VAZIANI TRAINING AREA, Georgia — Troops from Georgia, United States, Armenia, Azerbaijan and the Ukraine stood together for the last time for this year's Immediate Response exercise.

At the closing ceremony July 31, Brig. Gen. William B. Garrett III, exercise director for Immediate Response stated, "I am very pleased to report that all exercise objectives have been met."

Garrett, commander of the Southern European Task Force (Airborne), highlighted the hundreds of live-fire and situational training exercises, combat lifesaver classes, Improvised Explosive Device training and the computer-based command post exercise to train the Georgian 4th Infantry brigade staff as some of the objectives.

Immediate Response is an annual bilateral security cooperation exercise conducted between the U.S. and NATO and coalition partners. ## **Working on economy could cause loss** of post privileges, gas coupons, more

So you want to be a post, but not on the Italian economy. bouncer for the disco bar?

Some members of our community have been approached with job offers to work on the local economy. Whether it is as a bouncer in a nightclub or caring for the elderly, a word of caution. If you start working on the local economy, you may be doing so illegally and you could lose beneficial Status of Forces Agreement (SOFA) protections and privileges.

In Italy, U.S. military members, government civilian employees and their dependents enter and remain in Italy under the SOFA between the U.S. and Italy. This means U.S. military members do not need a passport or a visa to enter and remain in Italy, and government civilian employees and all dependents are required to have missione visas and missione soggiorno permits to enter and remain in Italy. These permits allow you to work on

In order to work on the Italian economy, you need a work visa and work permit. These work visas and work permits must be acquired before entering the country. Unfortunately, under the SOFA, you may not hold all four visas and permits and you must make the choice. You may either have the missione visa and missione soggiorno permit or the work visa and work permit.

If you work without the proper documents, you are violating Italian law. If you do obtain a work visa and work permit, you are no longer covered under the SOFA and may lose some protections and benefits. Some of the benefits lost are shopping at the post exchange and commissary, sending mail through the military postal system and purchasing gas coupons. Also, you will have to pay Italian income taxes.


For those members of the community who want to make extra money, jobs on post are allowed under the SOFA.

## New route to vehicle registration

To get to the Vehicle Registration office, take the fourth exit at the large traffic circle prior to the Autostrada Est entrance. This exit will wrap around the Viest hotel and lead to the main street where the entrance to Vehicle Registration is located.

Be careful not to try using the old way to enter via the entrance next to the Autostrada. This is now closed and there is no turn around. You will have to enter the autostrada, take the first exit and return; paying a toll both ways.

## Drugs, DUIs hold heavy consequences

During May and June, three Soldiers were convicted at courtsmartial for various offenses and 11 Soldiers were punished under Article 15 of the Uniform Code of Military Justice for alcohol related offenses. One Soldier was administratively separated for, among other things, his use of illegal substances.

Below are the punishments they received:

General courts-martial: Sgt. Airelle J. Hall, Headquarters Support Company, Southern European Task Force (Airborne), pled guilty to multiple uses of marijuana over a 13-month period and communicating a threat to a junior enlisted Soldier.

Hall's sentence included: reduction to E1, 2/3rds forfeiture of pay for three months, confinement for three months and a bad conduct discharge.

Pfc. Heather N.D. Pomeroy, Rear Detachment, 2nd Battalion, 503rd Infantry, 173rd Airborne Brigade Combat Team, pled guilty to desertion with intent to remain away permanently terminated by apprehension.

Pomeroy's sentence included: reduction to E1, total forfeiture of pay and allowances, confinement for 13 months and a bad conduct discharge. In exchange for her plea of guilty, Pomeroy will receive a maximum of 366 days in confinement.

Summary court-martial: Spc. Nathan K. Gross, Warrior Transition Unit, plead guilty to wrongfully using marijuana and larceny of military property. Gross was sentenced to: reduction to E1, forfeit of \$898 and confinement for 30 days. Gross was administratively separated with an other than honorable discharge.

**Driving Under the Influence of Alcohol:** Three noncommissioned officers received non-judicial

punishment under Article 15 during this reporting period for driving a motor vehicle under the influence of alcohol. The offenders were ordered to forfeit a combined total of \$3,441 and each received a suspended reduction in rank. The offenders had their vehicles impounded by the military police and their driving privileges suspended or revoked by the USAG Vicenza commander. In addition, all three NCOs received General Officer Memoranda of Reprimand by the commander, SETAF (Abn).

## Other alcohol-related offenses:

Eight Soldiers received non-judicial punishment under Article 15 during this reporting period for alcohol related misconduct. The offenders were ordered to forfeit a combined total of \$7,387. Many were also reduced in rank, ordered to perform extra duty and restricted to the unit area. Should these Soldiers commit another serious alcohol-related offense, Army regulation requires that separation from the U.S. Army will be initiated.

Misprint in the previous military justice disciplinary report (May 13 edition of the Outlook): A misprint pertaining to Sgt. Joshua L. Scott's results of trial should have read:

Sgt. Joshua L. Scott, 14th Transportation Battalion, pled guilty to conspiracy to commit misprision, misprision of a serious offense, willful disobedience of a superior commissioned officer and signing of a false official document.

A special court-martial convening authority sentenced Scott to reduction to E3 and confinement for six months. In exchange for his plea of guilty, Scott received a maximum of three months confinement.

Note: The Italian driving code recently changed and now imposes harsher penalties, to include permanent confiscation of the driver's personally owned vehicle if their BAC is above 0.15.


"My favorite part of this is dancing because you get to wiggle your knees,"

# Navy, NATO experts work to keep ports safe

Editor's note: USAG Livorno at Camp Darby provides logistical support for a number of military personnel serving a variety of missions. Here is one of their stories.

At the NATO Undersea Research Centre in La Spezia, an hour north of Camp Darby, U.S. Sailors are working with military counterparts and scientists to develop Autonomous Underwater Vehicles.

According to Thomas Pastore, expeditionary mine countermeasures and port protection, these AUV's are designed for mine countermeasures applications and to make ports safer.

"We can send out the kayaks with the fixed detection centers or the underwater AUV in order to investigate if there is a hostile diver or element going towards a potential target," said Pastore. "This research we're doing here is currently being used by the United States, Norway and the United Kingdom in the real world environment."

For the Navy Sailors supporting the NATO mission at the only NATO undersea research center in the world, it has been an amazing collaboration.

"The research we are doing is critical to maintaining the freedom of the seas; global economic security could become very vulnerable without advances in undersea research," said Chief Warrant Officer Dave

Berry, NURC information systems security officer. "I'm bringing cutting edge computer security from the U.S. Navy standpoint to do whatever I can to help make sure NATO's continually advancing."

Lt. Cmdr. Brian Vosberg, U.S. Naval officer at NATO Undersea Research Centre, further explained the military members are all senior experts in their fields and help make sure the director's intent is followed and the scientific research is kept on track.

"In order to be successful here, you have to find a common ground with all the different

cultural and work customs," said Vosberg. 'You have to have an open mind and not focus on national interest."

Peter Ranelli, head of the applies research department, added the collaboration work all the NATO allies do at the research center goes a long way towards advancing science in the underwater and maritime environment.

"We work together on the autonomous naval mine countermeasures system, nonlethal capabilities in port protection and even have a reach back tool to marine mammal risk mitigation," said Ranelli. "In particular, work with AUV's has allowed us on a recent exercise off Elba Island to work with archeologists and sea wrecks from the Roman times."

NURC was established in 1959 and has approximately 189 employees, 75 percent of whom are scientists, engineers and technicians.

The first to be found is in the gardens of *Villa Pisani*, in the town of <u>Stra'</u>. It was created in 1720 and is formed of a thick hedge approximately 500 meters long. In the center find a small panoramic tower with a spiral staircase on the outside, topped by a statue of Minerva. Going to the top will allow you to plan your escape route. The villa is open from 9 a.m.-7 p.m. Closed on Mondays. Entrance fee to visit the villa and gardens is 5 euro. Garden only is 2,50 euro.

The maze in the *Giardino Giusti* in <u>Verona</u> was designed in 1786. Geometric in style and covering 400 meters is a thick hedge over a meter in height. The

gardens are located 10 minutes from the Verona Arena and are open daily from 9 a.m.-7p.m. Entrance fee is 5 euro. Children younger than 10 are free. Apart from the maze, which is considered to be one of the most ancient in Europe, also enjoy grotte acustiche, the echo cave, mythological statues, fountains and more. The gardens can take over two hours to visit.

In the gardens of *Villa Arvedi*, designed in 1650, the maze takes the shape of a butterfly and is formed with a thick hedge 20 centimeters in height. Also find an aviary with a fountain, a lily pond, statues and a cave. The villa is located nine kilometres from <u>Verona</u>'s city center in the town of <u>Grazzana</u>. Appointments have to be made to visit the gardens and villa. Email *arvedi@sis.it* for appointments and information.

The garden in the town of Valsanzibio, province of Padova, ranges among the most important and unspoiled gardens in the world. Designed in 1669 by the Venetian nobleman Z. F. Barbarigo, his son Gregorio, a cardinal and future saint, inspired the symbolic meaning of the plan drawn by Luigi Bernini, a Vatican architect and fountain expert. In the gardens find fountains, fishponds, a large maze, the rabbits' island, statues galore and more. The garden is open everyday from 10 a.m.-1 p.m. and 2 p.m.-sunset. Entrance fee is 8,50 euro for adults. Children 6-14 years of age cost 5,50 euro. There is also a store in the gardens that is open in the afternoons, but closed on Tuesdays. Valsanzibio is located 36 km from Vicenza. For a map and directions in English visit www.valsanzibiogiardino.it.


