2 NCOs selected for induction to Sgt. Morales Club

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Tensions were high and anxiety filled the air as candidates for the Sergeant Morales Club nervously paced back and forth, trying to calm their nerves before their final board appearance Jan. 6 in the Garrison Headquarters building. After a grueling selection process of initial and intermediate selection boards, this board was the last phase to determine if these noncommissioned officers were worthy of induction in the most prestigious club for enlisted Soldiers serving in Europe.

Out of three candidates, two NCOs were selected for induction: Staff Sgt. William Delong, a provost sergeant

with U.S. Army Garrison Vicenza, and Staff Sgt. Billy Kelly, a squad leader assigned to 2nd Battalion, 503rd Infantry Regiment.

"It is an honor to be selected for induction to the Sergeant Morales Club. Being recognized by fellow NCOs and senior leaders as one of the Army's best when it comes to coaching, mentoring, training and caring for Soldiers is truly special," Delong said. "I cherish and look forward to using this opportunity to reach out and influence and shape more Soldiers into professional, competent, first class war fighters regardless of unit or duty."

Membership in the SMC recognizes NCOs who merit special recognition and who exemplify leadership

which is characterized by their concern for the needs, training and development of Soldiers. Membership is exclusive and is limited to only to those nominated by their senior leadership.

Delong said he was excited and relieved to be inducted, but the selection process was by no means easy. To prepare for the board, Delong said he spent countless weeks studying and kept up continuous communication with his Soldiers.

"The selection process is a lot of studying, a lot of review, and expressing that knowledge of how you know your Soldiers, your job and their job as well," Delong said.



Town hall held for local nationals, jobs discussed

Italian employees of the U.S. Army Garrison Vicenza and U.S. Army Garrison Livorno learned Friday of reductions in positions for local national workers at both locations.

U.S. Army Europe announced inactivation of the command structure of USAG Livorno and its re-designation as a satellite site to realign its essential services under USAG Vicenza. As part of this same action, USAG Vicenza is right-sizing support services provided to its changing community population.

USAG Vicenza Commander Col. David Buckingham explained in the 2 p.m. standing room only meeting in the Post Theater that he must reduce the number of positions available for employment with the U.S. Army Garrison in Vicenza.

At the same time, local national workers gathered on Camp Darby to hear the announcement from USAG Livorno Commander Lt. Col. Kevin Bigelman.

In Vicenza, Col. Buckingham said that he is "...very confident that none of the wonderful Italian workers currently employed by the U.S. Army in the Vicenza area will lose their job." He explained that new positions being added for the opening of the Dal Molin base and the deliberate practice of allowing positions to remain vacant after the retirement or departure of local national employees over the past year have mitigated the situation in Vicenza.

At Vicenza, 73 local national, 29 Department of the Army Civilian and one military position are being eliminated in the reduction. A number of Vicenza positions to be cut are vacant and will be eliminated without affecting workers. Presently about 65 Italian workers are in positions authorized for support of the new installation at Dal Molin. Some individuals have been hired for Dal Molin within the last 2 years, but many others are in positions that would have been cut in the action announced Friday, but have been preserved because of Dal Molin, Col. Buckingham explained.

In addition to the good news that USAG Vicenza should not have to release any currently employed Italian workers, Col. Buckingham said, "The opening of Dal Molin in the summer of 2013 will allow us to increase our job authorizations, and hire additional workers, over the next few years."

The garrison commander explained that there will be a total of approximately 275 new permanent jobs created because of Dal Molin of which approximately 200 positions, more than 70 percent of the total, will be Italian employees. "Of

those 200 Italian positions, approximately 65 will be filled by Italian workers already employed by the U.S. Army in Vicenza. The additional approximately 135 Italian workers will be hired over the next few years," he said. "I expect a few of those workers to be hired between now and the end of this summer, then a large number should be hired between the fall of 2012 and summer 2013, and some will be hired later in 2013 or 2014.

Buckingham told the Vicenza audience that the reductions affecting the USAG Livorno will affect many workers. "In addition to about 10 US military personnel and 40 US civilian employees, the budget cuts require the elimination of approximately 67 Italian positions and almost all of these positions are currently filled," he said. "We will work closely with the local unions, and use our normal employment processes to identify which workers will be released, and when, and to provide as much assistance as we are legally able to provide."

Buckingham reiterated that the budget crisis has had no effect on the United States' friendship with the people and government of Italy, our security commitments with Italy through NATO and other agreements, or the Army's longterm presence. He closed his remarks by thanking the Italian workforce for their hard and skilled work and took questions from those attending before departing for a press conference on the reductions.

Induction to the Sergeant Morales Club is similar to another NCO club stateside.

"The Sergeant Morales Club is based a lot like the Sergeant Audie Murphy Club. It allows senior NCOs, sergeants major and U.S. Army Africa command command teams to recognize NCOs sergeant major and president of and leaders who have demonstrated outstanding leadership, and it's a great recognition to say that you are the cream of the crop NCO. If you're striving to be in the Sergeant Morales Club, then you're striving to be in the top one percent of NCOs in the Army," said Sgt. 1st Class Thomas Kupsh, president of the Vicenza Chapter of Excellence for the SMC.

Even though he was not selected for induction, Staff Sgt. Reyes Fernandez, a squad leader with 2nd Battalion, 503rd Infantry Regiment, was still humbled from the honor of being nominated by his senior leadership, and sees the boards as a learning process.

"It's a good experience because

I'm used to my comfort zone; by doing this it's getting me out of my comfort zone. It's giving me more things I can learn about myself. It's a great experience," Fernandez

Command Sgt. Maj. Hu Rhodes, the board, said the board is very selective because they are looking for excellence in every category.

"The members of the Morales Club will be noted as a prestigious group of people for a long, long time," Rhodes said.

In 1973, the SMC was established by Lt. Gen. George S. Blanchard to recognize the best Army leaders in Europe. Sergeant Morales was the typical "98 pound weakling" whose hard work and dedication to his job, his Soldiers and his country lead to him gaining lasting recognition of his accomplishments.

The induction ceremony is scheduled to take place Friday at the post theater.

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

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Remembering Gillian Burke

At Camp Darby, we all know how easy it is to see people almost every day and still not really know them. It's possible Gillian Burke was such a person for some of you. None of us will ever know all of the ways that her life impacted our community. But impact it she did in a variety of positive ways.

Gillian truly cared for others. She spent her years at Camp Darby serving others in the commissary and PX and serving her fellow employees. Several of her closest friends got together and remembered how Gillian, who loved to cook, would make huge amounts of food and bring it to work for all to share. But more than that, she would make each one feel special by wrapping up food just for that person. One had to be careful though ... while she was known for great apple pie, she was equally

famous for burning her toast.

So it's probably a good thing that Gillian also had a great sense of humor whenever the fire department regularly showed up because she had set off the smoke alarms. In fact, Gillian was quite the prankster. She kept an empty egg carton beneath her check-out counter and enjoyed having some fun when an unsuspecting customer, who failed to notice her make the switch, would be surprised when Gillian accidentally dropped the carton of eggs. More than one shoppette customer has had a good laugh when Gillian left her fake \$100 bill on the counter.

We would say that a person like Gillian, who cared for others and had a playful sense of humor, was comfortable with herself and others. In the conclusion to "Walden," Henry David Thoreau writes: "If a man loses pace with his companions, perhaps it is because he hears a different drummer. Let him step to the music which

he hears, however measured, or far away." Except that Gillian didn't step to the beat of a different drummer, she drove. In her ancient, little red car with the yellow headlights and skinny tires. Gillian's little red car had been rained in so often that grass actually grew inside it. Last year during Camp Darby's snow storm she almost made it in all the way to work — almost. She got stuck doing doughnuts in front of the commissary and finally just left her car in the road.

Gillian was comfortable with herself. She genuinely cared for others and she laughed — a lot. In ancient Rome, a statesman named Seneca once said: "Life, if well lived, is long enough." Donors from around the world have given to Gillian's memorial fund. As these donations testify, Gillian's life touched the lives of those with whom she laughed and for whom she cared. Her life, although well-lived, was not long enough. She will be missed.
