science Research Council. This volume is on sale by the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D. C., for \$3.25.

Continuation to 1952 of Historical Statistics of the United States, 1789-1945, issued in May 1954, presents data for 1946 to 1952 for the current series shown in Historical Statistics, mentioned above. It also contains the latest revisions for many of the series in Historical Statistics. This publication is also on sale by the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D. C., for 55 cents.


