SSA wins top honors in Europe-wide competition, competes at Army level

In Fiscal Year 1997, the Supply Support Activity here participated for the first time in the Army Supply Excellence Award competition. Not only did they win at the United States Army, Europe level, they won at the Department of the Army level; a feat any unit would be proud to achieve once. praise from both USAREUR and DA since.

From FY 97 to FY 05, SSA has won at the USAREUR level seven out of the nine times they have competed, and one of the two times when they didn't win, they took runner-up.

For the FY 06 competition SSA has done it again, claiming victory at the USAREUR-level. They received their trophy April 4 during a ceremony held in Heidelberg, Germany.

SSA's victory now takes them to the DAlevel, where they placed second last year. At the DA-level, SSA has won three times and been runner-up four times.

"Our goal is to win [at the DA level]," said Chief Warrant Officer Jorge Mercado, accountable officer for SSA, "but even placing runner-up is a major achievement."

Mercado credits all of his workers, both military and civilians, for SSA winning this year and the previous years.

"We have a great group of dedicated professionals that work here on a daily basis and makes it easier for us to compete and win," said Mercado.

That workforce consists of 21 civilians, local nationals, and three Soldiers, including Mercado himself. The leadership includes Gilberto Berdin, who serves as the Local National supervisor for the SSA; Carmen Civarelli, the Stock Control supervisor; and Staff Sgt. Sergio Rosales, the SSA NCOIC.

"I consider these people, instead of employees—I consider them more of a family," said Mercado. "And in any happy family, you're able to achieve great things."

The Equal Employment Opportunity office will be conducting training titled "Avoid the Pitfalls of Discrimination."

This training is for military, civilian and local national supervisors who supervise U.S. civilian employees. In addition, EEO counselors, Special Emphasis Program managers and Equal Opportunity advisors/leaders and Human Resources advisors who need cross training can take the course.

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Cell phone road rules apply on, off-post

and-held phones are safety hazards that have caused many road accidents in Europe. For that reason, the Department of Defense and most European nations have banned the use of hand-held cell phones while driving a motor vehicle.

"These laws are enforced on and off U.S. installations throughout Europe," said Lt. Col. Deborah Anderson, chief of law enforcement operations at the United States Army, Europe office of the provost marshal.

"Studies show that mobile phone use in cars is unsafe," Anderson explained. "Driving safely is a complex task and requires total concentration. Phoning distracts drivers, and any distraction can make you miss hearing or seeing the cues needed to avoid a crash."

Anderson said it is best to switch off the phone as soon as entering the car, but added that people who want to communicate while driving can:

- Buy a "hands free" device that allows the driver to keep both hands on the steering wheel. The device can also be distracting, so short duration calls are recommended.
- Use the voice mail box function and call people back when finished driving.

"It is OK if people use a handheld phone in a vehicle if it is safely parked and the engine is off," Anderson said. "However, penalties for having a cell phone in your hand or wedged between your head and shoulder while driving, even in slow moving traffic, are severe."

"People will suffer heavier penalties and can even lose their license if they caused an accident or were involved in one while using a cell phone improperly," Anderson added

EUCOM J4 representatives are working closely with a Tiger Team headed by Tim Lynch, 2nd Air Postal Squadron, USAFE; Keith Jones, 1st PERSCOM and 21st Theater Support Command G3 on a cost analysis for future operations in Milan.

USAFE is capturing operational/warehouse/handling cost, while 21st TSC provides 1st PERSCOM with the cost to contract transportation. Lynch is establishing timelines and meeting dates. He will contact the postal company within the next 30 days with an update.

Issue Number 04-0128 – DSL Internet in the Barracks

March Update from AAFES: We are currently working Vicenza Barracks phones from two angles. IMA-E has been in negotiations with TKS in Germany to use the cable infrastructure to provide service. This will require a great deal of funding from IMA and TKS to proceed. We are currently waiting on IMA's decision regarding the funding.

If IMA decides not to proceed with the TKS initiative, AAFES will then quickly solicit a

contract for service over phone wire.

Issue Number 05-155 – Post Office Hours March 2006 Update from the 510th Postal Company: We now have approval to change APO hours. The new hours are 10 a.m.-4 p.m. Monday-Friday (note that the old hours of 11 a.m.-2 p.m. on Thursdays will no longer be in effect).

Issue Number 06-278 – Pricing in MWR Facilities

March Update from the Directorate of Morale, Welfare and Recreation: We appreciate your question about how MWR sets prices and we thank you for your concerns about the Vicenza Art Center. We have reviewed the Art Center pricing with special attention to custom framing. As you described, the custom frame pricing is not comparable to off-post pricing.

The most recent IMA-EMWR retail pricing guidelines suggest that the Art Center cover labor and supplies and produce an average profit of 20 percent. The old prices included a much higher markup. Therefore, we are in the process of reducing custom frame prices, especially for material. New custom frame prices will go into effect on April 1, 2006. Because there are thousands of variables related to custom framing, we encourage customers to discuss their frame specifications with Art Center to receive an estimate. We will also be happy to compare the new estimate with the old pricing structure to illustrate the new prices.

MWR also took the opportunity to review all MWR prices based on this CAC issue, to make sure we were offering competitive pricing in all MWR programs. Except for the Art Center custom framing program, all other MWR prices are in line with headquarters guidance and are very competitive with similar programs throughout Army Europe and in our host nation. The garrison commander has approved all MWR prices. We will continue to review our prices quarterly and will report any major

revisions at the monthly CAC meetings.

Again, MWR thanks our customers for their feedback. We encourage you to continue to comparison shop and bring your findings to our attention immediately.

Issue: SETAF Driver's License Renewal - I recently had to renew my ID card and when I did I also had to renew my SETAF driver's license. This is when I found out about the new regulation as of May 2005 that you can not renew or obtain a SETAF driver's license with out a valid states side or Italian driver's license. If this is a new regulation it should have been put out to the community and all senior staff to pass on to their employees or Soldiers. I have been in Italy since 1986 and have no need to maintain a states side driver's license. The old policy stated if you had a valid SETAF drivers license or a valid states side driver license you could renew your license. If this is a new policy then this policy probably affects a lot of the community. So now I have to request an exception to policy from the commander to extend my license for 90 days so I can go out on the economy and get an Italian drivers license. I also will have to pay about 200 euro out of my pocket for this.

Recommendation: Grandfather those who have valid SETAF driver's licenses, put out to the community about this new policy and make a drop dead date when this policy comes into effect

Response from the Directorate of Emergency Services: We welcome the opportunity to answer this issue. The current policy to renew a SETAF license is as follows. Personnel with a valid SETAF license do not have to have a current Stateside or country license to renew their SETAF license. The only time a current stateside license or country license is required is when applying for an initial license or if the SETAF license is already expired. A change to USASETAF 190-2 will soon be published to reflect this change.

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Scarlet fever deserves respect, not fear

carlet fever. It once was a childhood disease that annually killed thousands in the United States. But today's strains aren't nearly as aggressive and can be treated relatively easily, said the Army's top pediatrician in

Lt. Col. Robert Smith, Europe Regional Medical Command's pediatric consultant and commander of the Mannheim health clinic, said parents no longer have to face the same fears of the disease that, perhaps, their grandparents did.

"It (the bacteria that causes scarlet fever) used to be a very virulent disease that caused more complications," Smith said. "The strains now don't seem to be nearly as dangerous."

Scarlet fever is caused by the Group A streptococcal bacteria that cause the more common "strep throat." But with scarlet fever, the bacterium creates a toxin that attacks skin cells, causing them to turn red. It is distinguishable by a red rash that begins around the throat and on the chest that, if untreated, spreads rapidly to the trunk and extremities.

"It's a treatable disease because it responds well to penicillin," Smith said. "We've seen about the average number of cases this year – I haven't seen a lot of it. But, parents should be aware of the disease and become familiar with the symptoms."

He said a child coming down with the fever will likely feel sick and complain of a sore throat and headaches. Other symptoms include the rash, which begins to develop after about 24 hours, and nausea and vomiting.

Children between two and 12 are most susceptible to contracting the disease. He said it was rare for preschoolers to get it, and older children have built up a partial immunity

"About 10 percent of children who come down with strep throat will develop scarlet fever," Smith said. He said the number fluctuates, too. "It comes and goes. Some years it's 10 percent, some it's 20."

Once doctors diagnose a child with the disease, the treatment consists of fever reducers, like ibuprofen or Tylenol, and a 10day regimen of penicillin. Smith said the penicillin should be taken all ten days, until it is used up. Parents should also remember not to share medications with others in the family, or stop giving the doses just because the child feels better.

"After treatment begins, a child will begin to look and feel better after two or three days. They can return to school after they've been taking the penicillin for 24 hours," he said. "It's not like chicken pox, where the parents have to keep the child home for 10-14 days."

He did urge parents, though, to take the disease seriously and get treatment for their children.

"If a child complains of being sick, it's usually because they are," Smith said. "They're not like adults who have been known to claim illness to get out of going to work. If children are sick, they'll let you know.'

He said parents can teach their children some basic personal hygiene tips, like washing hands, coughing or sneezing into a tissue or the crook of an elbow, and maintaining a proper diet. The bacterium behind scarlet fever is spread by coughing and sneezing, he said.

"People get things from people," Smith said. "If everyone stayed home, we'd be fine. But since we do go out and interact with others, we just need to be aware of the illnesses out there, and seek treatment when the first signs of something appear."

Suspected gunfire near post proven false

A recent incident where a car window was supposedly shattered by gunfire while coming onto Caserma Ederle has proven to have been caused by other factors.

On April 3, a vehicle was entering the post onto the deceleration lane of gate one when its rear window shattered. A military policeman, thinking he heard gunfire, hit a panic button raising emergency vehicle barriers and stopping all traffic coming on or off post.

American military police and Caribinieri quickly reacted to the situation and conducted a preliminary investigation. No evidence was found that shots were fired. The vehicle involved was taken to a Carabinieri station for a more thorough investigation.

American and Italian investigators conducted a follow-up investigation of the vehicle and the area of the incident. No signs of a projectile making impact were found on the vehicle and no shell casings were found in the vicinity.

It was determined by the investigators that a severe thunderstorm in the area at the time of the incident caused the sounds suspected of being gunfire. Also, pressure changes caused by the storm were the possible cause of the window shattering.

ertain situations in life can instill a sense of the unknown – of not knowing what to do next. Being sexually assaulted is one of those situations. A frightening experience, sexual assault can leave people with the inability to carry on with their lives. This feeling can be combated and avoided with the proper knowledge.

April is Sexual Assault and Child Abuse Awareness month, and awareness is exactly what Tina Helmick, Sexual Assault Response Coordinator, wants the community to have.

Helmick conducts classes on the Sexual Assault Prevention and Response program for Vicenza and the surrounding area to

ensure everyone from servicemembers to DA civilians know how to prevent and respond to a sexual assault.

Tips on how to prevent sexual assault is one of the subjects Staff Sgt. Juan Barrios, a Unit Victim Advocate for the 1st Battalion, 508th Infantry (Airborne) always covers with his Soldiers. Using the "Buddy System" and knowing exactly who the person they are with is, is something always covered in weekend briefings, said Barrios. As a UVA, Barrios also helps Helmick get the information out by setting up classes for her to speak at and serves as a first-line contact for victims.

All UVA's receive training on a quarterly basis, said Helmick. The training is broken up into various modules that cover everything the UVA needs to know to assist

UVA's always have the necessary information standing by in folders, known as "Ready Folders," said Sgt. 1st Class Felicia Fisher, a UVA with 208th Finance Battalion, to help any victim. These "Ready Folders" have various information inside, from personal rights and reporting options to contact numbers for chaplain services, which victims need to know and are entitled to have.

The first thing all victims need to know is it is not their fault, said Helmick, and they can call her or any of the UVA's, they are not limited in having to call their own UVA.

Once they contact a UVA or SARC, victims also have the option of requesting between two types of reports for the incident. These two types are restricted and unrestricted reports. In restricted reporting, once the SARC or UVA is contacted, the victim is allowed to confidentially talk about the assault with the SARC, and receive medical treatment and counseling if requested, all without triggering an investigation or notification to their command, said Helmick. Medical treatment for the Vicenza community is provided but not limited to the Birthing Pavilion located on post, which is open 24 hours, and provides a secure environment for victims. Victims can also go to the Birthing Pavilion for immediate emergency care if necessary and pursue the restricted reporting from there, Helmick added. Emergency care can also be attained at the Health Clinic but doing so will automatically begin the unrestricted reporting, she said.

Unrestricted reporting is when the command is notified and an investigation is initiated, which includes the involvement of Military Police and the Criminal Investigation Department, said Helmick. The victim will not have to endure this by themselves though, as a UVA will be assigned to help them through the entire process.

Whatever type of reporting the victim chooses to pursue, Helmick always recommends to victims to preserve all evidence and not to feel ashamed. The preservation of evidence is so that in case of an investigation, the authorities will be able to prosecute those responsible.

All of this information is something Helmick and all of her UVA's will continue to relay to individuals in the Vicenza community and the surrounding area on a more continuous basis.

Sgt. 1st Class Dolores Hernandez, a UVA with the Vicenza Health Clinic, said Sexual Assault Training used to be covered only twice a year by units. Now, with the more constant training, the community as a whole is more educated, aiding in not only informing potential victims, but in deterring would-be assailants as well.



Transportation tips for soon-to-be travelers

After a year-long deployment, a brand new gas grill and a 36 inch television can make the transition of going back into a normal work environment that much easier. But for many of the returning servicemembers and their families, the time enjoying those new luxury items in Italy may be limited. Many, along with other servicemembers and civilians from the surrounding area, will soon be PCSing (Permanent Change of Station) back to the United States and all of their items are going with them.

Ensuring all those items are packaged and sent to the servicemember's next duty location is the duty of the Installation Transportation Office here. An estimated 4,000 pack-outs are expected this summer, said Marvin Key, ITO supervisor. An equal amount is expected to be coming in, he added. In order to more easily accommodate this, ITO is beginning daily Personal Property Mass Briefings. These briefings will include information on inbound and outbound worksheets, custom worksheets and all documents needed by servicemembers and civilians to make their move easier.

Key also recommends transitioning personnel and their spouses attend the briefings together. Most of the time, the spouse is the one present for pick-up, said Key. By the spouses attending, ITO can better explain the process to them, he added.

Before coming to ITO, the first thing people need are their orders. "We need the orders," said Karen Juli, acting chief, Transportation Division, Directorate of Logistics. "We can't do anything without

Servicemembers must also ensure that when they bring the copy of the orders, it has both the front and back side to it, she adds. That is mostly because the fund site is located on the back of the orders and is a necessary part of processing the servicemember's request. It is important to start this process as soon as possible, she said.

"Ideally, 30 days prior [to departure] is good," said Juli, when speaking about when servicemembers should come to ITO, although 40 or 60 days prior is also acceptable. "There have been cases when servicemembers come in with their orders one week and say they need to leave the following week," she said.

One way servicemembers can avoid this is by speaking to their unit personnel representative (S1) or to the 510th Personnel Services Battalion about getting their orders, especially if they know they will

"The sooner the servicemember brings the orders to us the easier the process," said Juli. Since the office here is only a processing station, all requests go up to the Consolidated Personnel Property Shipping Office located in Grafenwoehr, Germany. CPPSO are the ones that book the carriers, she said, and that is why the sooner the servicemember comes in, the better.

Another way the servicemember can make the whole process easier for themselves and the ITO is by having an idea of the estimate weight of all their items, know what dates they want pick-up and bringing a strip map of how to get to their home.

A good way to estimate the weight, said Juli, is by giving each room in your house an automatic 1,000 pound weight, then multiply that by how many rooms you have.

"If they know how much they brought [from the states]," said Juli, is another way of knowing how much weight you will be sending

Servicemembers and civilians must also remember how much weight they are allowed to ship. For servicemembers, this weight is determined by their rank, number of dependents and their time OCONUS, said Key. In some cases, servicemembers spend 18 months in Germany then move to Italy and spend another 18 months here, said Key. When it comes time to PCS, those servicemember's put down 18 months when estimating their allowed weight, but in reality should be putting 36 months, said Key. This is because the entire time spent OCONUS, not just in one location, is what determines your allowed weight.

For civilians, their allowed weight is easier to determine, said Key. Civilians are always authorized an automatic 18,000 lbs. An additional 350 lbs are authorized for unaccompanied baggage, he added.

Knowing what dates you want the pick-up to be is useful because you have to be there when the movers come, said Juli. An agent can charge for a missed pick-up, she added. If you want a certain date for pick-up, but can not be there for it, you can have someone else there representing you such as your spouse or roommate, said Juli. No power of attorney is needed, just a written document given to ITO containing the name of the person who will be at the pick-up on your behalf.

The pick-up cannot occur of course, if the movers do not know where you live or how to get there, said Juli.

"The exact area you live in is needed," said Key, emphasizing many servicemembers automatically believe they live in Vicenza because that is the location of post. The correct city or town is necessary since many of the surrounding cities have identical street names.

If you live in the downtown area, providing driving directions to the transportation office is extremely important, said Juli. This is because many areas downtown do not have sufficient parking areas for the trucks and planning arrangements must be made beforehand.

Transitioning personnel must be mindful of Italian holidays, when movers do not work, said Key. On certain holidays that fall on Tuesdays, the Monday before it may only have a limited crew working. That is because some of the workers may take an extended weekend with the holiday, he added.

Being aware of local holidays helps in choosing a more convenient day, an added plus considering summer is the peak time for the transportation office, said Key. It can take from 45 to 55 days for a shipment to the east coast to arrive, 70 to 75 days for the west coast, he added. If a POV (Privately Owned Vehicle) is being shipped, it is imperative the servicemember schedule a shipping date with ITO, said Key. Many servicemembers do not want to rent a vehicle when they get back, in which case they need to send their vehicles immediately so they can be waiting for them when they arrive, said Key.

For servicemembers who want to have their POV and or household items sent to offline places (outside the United States) either because of retirement or ETS, local taxes may have to be paid, said Key. As soon as the shipment arrives at the desired location, the servicemember may be required to pay the taxes, and their shipment can be held until they pay the amount, he added. This amount can be in the thousands, depending on the size of the shipment. More importantly, it can take up to two months for the government to acquire a company that will ship the items to the location, said Key, so it is important individuals wanting to do this come in and set it up in plenty of time before they leave. In case the shipment is over the allowed weight, ETSing servicemembers must pay on-the-spot, said Key. Retiring Soldiers may have the amount taken from their monthly pay, he added.

Transporting all of your household items does not have to be a big pain. With the right planning and preparation, it can go smoothly. The more smoothly the transportation goes, the more enjoyment from using that new gas grill and 36 inch TV will be.

Tips & Facts

- ♦ Be sure to bring a copy of your orders (front & back)
- ♦ Bring a strip map of how to get to your house with exact names of the street and town/city
- ♦ Have an estimated weight amount of all your household items before coming
- ♦ If you need to ship a POV, ensure it has an EPA sticker (EPA sticker not necessary for vehicles 25 years and older)
- ♦ POV cannot have more than two spare tires and a fourth of the gas tank full
- ♦ If you have any antiques, have the necessary customs forms filled out
- ♦ Have a planned pick-up date, being mindful of Italian holidays when movers do not work
- ♦ Estimate the weight of your professional gear and let ITO know this amount, since the weight of your professional gear does not count towards your overall weight allowed
- ♦ If sending your shipment to an offline area (outside the states), notify ITO immediately. Acquiring a company to ship to some offline areas can take up to two months
- ♦ Bring your spouse to the mass briefings, especially if they will be the one there for the pick up
- ♦ Servicemembers receive up to 180 days of storage time; civilians receive 90 days
