ASA Hammack sees energy initiatives during Italy visit

Assistant Secretary of the Army for Installations, Energy and Environment Katherine Hammack visited Vicenza, Italy, Sept. 13-14, as her final stop on a 10-day tour of U.S. Army installations in Germany and Italy.

Hammack met with U.S. Army Africa Commanding General Maj. Gen. Patrick J. Donahue II and saw several significant energy and cost-saving initiatives on a tour with USAG Vicenza officials.

On Caserma Ederle, Hammack visited the cogeneration central energy plant updated from a preexisting central heating plant into a dual fuel facility that is 35 percent more efficient than the old, single fuel design.

The Co-Gen CEP was also modified, along with the installation's electrical grid, to have the capability to power mission critical facilities when commercial power is off-line. Greg Vallery, chief Engineering Division, USAG Vicenza Directorate of Public Works, explained that the \$6 million project built with an Energy Savings Performance Contract not only provides more energy security for the post, but is also projected to save \$800,000 in energy bills annually.

USAG Vicenza Commander, Col. David Buckingham, then hosted Hammack for a visit of construction at Caserma Del Din, on the former Dal Molin Italian Air Force Base in Vicenza, to see first-hand the many innovative facilities being built to achieve LEED Silver certification for the entirety of the new installation. LEED, or Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design, is a rating system developed by the U.S. Green Building Council that provides a framework to identify and implement practical, measurable green building design, construction, operations and maintenance.

"There are many different ways you can manage energy. The best way is to not use as much," Hammack said. "If you build your buildings better, you put in better insulation, better windows and lighting and skylights — all of those contribute to using less energy. Then what you want to do is manufacture, to make energy, in an efficient manner."

One of the jewels of Del Din is the new tri-generation central energy plant that will meet the electrical, heating and cooling needs of the entire base.

"Here at Del Din, we're making energy from fuel, but when you make electricity you waste heat. We can take that waste heat and use it to heat hot water and to make air conditioning. So we have tri-generation ... one fuel, three outputs," Hammack said. "(These are) greatly improved efficiencies and reduce fuel consumption. It is really a wise way to use energy."

Hammack also learned about photovoltaic projects on Caserma Ederle, Villaggio Army Family Housing area, and Caserma Del Din, a key program in the movement toward "net zero" installations across the Europe theater. "Net zero" energy, means that the total energy produced on-site over the period of a given year is equal to the installation's annual energy demand.

"As I've traveled through Germany and Italy and seen our bases here, we're increasing the amount of photovoltaic systems we're putting on our buildings, so we're making energy from a rapidly renewable resource," she said.

Photovoltaic systems on 19 Vicenza buildings will

reduce annual electrical expenditures by \$280,000 and provide incentives of \$432,000 each year, bringing the payback period for the solar power systems to just eight years, according to Vallery.

Hammack said "When we make energy on site, which is part of 'Net Zero', that means we've improved energy security, that means we've improved our environmental footprint. We've also reduce our costs in an era of tight resources. All of those are important."

She stopped at installations in Baumholder, Stuttgart, Grafenwoehr, Garmisch, Kaiserslautern, Baden Wurttemberg, Bamberg, Schweinfurt and Ansbach before capping off the trip with a look at new construction and energy initiatives in Italy.

"The Army in Europe has really made an investment in energy efficiency and renewable energy," Hammack said. "I'm really amazed at the great work that's being done at the Garrison level, first of all to install photovoltaics and even consideration of wind energy on our bases. It will certainly benefit our Families."

Pledge to prep for National Preparedness Month

If a disaster strikes, how will you and your family be ready? This month marks the ninth year of National Preparedness Month and the Ready Army Campaign. This month-long campaign, held each September, promotes emergency awareness and preparedness and strengthens our ability to prevent, protect, mitigate, respond and recover from any natural or manmade disaster. We can never fully predict when a disaster will strike, but we can individually and collectively ensure that we are prepared to respond.

This year's theme for National Preparedness Month is Pledge to Prepare. Your Installation Emergency Management office would like you to take a moment and visit www.ready. gov to see simple steps you can take, such as keeping an emergency kit in your office and at home and keeping copies of important family documents in a safe place.

Being prepared means having a plan. Whether you are at home, at work or on-the-go, it is important to create a plan in case of an emergency. Planning ahead will ensure that you and your family will know what to do and have the supplies you need to be safe wherever you are.

For your home, think ahead with your Family Emergency Plan. A simple plan can be found at http://www.usag.vicenza.army.mil/sites/local/emergency_management_office.asp. At work or school? Ensure you and your family members know the best way to contact one another if you are separated during a disaster. The Veneto region, and especially Vicenza, is no stranger to severe weather. Floods, earthquakes, damaging hail

and high wind storms can happen with little or no warning. When an emergency strikes, knowing what to do before, during and after may make all the difference when seconds count.

When looking to create a basic disaster kit look no further than your Post Exchange and Commissary. Items for a basic emergency supply kit can easily be found at these two locations.

The following recommended items for an emegency: water, one gallon of water per person per day for at least three days for drinking and sanitation; food, at least three-day supply of non-perishable food; battery-powered or hand crank radio with extra batteries; flashlight and extra batteries; first aid kit; whistle to signal for help; dust mask to help filter contaminated air and plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place; moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation; wrench or pliers to turn off utilities; manual can opener for food; local maps; and cell phone with chargers, inverter or solar charger.

Individually we can make a difference by getting involved in our community. Our installation's Red Cross office in building 333 offers CPR/AED training on the first Saturday of each month and pet first aid once a quarter. There are plenty of opportunities to volunteer with the Army Community Service in Building 108 or become a member of the Vicenza Community Club which supports worthwhile services and community projects.

Rocsi Diaz boosts teens, puts down bullying

Rocsi Diaz knows what it's like to be the outsider.

The host of BET's flagship hip-hop and R&B video variety show, 106 & Park, talked with Vicenza Military Community high school and middle school students about self-esteem, bullying and protecting themselves on social media during a USO-sponsored visit to area schools Sept. 10.

"It's funny how my conversation five years ago with teenagers is nowhere near the same conversation that I'm having now. Now it's all about social media and how to watch yourself and watch bullies that are going to come after you, and be careful what you put up there because you can't take it down," she said.

Diaz was introduced at Vicenza High School by principal Lauri Kenney, and immediately established rapport with her audience.

"What a lot of people don't know is that before my journey to television and being on 106 & Park, I dealt with so many different types of issues when I was in your position, when I was in school.

"I was a cheerleader and, as most young people now, heavily influenced by what we see on TV and in magazines, and until I got into the entertainment business I didn't realize that all of that was fake. That stuff really, really does not exist," she said.

"In high school and in junior high I was so heavily influenced with what other people thought of me, what other people said I needed to look like – I was starving myself. ... At home, my family didn't know what I was going through. They didn't know that at school I wasn't cool, that I sat alone most of the time. I sat by myself because I didn't know how to interact because I thought nobody liked me," Diaz said.

"And nobody ever really knows until it's too late what the next person is going through. You have no idea what secrets people hold. Until sometimes it's too late," she said.

Diaz learned to eat and work out properly, but found there was a deeper layer of issues to address.

"But it was my low self-esteem that made me believe I was not even good enough to do the things I loved to do. That I didn't deserve to do because I was so worried about what other people thought of me.

"And it's always to try to impress the next person. Well, I'm here to tell you right now you don't have to impress anybody but yourself. And other people's opinion of you does not matter. Because usually the opinions that people have of you, if it's negative, it's really how they feel about themselves," said Diaz.

It's during the critical adolescent years, when young-

sters are most susceptible, that bullying manifests itself in children's lives, in and out of school, she said.

"Bullying is at an all-time high in the United States," said Diaz. "When I was in school and we dealt with bullying it was nowhere near what you guys have now with social media. How many people have Facebook accounts?" she asked.

Nearly everyone in the gym raised their hands.

"It's crazy, right? Facebook didn't even exist when I was in school – but what I see a lot now is social media being used to target young people, to tell them what they're not good about, what they're not good at and how they look," she said.

Diaz talked about the added stresses and burdens that Vicenza youth bear while their parents, and the parents of their peers, are deployed to danger zones.

"You never know what the next person is dealing with," she said.

Diaz addressed the perennial teenage need to be considered cool, the illusions that some teens live by, and the reality of making it in modern society.

"It's funny because when I was in school, being prom queen and being homecoming queen and things of that nature . . . being the most popular kid, in high school seemed like the most important thing in the whole entire world.

"Look at somebody that's studying pre-med and see if they care how they look like in pajamas while they're going to class – they don't care. All of that is out of the window. But the things that do matter is the way that you treat people, the relationships that you build," she said.

"And it's the type of mentality that you have to have. Because it was the un-cool kids and the dorks and the people that spent their time in the libraries and with the teachers in after-school programs who were really the ones that succeeded.

"And those are really the cool kids when you get older, too. Those are the people you want by your side. Those are the lawyers and the doctors that you want treating you because they know everything," Diaz said.

"Those are things that are going to matter in life. Not that I sat at the cool table," she said.

Powers of Attorney available for numerous uses

A Power of Attorney is a powerful legal document that authorizes someone else to act on your behalf. You might, for example, wish to allow your spouse, supervisor, or friend to sell your car or ship your household goods. If your child is spending the summer with her grandmother, you probably want the these actions through a POA.

If you are the person that gives the authority to someone to act on your behalf, then you are the principal. The person who you give the right to act on your behalf is called the agent. The power to act on your behalf can be very specific and limited to a certain task or the power can be very broad.

There are three basic types of powers of attorney: general, special, and health care. A general POA allows your agent to grandmother to be able to obtain medical do most things that you could legally do care for your child. You can authorize yourself, from obtaining a pay-day loan to signing a rental agreement. A special

(or limited) POA only allows your agent to perform specified acts.

For example: "I authorize my wife, Jane Doe, to register my 2011 Honda Civic with the State of Florida when its current registration expires." A health care power of attorney allows your agent to make health care decisions for you if you become incapacitated and cannot make your own decisions.

You should always exercise great care in selecting your agent and never give a general POA if a special POA will suffice. There is no legal requirement that anyone recognize a POA; however, most businesses will recognize the document. Many businesses will only accept a power of attorney if it is timely and has specific language they find acceptable. As such, it is always wise

to contact individual agencies such as your bank, creditors, and even military organizations such as DFAS to find out what type of POA they will or will not accept. Some institutions require their own forms to be used. In addition, in many states there are certain actions that cannot be accomplished with a POA because these actions are so personal they cannot be delegated to another, for example voting in an

A POA helps absolve a person or business, relying on a valid POA, from liability. It also serves to legally obligate you to be responsible for the acts of your agent. If the agent abuses his power, you are generally liable to third parties for

Sharing lessons learned with Carabinieri

173rd ABCT Soldiers met with Carabinieri, Italian military law enforcement officers, and shared their experiences and lessons learned during a symposium Sept. 11. The focus was on exchanging best practices germane to Cultural Awareness and Information Operations from past deployments supporting Operation Enduring Freedom, according to 173rd ABCT Rear Detachment 1st Sgt. Timothy Jensen.

"The class's reaction was very good and the students appreciated sharing the lessons learned," said Lt. Col. Vito Camassa, Italian Carabinieri, Training and Evaluation chief.

"These are issues I had the pleasure to study during dedicated courses in the past; however, it refreshed and reinforced and the concepts and confirmed that they are still actual and key issues for crisis management," said Italian Warrant Officer 3 Marco Tupini. "I liked the emphasis on the 'line of efforts' and its importance for the mission,"

The course went in-depth about understanding that the ideology of one's enemies ought to command ones full attention and that in order to win, one must prevail in the information war, using words, deeds and images to get to the root of an insurgency – their ideology. Emphasizing Cross-Cultural Awareness is about helping the local nationals not only be understood in terms of their norms, religions, language and sensitivities; it's also about helping the locals understand one's own cultural norms.

The instructors emphasized in the classes that it is not just a matter of what one does, but how one does it, and encouraged Soldiers in a COIN environment to help shape outcomes so things turn out successful and reduce tension among the local populace – and less tension translates into less Improvised Explosive Devices (IEDs).

"The new information was useful, but the most important thing is to create a liaison amongst the various components which stay in the Afghan theater," said Camassa.

actions authorized under the plain language of the POA.

A power of attorney will generally expire on the date specified in the document. Regardless of any specified expiration date, however, all powers of attorney will automatically terminate when revoked or when either you or your agent die (unless a substitute agent is named). Never make a POA indefinite. If you want to rescind a POA before its stated expiration date, the safest way to do this is to retrieve all copies and originals given to your agent. In addition, you can also execute a Revocation of Power of Attorney and give a copy of the revocation to any person or business who might deal with the agent named in the original POA.

A POA is an excellent tool if it is used properly and if it is in the hands of the proper person. A POA can also be harmful if abused. For example, a husband recently separated from his wife might use the general power of attorney she gave him to withdraw all the funds from her individual bank and investment accounts. The important thing to remember is that so long as your agent has acted within the power stated in the document, you are going to be held legally responsible for the acts of your agent. Therefore, you must exercise great care in choosing your agent. As with all safety issues, one should perform a risk analysis. Your legal assistance office can help you to evaluate the risk and the benefits. The Vicenza Legal Assistance Office can prepare a general, special, or health care POA. We also have notaries on our staff who can notarize the document. The grantor must sign in the presence of the notary. The agent need not be present.

POAs and notary services are available on a walk-in basis during normal duty hours. For more information, contact the Vicenza Legal Assistance Office in Building 241 or by calling 634-7041 or 0444-71-7041.

Camp Darby remembers Sept. 11 attack

The Darby Military Community remembered the attacks of Sept. 11, 2001, with two events.

Soldiers, Airmen, firefighters, Family members, civilians and local nationals gathered at both events, demonstrating that they will not forget.

The morning of remembrance began with a 9/11 Memorial 5-kilometer run at 7:30 a.m. and continued at 10 a.m. with an eleventh Anniversary Remembrance Ceremony at DMC Chapel.

At both events DMC Chaplain (Capt.) Regino Hernandez invited everyone in attendance to remember all those who lost their lives on Sept. 11, not just the Americans, but people of all nationalities including Italians. They were also asked to remember those persons who have lost their lives since Sept. 11 from all acts of terrorism and while protecting, including those in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Capt. Dave Americo of the DMC Fire Department told the story of Richard Bruce Van Hine, a firefighter for 12 years, who lost his life in the World Trade Center attacks.

Americo concluded his comments by saying, "the actions of the 343 firefighters show the true fabric of what makes our country great. As we remember all these patriots on the 11th anniversary of Sept. 11 and honor their sacrifice made in the name of freedom, never forget that we are the home of the free because of the brave."

Lt. Col. Mark Gray, AFSBn Commander, asked everyone to remember "exactly where they were and what was going on around them on that particular Tuesday morning, on the morning that changed America and much of the world."

Following Gray's remarks, the Chapel Remembrance Ceremony memorial video brought back memories of the attacks and tears to the eyes of some community

"The memorial video was the best part of the service," Sgt. John Miller said after the service.

Three candles were lit as symbols of those who lost their lives on Sept. 11, 2001; they were the candles of Remembrance, Comfort and Hope. Remember the past, take comfort in the community of the present, and look forward to the hope of the future by lighting the candles.

The candle of Remembrance, lit by John Harvey, represented all the firefighters and the World Trade Center Towers.

The Candle of Comfort, lit by Tech. Sgt. Ryannon Sawin-Vaughn of the 731st Munitions Squadron, represented service

members who died at the Pentagon, Afghanistan and Iraq.

The Candle of Hope, lit by Sharon Carter, represented civilians and the Pennsylvania airplane crash.

"May these candles represent for us the light of our shared memories, the light of comfort and strength, and the light of our hope," Carter said.
