Social networking studied

Pentagon hoping to create security policy without banning Twitter, Facebook sites

As Pentagon officials weigh the benefits and risks of social networking sites such as Twitter and Facebook, they hope to craft a policy that shores up security vulnerabilities without requiring

Meanwhile, the Marine

Corps has clarified its guidelines on social networking, and officials said they would consider the findings gleaned in the Pentagon policy review due out in late September.

Defense officials have said the policy review will attempt to balance the pros of social networking – such as its value

A report released Aug. 5 by Forbes magazine ranked the U.S. Military Academy as the top college in the country in its America's Best College review.

"Marked by an intense work ethic and drive to succeed on all fronts, the West Point undergraduate experience also allows graduates to leave without a penny of tuition loans to repay," Forbes stated in its release.

In the Forbes rating, West Point outpaced other highly-said

School bus office urges student compliance Officials hoping to stem previous problems with safety rules

e can't stress enough the importance of supporting the school bus rules with your children; the rules are there to ensure all our riders get to school safely ready to learn and return home safely ready to spend time with families.

Handbooks will be delivered with bus passes to your mailboxes this year, so you can discuss the contents with your children so safety is fresh in everyone's mind on the first day of school.

Last year we had particular trouble with a few safety rules on the bus that we'd like to emphasize.

1. Stay properly seated and wear the seat belt when available.

Italian law requires that seat belts be worn when present on the bus. Seat belts greatly decrease the risk of injury to riders involved in an accident.

2. Show the bus pass when boarding in the morning and the afternoon.

Force protection is a constant theme on and around any military community. Those bus passes tell the driver not only that the child is authorized to ride that particular bus,

but also which bus stop he or she is assigned to.

Just as parents need to show ID cards coming through the gate, bus riders need to show their bus passes boarding the school bus.

Losing a pass puts children at risk. The pass shows a picture of the child and where they get off the bus. Anyone who finds a lost pass knows what the owner looks like and where to find him or her coming home from

Make sure your child understands the importance of keeping positive control of the bus pass.

3. Do not throw objects on the bus. (Such as tennis balls)

The bus rules don't mention tennis balls specifically, but balls present a huge risk to the safety of everyone on the bus.

Tennis balls have a way of ending up on the floor and then going to one

of the lowest points on the bus – under the driver's feet. All it would take is for a ball to roll under the brake pedal at the wrong time to cause an accident.

Do not bring balls on the bus or keep them safely secured in backpacks where they can't cause problems.

4. Obey the adult on the bus.

On all of our buses we have two adults whose main priority is the safety of our riders.

Our drivers need to concentrate on the road and our security guides are there to watch out for any suspicious activity around the bus that could present a threat.

Additionally, both the drivers and guides are there to remind our riders about the rules and how to be safe on the bus. Because of the importance of this task, we expect prompt compliance with their instructions.

Explain to your children it's imperative they obey the adults on the

All of our rules are important for the safety of all of our bus riders.

Failure to follow the rules could result in suspension of bus-riding privileges, but more importantly, it could result in someone getting hurt.

Child Supervision To. From. and At the Bus Stop

DoDDS-Europe believes that primary age children should have adult supervision, preferably by their parents, when they go to, while they are at, and when they return from the bus stop.

Primary age children are usually defined as those in kindergarten through

It's important for our parents to understand that while this is DoDDS-E's recommendation, they must also remain in compliance with USAG-Vicenza's Commander's Policy Memorandum 08-42, Child Supervision, which is available at http://www.usag.vicenza.army.mil/sites/commander/ policy_letters.asp.

It is the parent's responsibility to supervise their children or to designate someone they trust to do so. Failure to comply could not only result in notification being sent to social work services, but could also result in your child being hurt.

Designating someone else to pick up or drop off your child at the bus stop is easy; a quick trip to the bus office to write the name on the original registration form is all you need to do.

Nip stress in the bud with legal help

Suicide prevention often conjures up thoughts of chaplains and mental health professionals.

Legal professionals rarely come to mind as one of the first resources. However, the same crises that trigger severe emotional stress, and even suicidal thoughts, can also create problems that require legal solutions.

According to Capt. Chayah Saahene, U.S. Army Africa's administrative and civil law attorney, seeking assistance from the servicing JAG office while deployed could do a great deal to alleviate stress and make problems seem less overwhelming.

"The two types of JAG officers

available to assist Soldiers during deployment are brigade judge advocates and the trial defense services," explained Saahene

"The brigade judge advocates might be able to assist Soldiers with civil and administrative issues back home, such as powers of attorney being mishandled or abused, bank accounts being wrongfully depleted, and divorce and child custody/ support issues," she said.

The JAG office can also try to assist clients by drafting revocations and new powers of attorney, assisting Soldiers in dealing with creditors, and contacting courts to delay proceedings until the Soldier has returned from deployment.

Problems back home can cause severe emotional distress have a domino effect

on other areas of a Soldier's life.

"For example, a bad break up may lead to alcohol abuse, which may lead to

missing formation or being late for work," she said. "In those instances, trial defense services is available to advise Soldiers on adverse actions such as Article 15s or other UCMJ actions."



Saahene

Saahene said community members should be aware of the services offered by their local legal professionals, "who can help alleviate your stress by addressing any legal issues. If things are going bad and you start to feel hopeless, please get help."

ranked schools such as Princeton (#2), Cal Tech (#3), Harvard (#5) and the U.S. Air Force Academy (#7).

"All of us at West Point are very proud that Forbes has rated us as the numberone college in the nation," said Brig. Gen.
Patrick Finnegan, dean of the Academic
Board at West Point. "This ranking
recognizes the exceptionally high quality
of a West Point education. It is always
exciting to be validated by independent
organizations."

The Center for College Affordability and Productivity staff gathered data from

a variety of sources, basing 25 percent of the rankings on 7 million student evaluations of courses and instructors, as recorded on the Web site RateMyProfessors.com. Another 25 percent of the ranking depended on how many of the school's alumni, adjusted for enrollment, were listed among the notable people in Who's Who in America.

The other half of the ranking were based equally on three factors:

- average amount of student debt at graduation held by those who borrowed
- percentage of students graduating in four years

• number of students or faculty, adjusted for enrollment, who have won nationally competitive awards like Rhodes Scholarships or Nobel Prizes.

West Point was founded in 1802 as America's first college of engineering. Its mission remains constant: to educate, train, and inspire cadets so that each graduate is a commissioned leader of character committed to the values of duty, honor, country and prepared for a career of service to the nation as an officer in the U.S. Army.

These measures also increase safety for all motorists and passengers as well.

This will certainly put a dent in your plan to get to your destination in a timely manner.

networking – such as its value for recruiting, public affairs and communication between troops and their families — against the potential security risks they create, which include violations of operations security, network vulnerability and bandwidth drain.

Asked if the Pentagon is leaning toward a policy that doesn't require a departmentwide ban, Pentagon spokesman Bryan Whitman replied, "I think certainly it is."

"We need to do this comprehensive review, determine what the vulnerabilities are, match that from being able to use these new tools and capabilities, and then try to establish a policy that will accommodate all of that," Whitman said in an interview Aug. 5.

Defense Secretary Robert M. Gates is slated to receive a report on the threats and benefits of Web 2.0 tools before the end of the month, and a departmentwide policy is due in late September.

Both Gates and Navy Adm. Mike Mullen, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, have embraced the new technologies.

The Pentagon's chief information officer is taking the

against the benefits we receive lead on the review, which was prompted by concerns raised at U.S. Strategic Command, officials said.

> Stratcom is responsible for overseeing the use of the "dotmil" network.

> For many junior-ranking troops, Youtube, MySpace and Facebook are more than mere diversions; they are the primary means through which young service members communicate with friends and families while on deployments.

> They also represent avenues for recruiting efforts and dialogue between commanders and military personnel and families, Whitman said.

"So it is a part of our society: it is pervasive," he said. "But we also have to be mindful that we don't do things that will impede our ability to do our core missions

Concern for maintaining operations security exists in cyberspace as it does in other social arenas, Whitman said.

He added that the military's operations security training regimen — which emphasizes practicing security at the source — also translates to social networking.

temperatures and handing out band-aids at Vicenza's health clinic, the U.S. Army Africa private first class wondered if he'd get a shot to take part in the command's new initiatives partnering with African militaries to promote stability on the continent.

Then, a few weeks back, Bateson, 21, got tapped to mentor in Djibouti – making him the most junior U.S. Army Africa Soldier to deploy to the continent. He accompanied Sgt. 1st Class Roddy Rieger to Camp Lemonier in early August, where the team led a weeklong course on how first aid and medical evacuations work in hostile zones – similar to the U.S. Army's combat lifesaver training.

"I know this material by heart. As medics, we know this as the simple stuff and it's not hard to teach it to others," Bateson said. "The Djiboutians were eager to learn and absorb this."

The team mentored 29 students from Djibouti's military,

ranging from junior enlisted troops to company-grade officers.

The five-day course included classroom instruction, hands-on exercises and a daylong test of the skills in a simulated hostile environment.

Rieger, 35, of Bismarck, N.D., a senior U.S. Army Africa NCO who served in Iraq and Afghanistan with the 173rd Airborne Brigade Combat Team,

knew that understanding both cultural and language issues would be the key to success. Rieger also relied on lessons from previous learned assignments in Tunisia and Morocco when building his lesson plans.

"It's all about how you communicate with individuals, no matter if they speak broken English, no English or even use hand signals," Rieger said. "It's

personnel from Combined Joint Task Force - Horn of Africa augmented the Army team. The mentoring is part of U.S. Army Africa's ongoing effort to support African partners with teams of Soldiers with niche capabilities such as logistics, legal affairs and medicine.

"This is my job, I'm an NCO and medicine is my passion," Rieger said. "If we helped just one Djiboutian, and he later uses that knowledge to save a life – that's what it's all about."

Now Bateson is back in garrison reflecting on an experience he sums up with one word – "cool."

"We were building a relationship between their country and ours - that's a big thing," Bateson said. "So much of this was about breaking down barriers and opening communication. I think we left them with a good impression."

The Heidelberg Golf Course will host the annual Rally for the Cure tournament Aug. 29.

The day-long outing – which includes the popular "best-dressed-man-in-pink" competition – begins at 7 a.m., with all proceeds from the Heidelberg Women's Golf Association event supporting Susan G. Komen foundations in Germany and the States.

Indeed, thanks to the support of the Heidelberg community, last year's tournament raised more than \$14,000, said Cheryl Sweeney, Rally for the Cure chairperson here.

The driving force behind the Rally, said Sweeney, is highlighting and increasing the awareness of monthly self exams, mammograms and a healthy life style as ways to minimize deaths due to breast cancer.
