173rd ABCT Soldier

173rd ABCT PAO staff report

Pvt. Michael Jacob Cumpston, 19, 2nd Battalion, 503rd Infantry Regiment, died Saturday around 2 a.m. from injuries after falling from a building in Florence under unknown circumstances. The incident is under investigation in cooperation with the Italian police.

"First and foremost, our thoughts and prayers are with Pvt. Cumpston's family," said Col. Kyle Lear, commander of the 173rd Airborne Brigade Combat Team. "Our brigade is here for them 24-7.

"The brigade is treating this seriously, and we have met with leaders across the garrison this week to discuss the incident in detail. The garrison leadership's actions and those of the local Italian authorities have been exemplary. Our intent is to better understand what occurred and to ensure we are doing absolutely everything possible to prevent the tragic loss of one of our Sky Soldiers again."

Net Zero is 100 percent benefit for Army resource management

resources on its installations: they will become net

That is, as we go about the complex business of living, working and training on installations, our use and production of resources will balance out, so that in the end, we do not over-consume or waste. The most exciting part of the Army Net Zero vision is this: we all have a part to play in achieving it.

When the concept of net zero was first applied to installations, it was for energy. A task force that grew out of a 2008 joint initiative of the Departments of Defense and Energy studied the possibility of net zero energy installations, or installations that produce as much energy on site as

they use over the course of a year. Army Net Zero goes beyond energy to include water and waste.

Army Net Zero's holistic approach increases our ability to achieve the larger goal of sustainable installations. With an eye to all three, energy, water and waste, we are more likely to move beyond isolated projects, which carry the risk of succeeding in one area at the expense of another, to an integrated plan that balances benefits and costs across our operations.

Installations reach net zero through five interrelated steps: reduction, repurposing, recycling and composting, energy recovery and disposal. To achieve net zero energy, garrisons start with aggressive conservation efforts, to reduce the amount of energy being used. Then they repurpose energy, or find secondary uses for building exhausts, boiler stack exhausts and other thermal energy streams, and recover heat from the electricity generation process. Once they have reduced through conservation and efficiency measures, they can meet remaining requirements through renewable or alternative energy projects.

A net zero water installation limits the consumption of fresh water and returns water back to the same watershed, so as not to deplete the ground and surface water resources of the region in quantity or quality. Installations aiming for net zero water begin with rigorous conservation. Then they repurpose the water used in showers, sinks, washing machines and cooling towers, capture rainwater for onsite use, and treat wastewater for recharging into aquifers. They achieve net zero water by capturing, repurposing, and recharging an amount equal to what they consume.

A net zero installation reduces, reuses and recovers waste streams, converting them to resource values with zero landfill. In other words, a net zero waste installation aims to make disposal an unnecessary step. Garrisons start by reducing the initial amount of waste, and then find ways to repurpose waste with minimal processing. For example, they might crush construction rubble to use on trails. When

The Army has a bold vision for managing natural they cannot reuse waste, they recycle or compost as much as they can or convert it to energy. They achieve net zero waste when they have nothing left to send to the landfill.

> During my site visits over the past year, I have seen how our garrisons have taken steps—great strides in some cases—to manage our resources more efficiently. Look at the water projects at Forts Huachuca, Bliss and Belvoir; the waste management projects at Forts Bragg and Jackson and Joint Base Lewis-McChord; and the energy projects at Forts Drum, Wainwright, Carson and Campbell, to name just a few. So I know there will be tremendous interest in an opportunity the Assistant Secretary of the Army for Installations, Energy and Environment is launching this month. The ASA (IE&E) is asking garrisons to nominate themselves to become Net Zero Energy, Net Zero Water or Net Zero Waste installations, or all three, by 2020. Five will be selected in each category, with one to become all three. They will receive long-term, in-depth training and support and become showcases for the strategies, technologies and best practices of sustainable resource management.

> I encourage every garrison to take on this challenge. It will require commitment and a lot of hard work. Not only do we have to learn about energy, water and waste management best practices and technologies, but we also have to learn the business practices that support them. We have to build partnerships with those in the private sector and in non-government organizations who will join us in investing in the net zero vision. This is a prime opportunity to learn lessons we will be required to know in the future.

> Everyone, every Soldier, Civilian and Family member, has a role to play. Maybe it seems like a smaller role turning out the lights, adjusting the thermostat, or separating recyclables at home. Maybe it is a more direct role, such as running an installation waste management program or writing enhanced use leases or energy savings performance contracts. Regardless, every effort adds up, and what it adds up to is important—our future.

> Energy efficiency and security is a critical issue for the Army. The Army depends on a reliable, safe, cost-effective supply of energy to accomplish its mission, as well as provide a good quality of life for Soldiers, Civilians and Families on installations worldwide. To the extent that the supply and distribution of energy lay outside the Army's control, the ability to accomplish our mission is open to risk. The same can be said of water, or practically any of our resources. If the Army is to accomplish its mission in the future, if we want to be good neighbors to those outside our gates and to leave a healthy world for our children and grandchildren, then we have to start operating sustainably today. It is the right thing to do.

Hogg said it is a pleasure to be able to actually contribute to the children's education. Not only is it important for leaders, it is a responsibility for leaders to get involved in the education of our children.

"Just like parents have a responsibility for their kids, I think leaders have a responsibility to reinforce some of those things that the parents provide and that our schools provide," Hogg said. "When you throw something different out there, the kids perk-up and ask some really interesting questions - plus, it's fun, enjoyable and worthwhile," he said.

The commander is not the only one who enjoyed his time. Seventh grade student James Jones thought it was a pleasant surprise to have the commanding general take his teacher's place for a class.

"It was good for us to learn a little bit more about Africa," Jones said. "It gives us more insight into someone who has been to Africa because it makes it more real than simply studying it from a map and textbook," he said.

The commander's souvenirs were a big hit.

"Since the general brought in some masks, coins and different things from the countries he has visited, I think that now I will start collecting more souvenirs from countries my parents take me to visit so I can show my friends," Jones said.

George Hanby, World Geography teacher at VMS, said his students have moved frequently and most have lived in different states, countries and continents. For them to know more about the geography of the area where they're living gives them a better appreciation of what is available.

"My students learned a lot about what the general is doing - the connection he is making," Hanby said. "One important item he said was 'building relationships,' and I think that's where you get right down to it. You can have different political views, different languages, different ethnic backgrounds, different environments, but if you build relationships with people and they know who you are then that's really how we make a connection in the world," he said.

Exercise aims to heighten security awareness

The sound of gunfire in an empty building were loud enough to set off the fire alarm, adding to the realism of the active shooter training at Camp Darby Jan. 27.

Camp Darby's 511th Military Police Company conducted active shooting training in the old barracks to learn how to be more efficient in reacting to a real situation.

"The Soldiers are practicing simulating different scenarios to cover most of the unexpected threats that can possibly rise," said Staff Sgt. Robert Everly, 511th MPs operations sergeant.

Prior to this training, the MPs were briefed on the proper response techniques and on the scenario they were facing. Everly added that this training is very important to enforce the prompt reaction of the military police to better protect the community.

"It is important for the community to have better prepared Soldiers in case of a real threat," said Sgt. Raymond Collazo, one of the military police involved with the exercise.

The training is held in addition to the federal law enforcement training MPs receive at the Military Police academy, and keeps them up to date on emerging threats, Everly said. This type of training is ongoing at many military installations and other governmental agencies.

"We learn a lot and get the feeling on how we should react in a real life situation, reacting better and reducing the casualties" said Spc. Charles Allen.

The training was also extended to the Camp Darby civilian population to promote security and awareness.

"It is essential that the entire workforce is trained on active shooter," said Everly. "They will be trained on what the MPs are looking for and on what information is important that they provide if ever

caught in that situation."

Allen said, "If the civilians are aware of how we respond it will make our job easier and help them too."

Teachers and staff at Livorno Unit Elementary and Middle School were among the many who have received the training.

"This instruction offered us an opportunity to take the time to reflect on what should be done to get the children

safe in the shortest time," said School Principal Daniel Serfass. "History shows how important it is to keep our children safe both emotionally and physically."

Teacher Stephanie Boyanowski added, "The more knowledge we have the better service we can provide."

Arezzo antique market, sightseeing locations offer treasures

For those interested in shopping for antiques in Tuscany, Arezzo's antique market has been running the first weekend of each month for the past 42 years.

Arezzo has been featured in movies and books. More than 500 vendors show their products within the old town walls. The Piazza Grande where the market is located is circled by historic buildings.

Arezzo is built on a hill, and wearing comfortable shoes can be a benefit. Climbing the hill from the parking areas to the walled city, you can stop to admire the San Domenico Church and the restored Cimabue Cross.

From there, it is possible to reach San Francesco church where the Piero della Francesca frescos have just been restored to their original splendor with just a short walk. You can also visit the cathedral on

top of the hill, if you don't mind more uphill climbing. The shops and restaurants also offer a variety of local

delicacies and products.



The Arezzo antique market takes place the first weekend of every month and features more than 500 vendors. The historic, Tuscany town is about a 90-minute drive from Camp Darby.

How to get there: From Camp Darby, drive towards Florence on the Fi-Pi-LI and take the A1 to the Arezzo exit. The trip takes approximately 90 minutes. The Pietri parking area in Arezzo offers free parking.

A wealthy nobleman, Tommaso Da Vico, donated a large sum for poor people to buy flour and make gnocchi. Da Vico ordered in his will for gnocchi and wine to be given to the people of Saint Zeno's every year on the last Friday before Lent, now called called "Venerdì gnocolar" (gnocchi's Friday). Today there is a parade through downtown Verona to Saint Zeno's Church led by Papà de' gnocco (Gnocchi's Dad). A costumed man represents an old king holding a large fork topped by a big gnocco, instead of a scepter. The man who wears this costume is elected in Saint Zeno's square a month before the event. Candidates try to buy people's vote by offering gnocchi and wine.
