A Continent, Not a Country

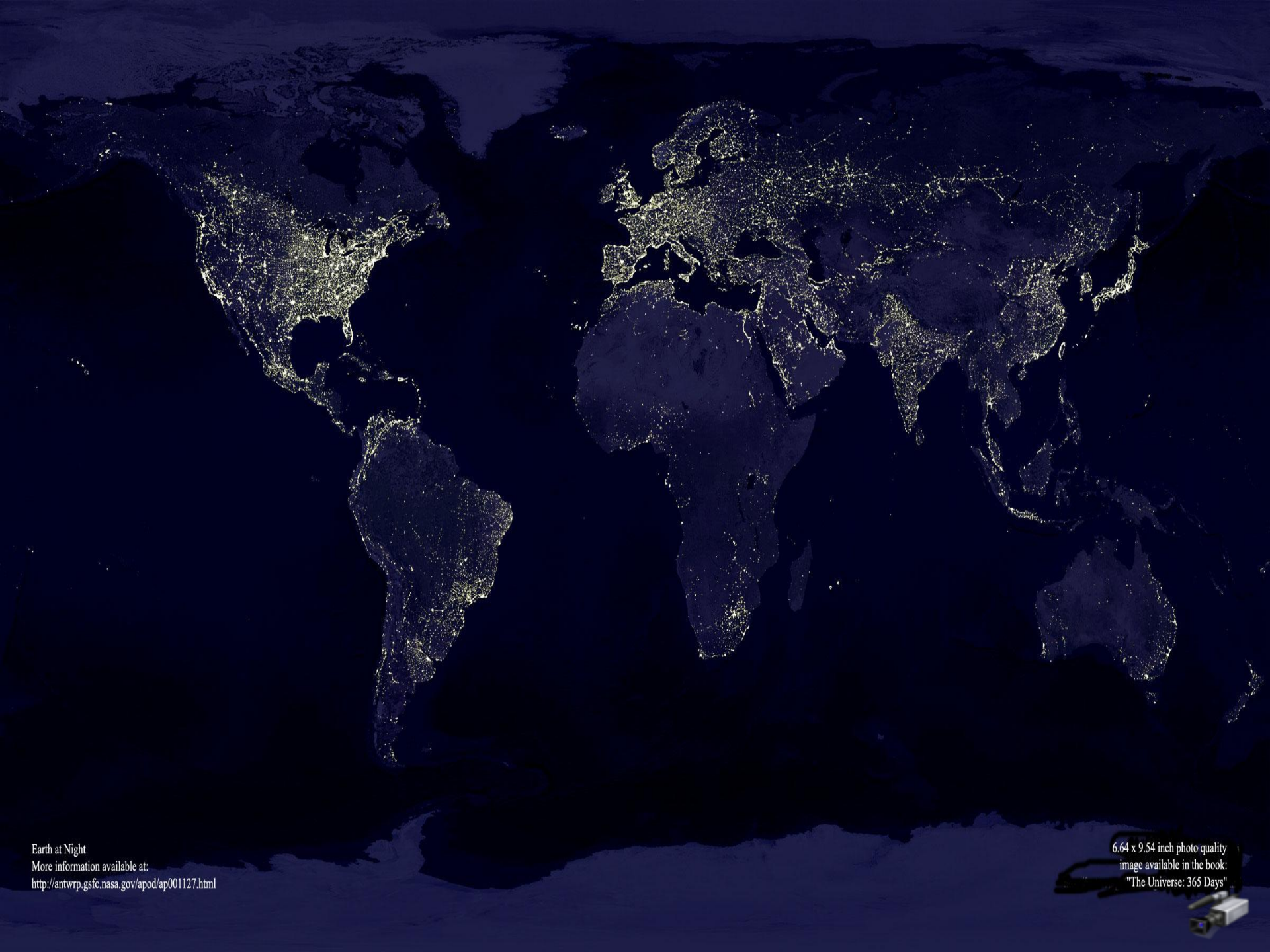
- 11.6 million square miles

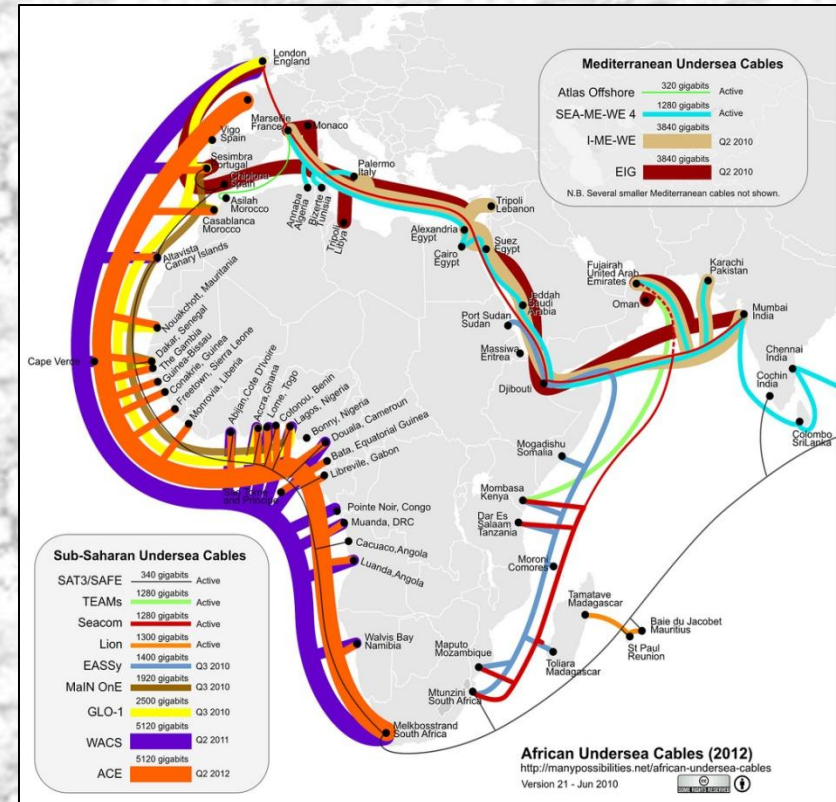

- Transnational threats

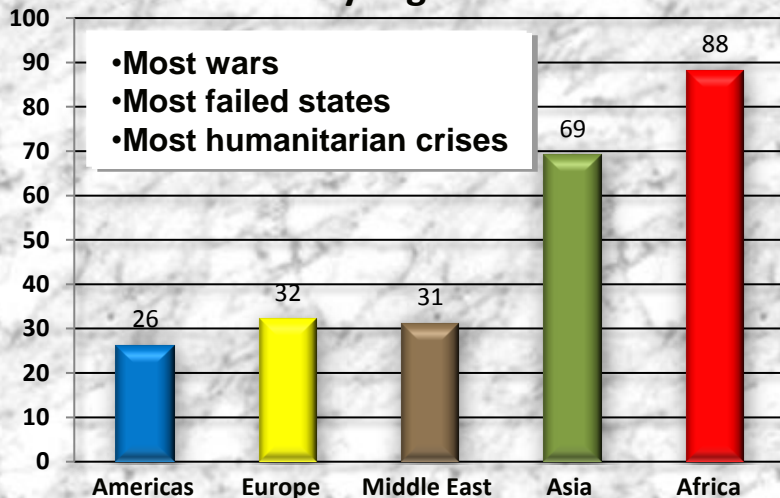

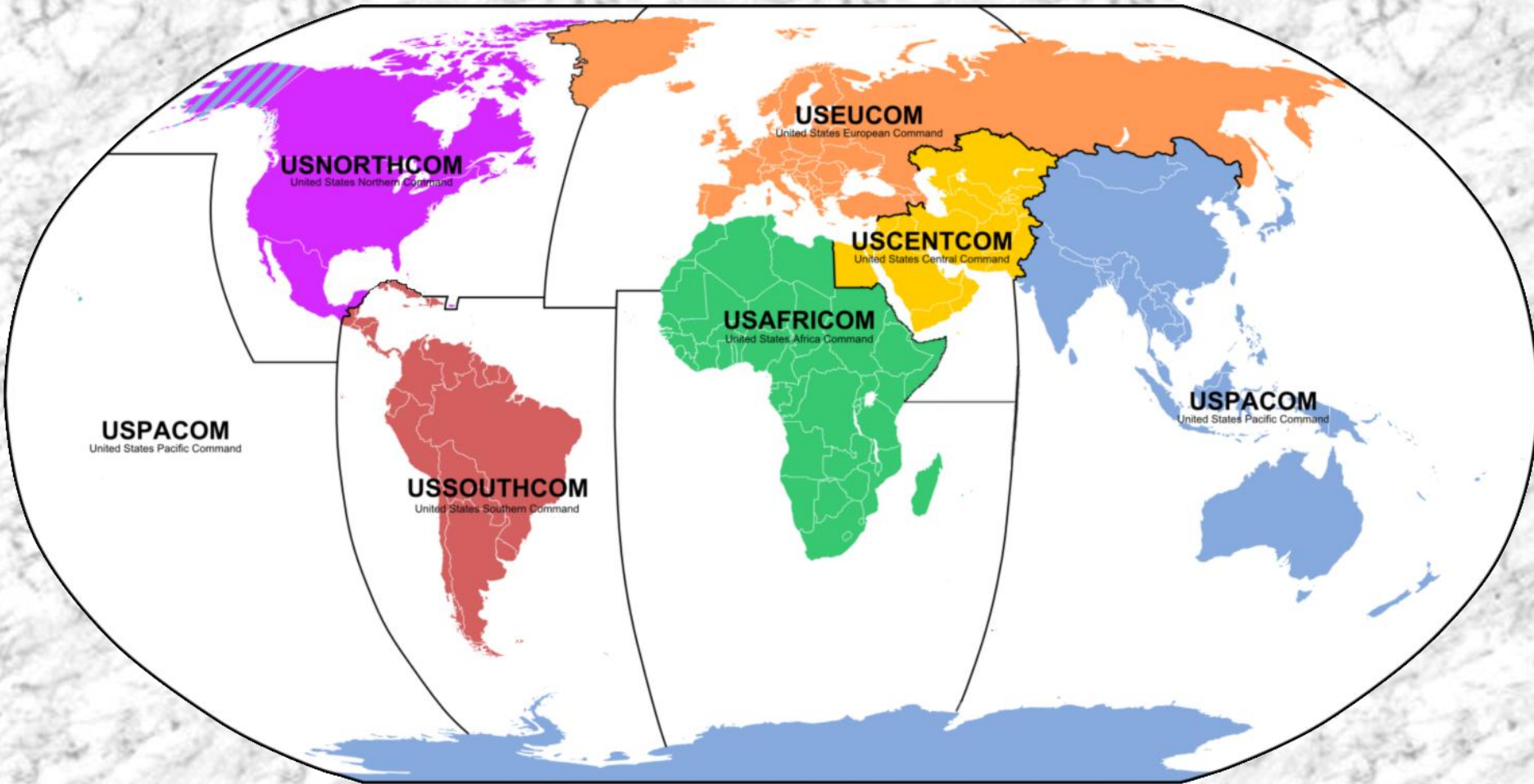

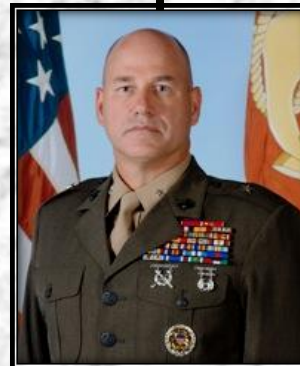

What We Do

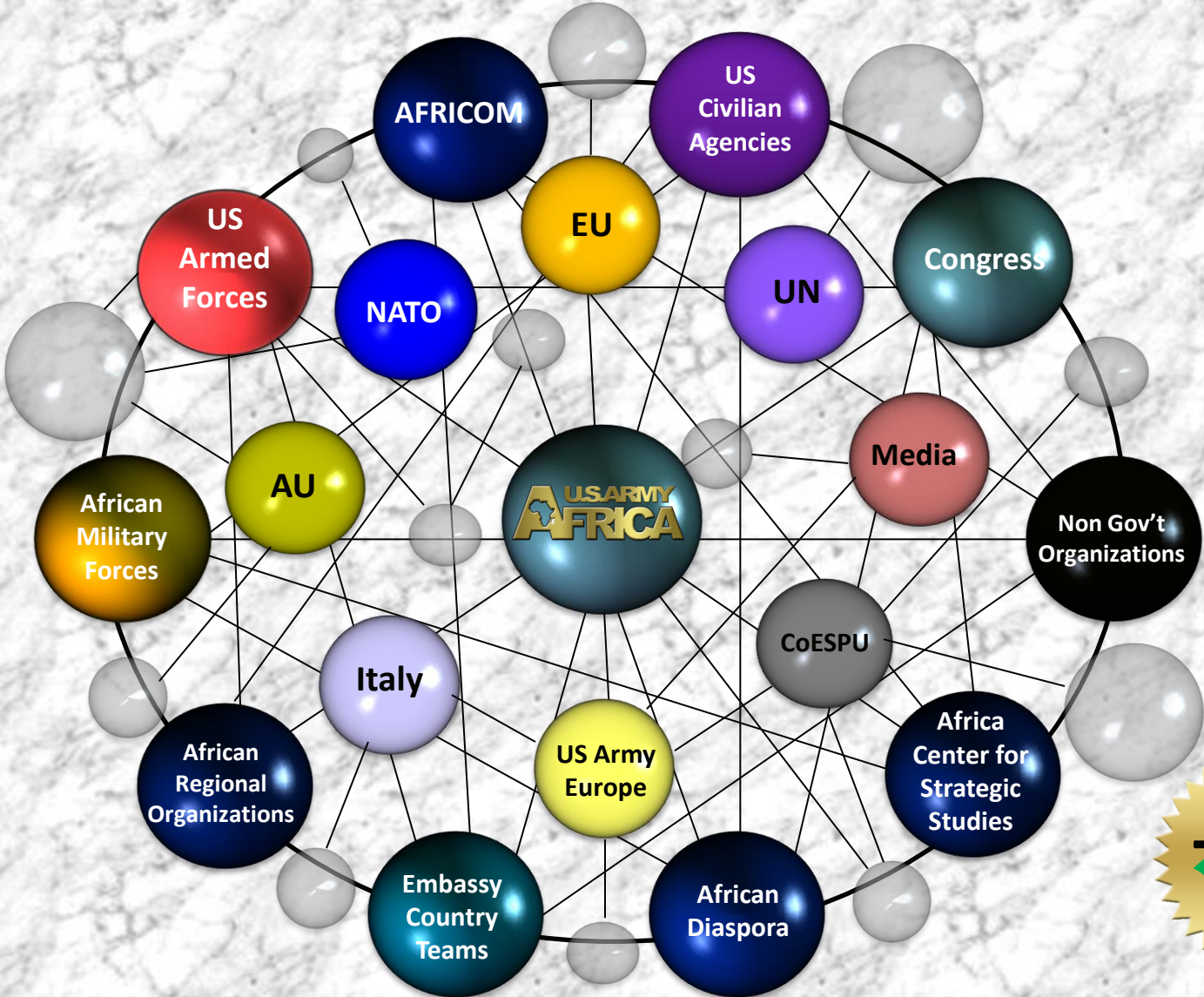
Mission
