Key Contributions to Indian Country

- Key programs managed by the BLM-Montana/Dakotas State Office are important to Indian Country
- Branches of Solid Minerals, Oil and Gas, Lands,
 Cadastral Survey, Biological Resources & Planning,
 Fire & Recruitment/Outreach work with Tribes
- BLM employees in these disciplines are technical experts & specialists (geologists, adjudication specialists, petroleum engineers) & train for Tribal Trust responsibilities

BLM Takes Trust Responsibilities Seriously

- Trust responsibilities in the Oil & Gas Program both on individually owned (allotted) lands & Tribal lands
- Responsibilities start prior to lease issuance & extend through every phase, including plugging & final reclamation
- Both BLM & BIA's roles outlined in national & regional Memorandums of Understanding
- BLM helps ensure correlative rights are protected, royalty payments are made & all operations are conducted according to laws & regulations

Solid Minerals Program

- BLM works with BIA & Tribes on the development of coal & other solid minerals, such as bentonite
- BLM provides technical expertise for Indian Mineral Development Act Agreements & works closely with BIA & Tribes to ensure mining operations are conducted according to laws & regulations
- BLM State & Field Office specialists conduct inspections on mineral material operations on reservations throughout Montana, North Dakota & South Dakota



Cadastral Survey Program

- BLM conducts cadastral surveys to ensure accurate Tribal land ownership boundaries on 15 reservations throughout Montana/Dakotas
- BLM has Bureau Indian Land Surveyors (BILS) who coordinate this work & State Office Cadastral Survey staff is involved in these surveys
- Establishing accurate land ownership is fundamental to ensuring that land owners receive benefits

Cadastral Survey Program

- As the agency responsible for issuing patents for all federal agencies, including BIA, BLM lands adjudicators process hundreds of Indian patents annually
- Tribal members make requests through BIA for Trust and/or fee patents. The issuance of a fee patent allows an individual to receive full fee title to the land, rather than the land being held in Trust by the BIA
- Sometimes this process triggers the need for a cadastral survey, so these staffs work closely together. In FY2011, BLM has processed 600 Indian patents in the Montana/Dakotas

Recruitment, Outreach & Partnerships

- National & local recruitment efforts aim to increase public awareness & representation of minorities, women & people with disabilities
- Employs about 750 employees at the height of field season--30 employees are Native American
- Economic impact of employing these 30 individuals is \$1,297,000 per annum
- Student Program recruits Native Americans into the BLM--total of 39 students this year & 10 are Native Americans
- Economic impact of employing these 10 students
 \$277,000 per annum

Recruitment, Outreach & Partnerships

- BLM Native American Program Managers attend job/career fairs & visit Tribal schools, colleges & organizations
- Partnerships allow Native American students to learn about BLM, provide valuable job experience & opportunity to earn college credit
- BLM benefits too--needed field work gets done
 & maybe one day they'll choose a career with us



Tribal Consultation

- 20 Tribal governments in 3-state area & additional I0 Tribal governments from other states have aboriginal territories or other interests in BLM-administered lands in Montana/Dakotas
- Facilitates economic development by learning about Tribal concerns, needs & opportunities--helps BLM make sound decisions that may impact Tribes
- Goals in consultation are:
 - I) Ensure federally recognized Tribal governments have opportunity to contribute to decisions,
 - 2) Foster a good working relationship between BLM & Tribes &
 - 3) Work with Tribal partners to develop protocols for effective and efficient consultation that will assist BLM managers in making informed decisions.
