USAG HHC Soldiers revisit historic battlefield

Soldiers from U.S. Army Garrison Vicenza Headquarters and Headquarters Company were given a special guided tour of a World War I battlefield by

Col. Aldo Rando, Italian officer Hungarian Army. earlier this month.

Italian lines were broken and more than 650,000 Italian lives were lost in the 1917 Battle of Caporetto. Clearly a tragic defeat for the Italians, they had but one last chance to halt the advancement of the Austrian-

This successful halt came During World War I, the at Plave River to Vicenza east and Monte Grappa to the north. Monte Grappa overlooks the entire Veneto Region and was a key stronghold for the Italians during WWI. The peak was situated perfectly to establish a headquarters that not only

aided in the control Italy's entire 4th Army but also provided a strategic 360-degree-view of the Italian front line.

Three significant battles took place on the mountain top, simply named; the Halting Battle, the Defensive Battle, and the Offensive Battle. From

Army Family Covenant: The commitment endures over time

Four years ago this month, the Army announced the Army Family Covenant, which promised to provide Soldiers and Families a quality of life commensurate with their service.

To help Soldiers and Families stressed

by years of war, the Army substantially increased funding for programs in areas such as Soldier and Family services, behavioral health, housing, child care, education, and employment.



Today, headlines about defense budget cuts are prompting people to ask whether the Army is going to keep its promises.

The short answer is yes. Leaders change and situations change, but the Army's commitment to Soldiers and Families endures.

Under the AFC, the Army developed and enhanced a range of programs that build Soldier and Family strength, resilience and readiness. These programs include Survivor Outreach Services, Child, Youth and School Services, New Parent Support, the Military Spouse Employment Program, Strong Bonds, and the Wounded Warriors Sports Program.

Under the AFC, the Army has provided new and renovated housing for thousands of Families and single Soldiers, and constructed more than 150 new child care and youth centers. The Army has increased the number of Military Family Life Consultants, who provide confidential non-medical counseling for Soldiers and Families, and the number of behavioral health care providers, who provide behavioral health services before, during and after deployment.

Under the AFC, the Army has worked hard to reach the whole Army Family, including geographically dispersed Soldiers and Family members. Toward that end, the Army supports a number of services away from installations, such as community-based child care and Army National Guard Family Assistance Centers, and provides Army OneSource, which enables 24/7 access to information and services regardless of location. At a time when the Army is restoring its

balance, the AFC has been the catalyst for enhancing and standardizing the quality of support for Soldiers and Families. And now it is time to ensure our investment has made a difference in the lives of Soldiers and Families. Program review has been built into the Army Family Covenant from day one. It has always been part of the AFC plan to assess program effectiveness, consolidate, and make adjustments, to ensure there is no overlap or gaps between programs.

So the current fiscal situation does not change our course but it does put more gas in our tank. It intensifies the need to streamline and make sure we continue to provide the most valuable programs.

For the programs under the AFC umbrella, the majority of which are run by Installation Management Command, customer feedback is a critical part of our ongoing evaluation. We gather customer feedback partly by looking at which services are used most often, and partly by asking customers about their experiences, through garrison focus groups and surveys such as the Army

OneSource Army Family Covenant survey, just completed Sept. 1.

We will be asking for feedback again in January, when Soldiers, Family members, civilians and retirees will receive a survey on their needs, usage and satisfaction with Family and Morale, Welfare and Recreation programs. I urge everyone to take this and every other opportunity to tell us about the programs and services that are valuable to you. Your feedback impacts decisions about programming.

Like every other government organization, every business, and every family, we are taking a close look at our use of resources during this time of fiscal uncertainty. We have to determine the most efficient, most effective ways to reach out to the entire Army Family and provide support in the areas of greatest need. But we are starting from a clear, non-negotiable bottom line: the Army will keep its promise to Soldiers and Families.

By using energy conservation you are 'efficient' all year long

Energy Awareness month is about to end, but this does not mean that our commitment to the environment is over. Let's save energy all year long.

Our U.S. Army Garrison commander's environmental policy sets the main environmental aspects that should be focused on: energy conservation, recycling and hazardous waste disposal. To successfully accomplish our environmental objectives the community must get involved.

There is also an energy and water conservation policy that stresses the garrison's and individuals' responsibility to participate in the national effort to conserve energy and water resources. Try to focus on a few simple actions to save a lot of energy through

out the year. That way, Caserma Ederle will fulfill the policy expectations and manage our resources to support current and future mission requirements.

- 70° Fahrenheit (21°Celsius) is the maximum temperature during the heating season.
- Keep windows and doors shut when the heat or air conditioning is on.
- Check weather stripping around windows, doors, and window air coolers. Have them installed or replaced if necessary.
- Have exterior door latches adjusted to ensure doors close tightly.
- Light is energy. Use or reflect solar heating as required. Open blinds and curtains during the heating months to allow the sun to assist in heating requirements.
- Do not put furniture in front of return air intakes that will obstruct airflow to furnaces and air conditioning units in the building.
- Limit use of equipment and appliances to the minimum needed. Turn off or disconnect energy-consuming appliances when not in use.
- Use minimum wattage light bulbs. When possible substitute fluorescent-equivalent lumen output lamps to replace standard incandescent lamps of a higher wattage.

Give this year's Energy Awareness Month theme a meaning: "Turn words into action; turn action into results." Be good to the environment, to your world and to our community. Save energy all year long.

Halloween fun for all ages in local community this weekend

Caserma Ederle is preparing for the thrills and chills of Halloween, which will be celebrated at Villaggio Monday, with activities from 3:30-8 p.m.

The fun kicks off on Villaggio with carnival games from 3:30-6 p.m. The games include a Howl at the Moon contest, Twister, mummy wrap, a fortune teller, musical tombstones and the mad scientist lab, plus crafts and the costume show.

Trick or treating is 6-8 p.m. The Directorate of Family and Morale, Welfare and Recreation will have candy booths set up throughout Villaggio, and many residents will give out candy at their homes. Family and MWR will provide one bag of candy each to Families who choose to participate in giving out candy.

This year, the post will not be opened to the general public. Italian and American military and civilian employees of Caserma Ederle and are invited to attend with their Families, and encouraged to invite friends or neighbors and sponsor them to attend activities.

Sponsors must accompany their guests at all times

and are responsible for them while they are on the installation. Adult guests should bring identification.

The roads in Villaggio will be closed to vehicle traffic from 6 p.m. until after all trick or treaters are off the streets. Those who do not live in Villaggio should plan to enter main post via the Aldo

Moro gate and park on post.

A shuttle bus will run every 15 minutes from 3-9 p.m. between the Commissary parking lot and the Villaggio front gate. Children must remain under adult supervision at all times. No roller blades, skates, skateboards, bicycles, mopeds or motorcycles or pets are permitted in the fest area. For more information, visit www.vicenzaMWR.com.

Other Halloween activities include the free haunted house, hosted by the USO, Friday to Sunday. From 7-10 p.m., adults and youth can visit the haunted house in the Arena. The haunted house is not recommended for young children, said Nicole McNeil, a USO volunteer who is helping to organize the event. Young children can be dropped off at the party room downstairs for some treats while adults and older children and teens get spooked upstairs.

On Saturday, there will be an adults-only Halloween party beginning at 8 p.m. in the Lion's Den, the second floor of the Arena. The party includes a costume contest and awards for the funniest and scariest costumes.

On Sunday, starting at 2 p.m., Families are invited for a bouncy house, hay rides, face painting, photos, live music and more outside the Arena. "Trunk or treat" starts at 6 p.m. Adults can give out candy from the trunk of their cars so children can go trick or treating from trunk to trunk. Everyone is encouraged to wear costumes and decorate their car trunks for the contest at 7 p.m.

Spouse scholarship program changes rules

Army Emergency Relief

In order to offer more educational opportunities to Army spouses, Army Emergency Relief will be consolidating its Overseas and Stateside Spouse Education Assistance Programs into one spouse scholarship program, effective academic year 2012-2013.

All spouses regardless of stateside/overseas location will be allowed to attend school part-time or full-time.

Part-time students must take a minimum of six credit hours per semester and are eligible for assistance for eight years. Full-time students must take a minimum of 12 credit hours per semester and are eligible for assistance for four years.

Scholarship funding will be for the fall and spring semesters only.

The application/renewal process for overseas spouses will continue as normal through term five (May 7). However, overseas spouses will need to do the following during the next application period, which begins Dec. 1:

Complete an online application for academic year 2012-2013. Applications will be available after Dec. 1 and are due by April 2.

Supporting documents such as transcripts, DD Form 214 (if applicable), Army Casualty Report (if applicable) and federal active duty Title 10 Orders (if applicable) are due to Army Emergency Relief by April 2.

Submit a 2012-2013 FAFSA application at www.fafsa.ed.gov. Start this process at the beginning of the calendar year 2012, not sooner. Provide a complete 2012-2013 Student Aid Report by May 1. Email all supporting documents to Spouse@aerhq.org.

Downtown driving restricted to certain vehicles

Older cars are restricted from driving in central Vicenza from 9 a.m. - noon and 3 - 6 p.m., Monday-Friday, from now until Dec. 16. Signs have been placed on many streets in downtown Vicenza. If you have a diesel or gas car that is classified Euro 0 or Euro 1, or a Euro 2 classified diesel vehicle, you cannot drive past these signs during these time periods or be subject to

In general, the Euro ratings (European emission standards) apply to the year the car was manufactured: Euro 0: until 1992, Euro 1: 1993-1996, Euro 2: 1997-2000, Euro 3: 2001-2005, Euro 4/5: U.S. specification after 2006. Your vehicle ownership papers should indicate what Euro rating your car is. The fines run from €155 - €624. The ban is lifted during the holiday period and is in place again from Jan. 9 to March 20.

Race to Tower still going strong after 29 years

A record 453 runners including U.S. Soldiers, Airmen, Sailors, civilians, Italian 46th Air Brigade, Carabinieri's, Folgore Brigade, Italian running clubs and others took part in the Annual Run to the Tower Oct. 21. The 12-kilometer run from the front gate of Camp Darby to the Leaning Tower of Pisa represents the enduring tradition of American and Italian communities fostering camaraderie and friendship over the last 29 years, according to U.S. Army Garrison Livorno Commander Lt. Col. Kevin Bigelman,.

"This race would not have been possible if it weren't for the close coordination and assistance from the local Italian authorities who ensured the runners were able to run the roads safely," said Bigelman, who finished the race in 50:53.

For runner Rosario Filippis, Italian Folgore Brigade, he's made a tradition of running this race since 1991.

"I like running this race because after so many years of running it, I feel like I am part of the U.S. community by now; besides I am in the Italian military, so being part of the military community makes me feel even more comfortable," said Filippis, who has won the race three times in the past and finished this year second in his category in 46:12.

Fellow Folgore member, Michele Polzella, added he has participated in the Run to the Tower since 1998.

"I love it because every year I try to

beat my own time. Unfortunately, this year I did worse than the past year, but I will do better next year," said Polzella who ran 43:25 to place second in his age category.

Camp Darby community member Sharon Carter said she has run this race 14 years and has run it with her husband the last four years.

"Every year my goal is to finish one minute faster than the previous year," said Carter.

Other the top finishers, such as Francesca Caroti-Ghelli who has been running the race since 2002, keep coming back for more; however, this year newcomer to the race Rosella Darata took the trophy for top female by running 45:25

It was also the first time for the overall

winner, Ioannis Magkriotelis.

"This is the first time I ran this competition and I really had fun; it was a little bit windy, but the route was very easy and comfortable," said Magkriotelis who finished in 38.22.

The 731st Munitions Squadron received a trophy for the highest percentage of servicemembers in a unit competing and also boasted the first American runner to finish, Airmen Aaron Lehman, finishing in 44:13. The Italian Folgore Brigade received a trophy for the largest overall number of runners for the second year.

When it comes to readiness, the Army adheres to one principle: "Train as you would fight."

When Camp Darby's first responders reacted to a propane tank burning out of control as a part of a training exercise, posing a serious threat to everything around it, their reaction was swift and concise.

After assessing the situation, Camp Darby Fire Department crew chief, Jon Harvey sent in two of his firefighters armed with their protective gear and a high pressure water hose.

"They're experiencing a question of, okay I've got to get the job done; I've got to get the fire controlled," said Harvey.

While it may seem like business as usual for these professionals, Harvey says it actually takes a lot of training and practice to get to this level.

"Anybody can't just come up and know exactly what to do and feel completely comfortable doing it. We have a lot of gear on, the masks, and some people don't tolerate wearing a mask very well," said Harvey. "Plus, with the flame, it's hot and it scares people. While they may never be completely comfortable, this 'live-fire' annual training is critical to ensuring they are both physically and mentally ready to complete their mission as first responders."

In addition to their live-fire training, the Camp Darby fire department also received annual hazardous material containment training from a Germany-based mobile training team.

Twists, turns lead to soccer title for Vicenza Men's team

MAINZ-KASTEL, Germany – The Vicenza Lions, outstory-booking the Brothers Grimm, won the 2011 U.S. Forces-Europe soccer championship Sunday with a novice goalkeeper, an MVP who's supposed to be in the field, EUCOM's only husband-wife soccer combo and a mainstay hospitalized with a skull fracture he suffered the previous day.

A pressure attack also played a big part in the Lions' 3-1 victory over the Ramstein Rams, capping an unbeaten run through this four-day event at the Mainz-Kastel 06 complex that was contested by 13 community-level teams.

Stephen Joseph, Vorsane Photosane and Erwin Jamieson got the goals produced by the Lions' attack. All three goals resulted from set pieces.

But the Lions derived their inspiration Sunday from the plight of sweeper Randy Osborn, who suffered a skull fracture in a game on Saturday and spent title-day in the hospital instead of at the awards presentation with his teammates.

"We dedicated this game to Randy Osborn," said Vicenza coach Shaun Nurse as his team brought Osborn's blood-stained jersey with them to the presentation.

Osborne, whom Nurse said was expected to accompany the team back to Vicenza on Monday, might have been in the hospital, but he was all over the field Sunday, too, as Lion after Lion stepped up to take up the slack.

Among them was Bradley Byington, a defender who saw much more playing time than he had anticipated, MVP sweeper Abdul Sadiq, collected from field exercises at Hohenfels, and first-time keeper James Watson.

"I was playing for him," said Byington about their hospitalized teammate. "We all were."

Osborn's absence shifted much of the defensive load to Byington, and he responded effectively.

"I'm probably the least experienced player we have," said Byington, whose closing speed on the ball broke up a halfdozen Ramstein rushes. "But I had years of experience around me and I had the athleticisim to be able to do what they told me to do."

That experience benefited defender Andrea Alicea, too. Alicea, whose husband Arric plays midfield for the Lions, scored a goal against Heidelberg on Saturday. She said support from her defensive mates helps her cope with the speed and power of her male opponents.

"I love my boys," she said. "I have great team support in the back."

Keeper Watson enjoyed that support, too.

"I'm not even a goalie," he said. "I went out and bought this gear. But the team had faith in me and the defense helped me out a lot."

As had been the case since he had traded in his muddy combat boots for soccer cleats last week, MVP Sadiq organized the defense which kept Vicenza - which outscored

the opposition 26-7 in the tournament - according to Nurse, perfect for the tournament.

"I just want to thank Sgt. Maj. Williamson and 1st Sgt. Smith and 1st Sgt. McDaniels for getting me permission to play," Sadiq said as he clutched his MVP plate. "The team picked me up at Hohenfels on their way here. I go back to Hohenfels in the morning."

Joseph put Vicenza up 1-0 in the 12th minute when he rushed into the box to direct a rebound of a Luis Estepa free kick from 35 yards out into the net.

But Ramstein equalized just before halftime, when Schyler Baxter lofted a cross to a wide-open Salvador Diaz. Diaz advanced toward Watson and steered his shot inside the far

The goal as the clock ran down was deflating, Arric Alicea said.

"It's always discouraging to give up a goal," he said, "but it was just a hiccup. We knew we'd fight through it."

The Lions did, and took the lead for good in the game's 57th minute. Vicenza captain Wilmer Aguilar fired a free kick into the box for 40 yards out. The shot deflected to the left side where Photosane gathered it and ripped a grass-cutter into the net.

Arric Alicea got the assist on the insurance goal. His corner kick to the right side of the box ended up on the head of Erwin Jamieson, who steered it into the upper right corner of the net.

That was plenty of scoring for the Vicenza defense, which could hardly have done better even had Osborn been in the lineup

Sadiq, however, isn't sure of that.

"If he had been here," the 2011 U.S. Forces Europe MVP said, "he would have been the MVP."
