# Final 173rd ABCT patroopers depart for Afghanistan mission

The last of the 173rd Airborne Brigade Combat Team Soldiers departed Caserma Ederle this week for their deployment to Afghanistan. The paratroopers' mission is to replace forces currently deployed to

Afghanistan to maintain the capabilities of NATO's International Security Assistance Forces, according to the Department of

They are among the first American Soldiers to arrive in Afghanistan since President Barack Obama's announcement of a troop surge, although their deployment was announced in July and is not a result of

the surge plan.

The majority of the troops are already on the ground in Afghanistan and are ready for their mission, said Maj. Steven Williams, 173rd ABCT rear-detachment commander.

"The Soldiers are absolutely motivated and prepared to go," Williams said. "Their morale is high. They are prepared to fight

## H1N1 vaccine now available to all authorized beneficiaries

Army health clinics will begin vaccinating all authorized beneficiaries with H1N1 Influenza vaccine using all existing stocks, Europe Regional Medical Command officials announced

The decision frees immunization clinic staffs to use vaccine stocks regardless of whether or not they were purchased for uniformed service members.

"All authorized beneficiaries should check with their local immunization clinic for times and locations where the vaccine will be available," said Col. Theresa Moser, director, Force Health Protection, Europe Regional Medical Command.

She said clinics will be bound by the vaccine's FDA-approved age range. Those ranges are: Sanofi-Pasteur, six months and up; and Novartis, four years and up. Other than that, any beneficiary may receive either Sanofi-Pasteur or Novartis H1N1 vaccine without restriction.

More vaccine is on its way. This decision makes the vaccine available now for all beneficiaries. It's expected that the move will help reduce the risk of the spread of the disease during the holidays, Moser said.

# AAFES extends holiday exchange/refund policy

Military shoppers checking off their holiday lists at Army & Air Force Exchange Service facilities between Thanksgiving and Christmas can breathe a little easier if gifts don't measure up as AAFES has extended its refund and exchange policy for the holidays.

While AAFES' policy states that items in new condition may be exchanged or returned within 15, 30 or 90 days with a receipt, the new holiday return/ exchange policy will extend these guidelines through Jan. 31 for items purchased between Nov. 26-Dec. 24.

"With the great deals that AAFES offered over the Black Friday weekend, it's very likely that many purchases were for presents," said AAFES' Chief of Staff Col. Virgil Williams. "If the gift is the wrong size, fit or style, we want to ensure military shoppers get exactly what they want to enjoy through the New Year."

The extended holiday return and exchange policy will end Jan. 31 at which time the standard return policy will go back into effect.

# Drive carefully; black ice is on the way

Approximately a quarter of all automobile accidents in the United States are caused by adverse weather conditions.

Driving during the winter presents a number of hazards; the deadliest of all winter driving hazards is encountering black ice

#### What is black ice?

It is a layer of ice on a road thin enough to be almost completely clear.

When this occurs it is nearly impossible for a driver to see. Often black ice will form in shaded areas, near lakes or rivers, in tunnels, on overpasses

and bridges and patches along the road. The possibility of encountering black ice is greatest when temperatures are near or below freezing.

Note that road surfaces can freeze long before water freezes; black ice can form on roads when air temperatures are 40 degrees F.

Drivers can help neutralize the risk by taking the following precautions:

- Identify and become familiar with areas prone to black ice during your daily travels.
- Check your tires; are they designed for winter driving and what's there condition.
- Increase separation between vehicles, prepare in advance for engaging intersections, traffic circles, turns and stops. Always forewarn others of your intentions.
- Keep your vision clear; clean and clear windows and lights allows better visibility.
  - Slow down and buckle up.

The EEO Office is recruiting for collateral duty Special Emphasis Program managers (SEPMs) to assist USAG Vicenza in managing the following programs: Federal Women's, Hispanic Employment, People With Disabilities and the Selective Placement Program for Individuals With Disabilities, Black/African American Employment, American Indian/Alaska Native

An individual development plan will be developed to formally train



# Local negotiations net pay raise, improved retirement

Carpenter and UILTuCS-UIL acting president Robert Frizzo (for Monica Brazzale) spoke to employees during the late afternoon gathering on a range of topics, including:

- a 4.72 percent pay raise which went into effect Sept. 1;
- a negotiated increase in the complementary retirement plan which increased employer contributions by 50 percent as of Sept. 1;
- and the unions' move to Bldg. 246. Carpenter said what was previously a cramped office with inadequate privacy to conduct business has been replaced by two new offices, a conference room and storage area, with all new furniture.

He said there were times when up to 20 people would gather at the cluttered old one-room union office for meetings and many people would have to wait outside.

"It was too small. We couldn't fit them in. On a scale of one to 10, our old accommodations were zero and the new is a 10," laughed Carpenter.

Vicenza CISL provincial president, Luigi Copiello, also spoke at the employee assembly, highlighting the union's contributions to the City of Vicenza and the installation. Copiello gave a brief history of Dal Molin, a new military base that will house 173rd Airborne Brigade Combat Team barracks and offices, and explained how both the unions worked to help iron out issues surrounding the controversial project. Copiello pointed out that the new union office is evidence of local negotiations, and that these should expand to cover other benefits, to reflect the prevailing practices in Italy which provide for a national and a local level of negotiation.

USAG Vicenza Garrison Commander Col. Eric Daiga addressed the audience in Italian, expressing his appreciation for the local national workforce.

Working closely with the U.S. military command on the Dal Molin issue is one of the reasons for the unions' improved U.S.-Italian relationship. Before Dal Molin, said Carpenter, the relationship between the union and the U.S. command group at Caserma Ederle was practically nonexistent.

Today, he called it a very strong, very

good relationship.

Tony Marino, a human resources specialist for the International Personnel Policy Division, is a U.S. liaison for the unions and said a full 50 percent of Caserma Ederle's host nation employees are paid union members, an important reason for good relations.

"The unions represent our host nation workforce and that host nation workforce is 75 percent of the total number of employees on our installations," said Marino. "They are the backbone of our operations. And the union representatives raise issues which affect these employees—their working conditions, labor contract, grading and so forth," he said. "Cooperation is essential to smooth operations."

and do what is expected of them."

After the Soldiers said final goodbyes to family and friends, they gathered in the Directorate of Logistics motor pool area to ensure one last time they had all necessary shots, and to check their dog tags and ID cards. Vicenza is the only garrison in Europe that provides full-spectrum deployment support operations to tenant units such as the 173rd, U.S. Army Africa forces and other units within its area of operation.

The support begins at Vicenza with staging, marshalling and container movement, follows on to preparing troops and families for deployment and finishes when the last aircraft touches down at its destination. As soon as all personnel and materiel are accounted for, Vicenza personnel start planning for the redeployment, according to Greg Hutcheson, operations

officer, Directorate of Logistics, USAG Vicenza.

From Vicenza, the troops went to Aviano Air Base, northeast of Vicenza near the Austrian border. USAG Vicenza manages the administration and operations area for arrivals and departures, and the personnel alert holding area (PAHA) at Aviano where Soldiers wait to board aircraft.

The PAHA is a deployment staging area where as many as 1,000 service members can wait in a comfortable, temperature-controlled environment. While they wait, they have access to meals and beverages, multiple televisions, showers and bathrooms and specially designed seating which allows paratroopers rigged to jump to sit comfortably while wearing all their equipment.

Nearly 700 Soldiers processed through the PAHA Dec. 9 when Soldiers from Headquarters and Headquarters Company, and the 1st and 2nd Battalions (Airborne),

503rd Infantry Regiment, departed Caserma Ederle.

Chefs from Vicenza's South of the Alps dining facility brought food to the PAHA so troops could have a hot meal before loading onto planes. The troops were also met by Air Force spouses and retirees taking part in Operation Yellow Ribbon.

The volunteers brought extra goodies for the troops, including homemade cupcakes, a roasted turkey, sandwich makings and other snacks. The volunteers in the Aviano chapter of Operation Yellow Ribbon have served thousands of service members in the past five years, said Noel Parks, an Air Force retiree who volunteers with the organization.

"We try to meet every aircraft with deploying or redeploying troops," Parks said. "We want them to know we care, and if we can make them a little more comfortable while they're waiting, it's worth all the work."

# MPs, DES focus on security with active shooter training

Dealing with deadly rampages was the focus of training for more than 30 military police and emergency service personnel from Caserma Ederle's 464th MP and Camp Darby's 511th MP platoons at Vicenza Friday.

Known as active shooter training, it featured classroom and hands-on scenarios designed to help prepare MPs for situations in which they may be unexpectedly forced to deal with extremely dangerous individuals.

"This training makes our MPs better able to protect our community and it also helps us to better support the local Carabinieri in any situation, "said DES Deputy Director Adeal Frater.

After last month's mass shooting in which 13 people were killed and 30 were wounded at Fort Hood, Texas, the training seemed particularly relevant.

"This training primarily equates to saving lives. It teaches the MPs to be more aggressive and accurate when responding to an ongoing situation where lives are at stake," said Frater. "Although we do not have primary jurisdiction in Italy, we will be able to support our host nation authorities better with this type of training."

The MPS started with several hours of classroom instruction covering reallife scenarios which demonstrated that if police had been schooled in active shooter training, they could have saved countless lives, said Frater.

The afternoon focused heavily on hands-on, fast-action shoot-and-move techniques in three to four-man teams to take out a hostile shooter in different situations. Building-search tactics, room entry and clearing at the installation's shoot house were also key training tasks.

"What's significant about this is that our military police want to know what to do in any given situation and it's up to us as leaders to ensure they get the equipment and training instruction they need," he said.

Instruction, provided by Special Agent Nick Ivanovic of the Kaiserslautern Criminal Investigation Division Office also covered rescue team tactics, approaching and breaching buildings

and low-light, close-quarters conflict.

Frater said the MPs leave the course with a better knowledge of their weaknesses they need to work on and confidence in their ability to find and engage an active shooter.

Although all law of the garrisons'

enforcement personnel were unable to attend, "the training was conducted in such a way that the MPs who attended can go out and train others. It was trainthe-trainer," said 1st Lt. Daniel McCarey, MP operations OIC for Vicenza and Livorno.

# CAS celebrate century of service A local Soldier's journey as a chaplain assistant

On Sept. 10, 2001, Tokovia Sanda was a bank manager at Bank of America headquarters in Charlotte, North Carolina. Her path in life would change forever the next day.

Sanda's sister, Desiree Rahman, was in one of the World Trade Center towers during the Sept. 11, 2001 terrorist attacks. After the planes crashed into the building, Rahman jumped from the building, surviving with broken bones and managing to render first aid to other victims before she walked from Manhattan to Brooklyn.

Sanda said she waited anxiously to hear from her. Watching all of the military and first responders working together rescuing people from the wreckage changed something in Sanda's heart that day.

"I felt a strong calling to serve my country and knew immediately I wanted be a Soldier and do my patriotic duty," said Sanda. "I didn't care about the loss of money or prestige. I wanted to join the Army and follow my spiritual calling."

At the time Sanda was a Muslim.

Within 30 days of going to a military entrance processing station, she went off to basic training to become a chaplain assistant. And to her drill sergeant's dismay, she arrived in the style of the 1981 Private Benjamin film starring Goldie Hawn—with her pajamas, lingerie, facial cream and perfume all packed in stylishly matched luggage.

"I was 34 and really didn't know what to expect, but by the time basic was ending, I asked my drill sergeant if I could march my company back on the final ruck march," said Sanda.

During her advanced individual training at Fort Jackson, S.C., she learned about the different religious services and how to conduct peer counseling and suicide intervention. She learned to pull security for her chaplain whenever in a combat area as chaplains do not bear arms. While

still undergoing training at Fort Jackson, she had to prevent her fellow Muslim roommate from committing suicide.

"There's more to being a chaplain assistant then handing out Bibles and counting church attendance," said Sanda. "You have to be versatile because you can be assigned to any unit and you deal with all ranks that are having problems. Part of the job is to be approachable and visible. You've got to be the one people come to and trust because of your confidentiality."

Sanda recounted how during her first duty station at Redstone Arsenal, Ala., with the spiritual guidance of Chaplain Mizernai, a Masonic Jew, she converted to Christianity.

Afterwards, she went to Suwon, Korea, where she quickly learned how to deal with a lot of suicide attempts, alcohol abuse and abuse relationships.

"I would go on street patrols with my chaplain and help round up drunk Soldiers and offer help," said Sanda. "There I lost a Soldier who got struck by lightning and died in my chaplain's arms as we were administering the last rites."

"When you're dealing with suicides and abuse, it's important to remember that you can be sympathetic and empathetic, but you can't take on other individuals' problems," she explained. "I strengthen my mind with prayer and staying in the Word and my body with exercise so I can advise and council to the best of my ability."

Dec. 16 marked the 100th anniversary of chaplain assistants in the military. Sanda, a six-year veteran, said she's proud to be a member of the chaplaincy and knows there's nothing she would rather do.

"I am proud to be a part of the awesome historic accomplishment of providing help to others spiritually" said Sanda. "This defines what we are about and how in the past we gave honor to Soldiers and families."

Sanda and her family will leave Camp Darby in January for her next assignment in Heidelberg, Germany.
