Economic Development and Entrepreneurship in Indian Country

- I see two separate but related lines of research:
 - Indian Country
 - American Indians (regardless of location)



Figure 1 shows where, according to the 2000 census, Indians in Minnesota live.³ In 2000, about 23 percent of the Minnesota Indian population lived on reservations. Approximately 20 percent of the population lived in the county in which the reservation is located, referred to as the "adjacent county" in Figure 1. Slightly more than 32 percent of the Minnesota Indian population lived in Hennepin or Ramsey County. Finally, nearly 25 percent of the Minnesota Indian population population lived elsewhere in the state.

Economic Development--Entrepreneurship

- 2010 Census data show majority of American Indians live off reservations.
- 2006-2010 ACS data show higher unemployment rates and lower incomes by American Indians.
- Published SBO data show businesses have lower levels of receipts, payroll, and employment.
- Some cities (Anchorage, Tulsa, Albuquerque, and Oklahoma City) offer interesting potential for research because of high rates of Indian population and high numbers of observations as well.
- Other cities (NY, LA, etc.) have high numbers of Indians living in these cities, but they are very small proportions of the people living there.



Lots of room to make significant contributions!

- Current state of our knowledge of American Indian Businesses and Indian Country business activity is quite limited.
- SBO microdata within the RDCs and CES can be used to study American Indian Business Owners (on and off reservations)
- SBO PUMS data offer some potential for research on American Indian Business Owners
- NETS data offer some possibilities on business activity on Indian reservations if we have location maps or zip codes for reservations
