Big River Lakes Station.

Big River Lakes station is approximately 20 miles north of Mount Redoubt volcano. Sandy and Mike Coulter have been the aviation and coop observers at Big River Lakes Station for the past two years. Since mid December they have had quite a time with Mount Redoubt eruptions. The snow around the station is covered with numerous layers of volcanic ash and some volcanic rocks. At times the station was showered with lava rocks, some so hot they melted holes in the snow. Shortly after New Years an

eruption of ash produced an electrical storm that pounded the area round the station with lightning bolts. Gale force winds caused up to 2 foot drifts of ash against the cabin walls. On one occasion lava rock, some as big as baseballs, fell from the sky. There have been 11 major eruptions since December. At the present time the volcano is quiet. Is it the lull before the storm? The award was named for President Thomas Jefferson who began taking weather observations in 1776 and maintained a virtually unbroken record through 1816. In 1976, Mr. Gillespie received the John Campanius Holm Award for his long period of outstanding accomplishment in the field of meteorological observations. Mr. Gillespie has been taking observations at Effingham, SC for more than 43 years.

"Happy Faces," that's what Robert W. Mr. Prunty was recipient of the prestigious Thomas Jefferson Award, for his outstanding performance as a cooperative weather observer. Charles Liles, Deputy Meteorologist-in-Charge of the Albuquerque Weather Office made the award presentation to Mr. Prunty at the Red River Community Center with a nice crowd of friends in attendance. Refreshments for the event were served by members of the local ladies' club, which included a large cake decorated in red, white, and blue with inscription, "The Thomas Jefferson Award - 1989," Robert W. Prunty, Red River, NM. Mr. Prunty has been the official observer for more than 33 years. Volunteer weather observing has been a project for the Prunty family during the past 57 years. That's quite an accomplishment of public service and something to be proud of.

Mr. Prunty retired from the United States Postal Service in 1987, while serving as Postmaster for Red River and still remains active in local community affairs.

Since last August special articles were run on television, radio, and in newspapers. Also a national article in "Federal Times" was written about Mr. Prunty's accomplishments. According to Dick Snyder, probably since mid-summer of 1989 about a half-million people in northern New Mexico and southern Colorado saw some or all segments that came through the news media. Prunty's weather station goes back 75 years, the oldest in northern New Mexico he said. Why does he do it? "Just 'cause we live here," he said. Now that the couple is retired, Esther Prunty sometimes talks about giving up the job of monitoring. "I doubt if I do," said Bob Prunty.

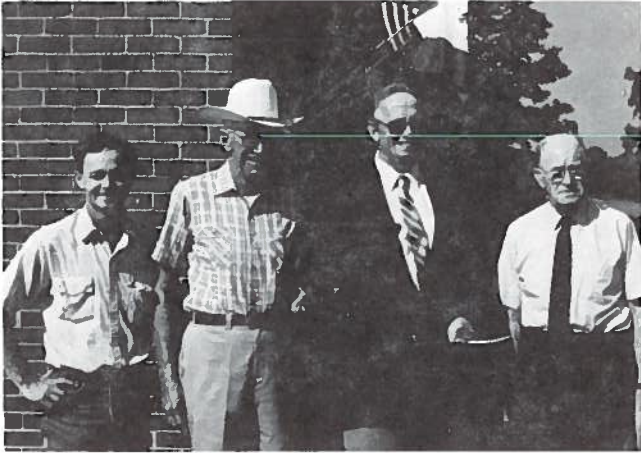

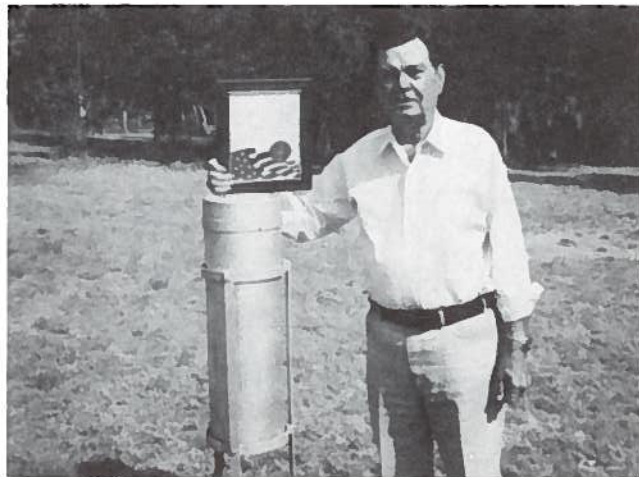
Jimmy R. Kee accepted a 25-year Institutional Award for the city of Lexington, TN. John McBroom, CPM/MEM, made the presentation.

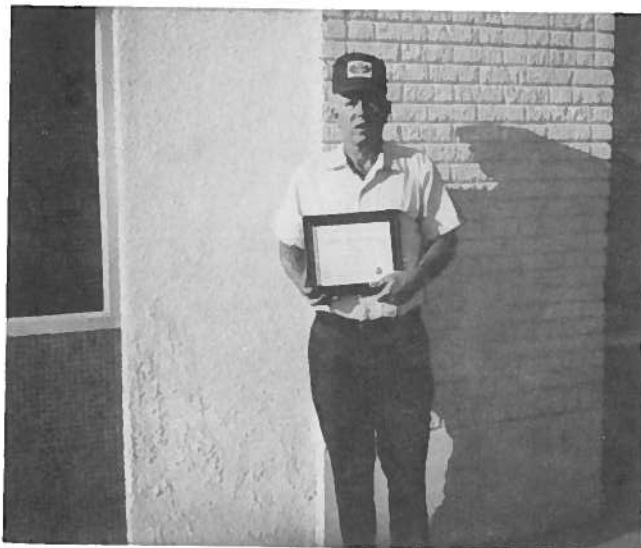

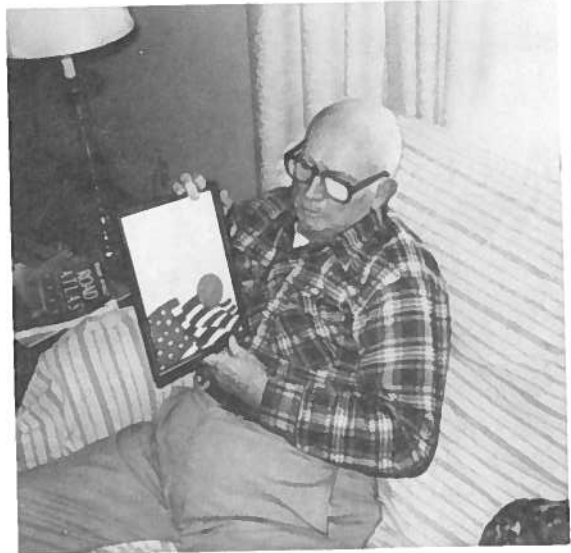

At a recent Wyoming Game and Fish Commission meeting, Heuy Dawson, supervisor of the Sybille Research Unit was presented an award recognizing 25 years of observations in cooperation with the National Weather Service. The Wyoming Game and Fish Sybille Research Unit has become famous as the first home of Black Footed Ferret. It was assumed the Black Footed Ferret was extinct, but recently a small colony was found near Meeteetse in the Big Horn Basin of Wyoming. They were captured and taken to Sybille hoping they could be saved by captive breeding. The program was a success and now there are enough Black Footed Ferrets to distribute to other similar research centers, some zoos, and to reintroduce them back into the wild. Perhaps it could be said the cooperative program played a part in saving this endangered animal. Weather is an important factor in wildlife research and management. The Wyoming Game and Fish has become an enthusiastic partner in collecting weather data. There are five Wyoming Game and Fish installations in the Wyoming Cooperative Program. Sybille and one other are long term stations and three have been established this year.



Richard (Dick) Gunderson was presented a 30-year service award at a meeting of the Yoder Volunteer Fire Department by Ray Kowrach, CPM for Wyoming. Weather observations were already established at the UP Railroad Depot when Dick moved to Yoder; as station agent. He took observations until 1978 when the railroad closed operations in Yoder. Henry E. Cordes (right), Cordes, AZ, received the Jefferson award presented by Norm Hoffman, Deputy Meteorologist in Charge, WSFO Phoenix. Mr. Cordes hasn't missed an observation since he took over the weather reporting responsibilities in 1939. His father started taking weather observations at Cordes in 1925, and publication of the record began in 1926. Mr. Cordes enjoys fishing in the mountains of Arizona's rim country, where summer temperatures rarely exceed the 80's.



Robert Houser, cooperative observer, Mayer, AZ, received a Special Service award. He is also a severe storms spotter for the central Arizona area. Mayer, about 80 miles north of Phoenix, has a relatively cooler climate.



Art Combe, Beaver Dam, AZ, received 10-year length-of-service award. He was involved in climatic observations when a nurseryman in Utah years ago, also. Art has a marvelous "desert arboretum and cacti garden" at his home near the Utah-Arizona border, where this master gardener grows many unusual plants.

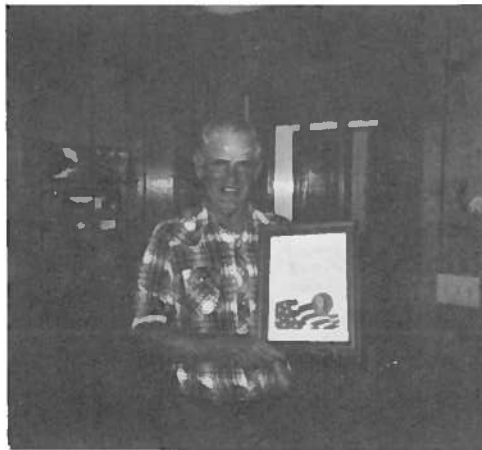
