173d ABCT trains up on new command post communication system

On today's battlefield new technology plays a critical role in giving Army commanders an edge. The difference between success and failure often is influenced by sophisticated communication networks and battlefield intelligence which enhances the commander's capability to make crucial decisions.

To ensure the success of future missions, the 173d Airborne Brigade Combat Team Tactical Operating Center is receiving the latest in TOC network internal communications equipment.

Selected Soldiers from the brigade's Operations, Communcations, and Personnel sections participated in Command Post Communication System (CPCS) training in Grafenwoehr, Germany Jan. 17-29.

The new system will standardize battlefield capabilities in TOCs across the Army.

"Communication is vital to warfare," said Spc. Torey Jackson, Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 173d ABCT. "This new system will help commanders have a more reliable communication system that offers more options than previous systems."

The TOC network system provides a modular, expandable approach to voice and data communication.

The TOCNET system consists of six different types of line replacement units, micro central switching unit (provides central processing and interface functions), crew access unit (main interface unit), desktop and enhanced desktop (interface unit), onboard crew access unit (vehicle interface unit) and TOCNET transit case.

Multiple nodes (up to 64) can be

networked together to form a larger system with up to 1024 assets (simultaneous communication assets/channels, i.e., computer terminal or telephones).

Units deploying to hostile areas are being fielded the system first.

One of the benefits of the CPCS is that it enables a Soldier to be able to walk into any TOC, regardless of the unit or environment, and be familiar with its capabilities and operation, according to Jackson.

At the moment, the CPCS is C-130 deployable, but soon, it will be possible to air drop the equipment.

"It will provide a proficient tactical network for the combat team to monitor the battlefield in a real time scenario," said Staff Sgt. Daryl Stewart, NCOIC of automations for the 173d ABCT.

The 173d ABCT will be fielded two CPCSs before deploying to Iraq later this year, said Sgt. Mark Lugo, HHC, 173d ABCT.

National Security Personnel System employee training begins in Vicenza

Editor's note: The first NSPS employee training classes for the Vicenza community were held Tuesday through Thursday in the Hall of Heroes. Below is information about what the employees can expect from the class.

Q: What does the training class encompass?

A: The overall training consists of an overview of the major changes in each of the Human Resources functional areas. Then we cover in-depth training in the areas of: the procedural process for conversion to NSPS; classification under NSPS; Staffing and Recruiting changes under NSPS; compensation/pay setting under NSPS; and performance management under NSPS.

Q: Where else is this information available?

A: Much of the information covered in the training is available in various forms on the Department of Defense and Department of the Army NSPS Web sites. Most of the basic information is available in a myriad of brochures and booklets that have been published by both DoD and DA.

Q: What is the most common concern employees express about the NSPS transition?

A: So far, the biggest concerns of the employees who have attended these first sessions are the affect on their current pay at time of conversion, the impact on overseas unique benefits and allowances (LQA, post allowance), and the new performance management system, since it will have a major impact on future pay raises.

Q: Why are we attending the training? If we don't have a choice about moving to NSPS,

why can't we just get a brochure and read about the program?

A: The training goes a little deeper than the technical information available online and offers more comparisons to current familiar practices and policies to better focus on the real differences. Also, the training offers the opportunity to request clarification, apply the NSPS to real situations, and to ask personal questions regarding how NSPS might affect individual situations.

Q: What is the most important information you hope employees will take away from the training?

A: The most important information that employees can take away from the training is that they will suffer no loss of pay under NSPS, and that NSPS gives them the potential to be better recognized for their contributions to the mission than the current GS system; that the pay banding and pay for performance system work, and that some Federal agencies

have been under NSPS-like systems for more than 20 years and have very successful experiences. Hopefully, when they complete the training, the level of skepticism will be reduced. It is important for employees to get smart concerning NSPS so that they can take advantage of some of the new flexibilities the system offers and better manage their Federal career.

Q: If employees still have concerns, where can they turn for help?

A: Both DoD and DA have Web sites totally devoted to NSPS issues and are regularly updated. Also, on both the USAG Vicenza and Lion Net Web sites, viewers will find the NSPS logo. Click on the logo and then fill out the form with a specific issue and e-mail it to the CPAC, or click on the 'NSPS Home Page' link for more information. Inclement weather procedures

In the event of inclement weather, upon the approval of Col. Virgil S.L. Williams, USAG Vicenza commander, AFN Vicenza will broadcast no later than 6 a.m. over AFN radio 106FM, and the Command Information Channel, AFN receiver channel 12, for a two-hour delay or closure information for schools and the installation.

Personnel without access to AFN radio or television can contact the Southern European Operations Center (SEOC) at 0444-71-7520/7720 off post, or 634-7520/7720 from DSN lines, for delay or closure information.

All installation units and agencies will be responsible for activating their internal phone rosters to contact and inform their Soldiers and civilian employees.

The DODDS school management will inform their employees and transportation assets

In the event of early school closure, the DODDS Student Transportation office will inform the USAG Vicenza commander, who will relay the information to the SEOC.

The SEOC will then contact all units and agencies on the installation and inform them of the early closure.

In the event of inclement weather,

parents are advised to allow their children to be transported home through normal means (contracted bus).

If parents must pick up their children, please coordinate with the school office to ensure proper accountability for all students.

In the event a student cannot be dropped off at home (no parent or guardian available) student(s) will be returned to the school bus office and the school bus office will contact the parents or guardians.

The command encourages you to identify yourself when submitting a CAC issue in order to be able to answer your concern directly.

The command also reminds the community that CAC issues submitted containing vulgar, derogatory or inflammatory language will not be addressed.

Childcare is offered during the CAC at \$4 per hour, per child, for children ages 6 weeks old through kindergarten from 8:45-11:15 a.m. Preregistration is required.

The next CAC will be **Thursday, March 1** beginning at 10 a.m. in Club Veneto.

Issue: There are many families who have installed fences in the back yard of their Villaggio residence. There are many fences

which are not installed properly (e.g. cracks, inappropriate heights, etc). Animals are not secured within the fenced areas as they are able to jump over fences as well as slip through cracks. This poses a danger to Villaggio residents.

Response from Directorate of Public Works: Thank you for bringing this to our attention. A comprehensive survey of all Villaggio fences was conducted by the Housing Office and a formal report of the results sent through the DPW to USAG Vicenza Headquarters by the end of November 2006.

Occupants of units whose fences did not meet acceptable standards were provided a written notice of the specific discrepancies and given 30 days to take corrective action or have the fence removed.

Improper fencing is not only a neighborhood eye sore, but can also pose a serious safety hazard to children and pets in particular.

Before a Villaggio sponsor can install a privately owned fence in Villaggio, a formal written request must be processed through the Housing Office, to include a diagram of the proposed fence and a description of fence materials to be used. Prior to "final" approval,

Housing will conduct a site visit, within 30-days, to ensure that standards are enforced.

UPDATE: Dec. 15: 1. As a follow up on this issue a 100 percent inspection was performed.

2. A total of 109 discrepancies were identified ranging from minor infractions such as a bent support pole or broken tie wire to fences that utilized non-authorized materials and were in an extremely bad state of repair.

3. Discrepancy notifications initially allowed 30 calendar days from the date of inspection to perform necessary repairs and/ or modifications or remove the fence. Occupants were further instructed to contact the Housing Division for re-inspection of the fence once modifications had been performed.

4. Because of the fact that approximately 40 occupants called requesting an inspector on-site to explain in person the deficiencies and required corrective actions, in conjunction with the volume of follow on inspections that had to be scheduled and performed, occupants were given an extension of until Jan. 15 to correct deficiencies.

After that date, Housing Division would initiate a re-inspection of all Villaggio fences that have not been modified and approved to evaluate for removal or further action with the occupants.

5. Of the initial 109 fence discrepancies 21 have been modified and approved and 4 have been removed by the occupants.

6. The Housing Division will continue to track progress and provide updated status. *Issue:* I would like to know if AAFES

could coordinate with DoDDS and establish a movie plan for the holidays, spring break, etc. Family movies and matinees are needed during this time.

Response from AAFES: Beginning mid-February AAFES will change the Saturday movie schedule to reflect the 1 p.m. start time on Saturdays.

This change will affect the 4 p.m. family movie and will serve as a matinee-type schedule playing only family movies during this time frame.

As discussed and suggested during previous CAC meetings, AAFES will also begin a spring schedule that will encourage families to attend matinee movies during spring break.

A request to Theater Express has been submitted to order multiple movies during this time frame so AAFES may show movies during the afternoon hours.

The plan for family friendly movies – movies during the time frame expressed above – will be limited to "family-friendly movies".

A request has been submitted to Theater REEL Time to order children's movies so that we can meet the multiple play requests.

Currently when family-type movies are scheduled some are first run movies and follow a strict schedule.

However, with the addition of Disney Classics that we can keep on hand, we will be able to meet this request.

We are looking forward to this change and will put a marketing package together for both the Saturday change and the change during the spring and summer breaks.

Have no fear, Vicenza Tax Center is here

The USASETAF Tax Center is now open. All services at the Tax Center are **FREE OF CHARGE**, and include the following:

- ◆ Electronic preparation and filing of your 2006 state and federal income tax returns
- Direct deposit of state and federal refunds to your account
 - ◆ Select IRS forms and publications
 - Preparation of prior year returns
 - Preparation of Puerto Rico returns
- ◆ Assistance obtaining Taxpayer Identification Numbers for non-U.S. citizen family members
- General information and assistance concerning income tax obligations

Income tax assistance is provided by clerks, paralegals, and lawyers who have received IRS and Army income tax instruction, and includes preparation of returns using TaxWise software and IRS forms.

Individuals eligible for free tax assistance include active duty and retired soldiers, U.S. civilian employees (DOD, DA, NAF, AAFES, and DoDEA), and their family members.

Simple State and Federal Income Tax Returns

Taxpayers who will file a simple 2006 return can come to the Tax Center on a walk-in basis

for assistance, or can drop-off documents for preparation. Simple returns are those supported by information commonly issued by employers, banks, or other agencies reporting income or expenses during 2006.

Walk-In Tax Services

Walk-in services are available Monday through Friday, 9 a.m.- 12 p.m. and 1-4 p.m.

Evening Hours

The Tax Center will be open until 7 p.m. on three consecutive Thursdays: Feb. 22, March 1 and March 8.

Weekend Hours

The Tax Center will be open 9 a.m.-12 p.m. Feb. 24 and March 3.

Complicated State and Federal Income Tax Returns

Complicated return assistance is available as a drop-off service.

Individuals with complicated tax issues may drop off their tax documents any time the Legal Assistance Office is open, Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. - noon and 1-5 p.m. Complicated returns will be prepared in the order received, and will normally be completed within five business days.

Individuals with less than \$52,000 of adjusted gross income can electronically prepare and file returns for free at the IRS website, www.irs.gov.


Servicemembers can also electronically prepare and file 2006 returns online at no charge by going to the Military One Source site, www.militaryone source.com.

Important Tax information

- ◆ 2006 Tax returns are due April 16, 2007.
- ◆ If you are outside the U.S. on April 16, 2007, your filing deadline is June 15, 2007.

However, if you owe money on your taxes, you must pay the tax by April 16, 2007 to avoid any penalty or interest, even if you are outside the U.S. on that day.



- If you served in a Combat Zone, your tax filing date is 180 days after you depart the Combat Zone, or your regular filing date (April 16 or June 15), whichever is later.



he Vicenza High School

their only home tournament
this year Jan. 20, in the fitness center
gym.

The Cougars took second place competing against Naples, Aviano and Sigonella.

"We beat Aviano, but we can't beat Naples because they have twice as many wrestlers as we do," explained VHS coach George Hanby, after the successful day. "However, we are doing a pretty good job,"

"Four of our wrestlers took first place. We have three Kyles on the team and they all took first place. At 112 lbs, Kyle Hinton; at 140 lbs, his brother Shane Hinton; at 152 lbs, Kyle Stammer, and at 160 lbs Kyle Kaus," he continued.

Vicenza took also two second place finishes at 119 lbs, Shaun Mahadeo and at 189 lbs, Chris Bell, and two third place finishers, one at 125 lbs with Mark Bowman, and the other at 130 lbs with Tyler Perry.

"It has been hard for us to beat Aviano, because they have always had more wrestlers than we have," said Hanby. "But, this is the first year that the Vicenza team can count on 15 guys at the most, wrestling from high school."

About six wrestlers arrived from Sigonella, 26 from Naples, and 12 from Aviano for this event.

The Cougar wrestling team, a group of 12 who competed in the jamboree were:

Kyle Hinton – 112 lbs; Taylor Touzinsky - 112 lbs; Shaun Mahadeo – 119 lbs; Marc Bowman - 125 lbs; Tyler Perry - 130 lbs; Shane Hinton-team captain - 140 lbs; Jonathan Bowman - 145 lbs; Kyle Stammer-team co-captain - 152 lbs; Joe Guthrie - 152 lbs; Kyle Kaus - 160 lbs; Nick Bowman - 171 lbs; Chris Bell - 189 lbs. According to Hanby, during the event also a couple of exhibition matches with middle school wrestlers took place.

Vicenza Middle schoolers who were allowed to compete in the exhibition were: Adam Coombs, Dustin Gryder, Alex Miller, Sawyer Settlemire, Mark Ross, and Tim Loney.

The next jamboree takes place in Rome Feb. 3, while the Sectional Qualifying Tournament for Europeans will take place in Aviano Feb. 10.

Only the top two wrestlers in each weight bracket will compete at the Europeans, which will take place in Wiesbaden, Germany, the following weekend on Feb. 16.

"They [VHS wrestlers] have learned all the moves they need, so right now they are just working on conditioning and drilling the moves they have"

The team has been wrestling every day since November and right now they are working harder to get ready for the finals.

Some wrestlers are not new at this experience.


"This is my second year as a captain and I was a co-captain the year before," Hinton explained after one of his daily practices.

"As a captain there is a lot more pressure, and sometimes you have really bad days. The hardest part probably is motivating them, [team's wrestlers] keeping them on track.

"We have another meeting in Rome before we have the sectionals in Aviano, where the top two wrestlers from each weight class will go on to Wiesbaden for the European Championship," said Hinton. "I have been there last year and the year before. I placed fourth last year, but this year I think I have a good chance of a first place win."

"This is cool. Now instead of running cables from roomto-room in the barracks when we want to play against each other, we'll be able to come to the DCC instead," said Woody as he double checked his measurements of the cable ports.

"This gets us out of the barracks and the Xbox 360 delivers the power and performance of a high-end gaming PC, with an

impressive 5.1 digital audio, graphic resolution up to 1080i and up to four wireless controllers," added Haraschak who swears he's not a hard-core gamer. "More importantly, because we're setting this up as an Intranet, it's self-contained and all internal, so we don't have to worry about outside sources trying to access it."

"The Xbox 360, the Madden and Halo 2 games are all great ways for folks to engage in playing team-oriented games and tournaments," said Mike Monti, Darby Club manager, a self-proclaimed casual gamer with a fondness for NFL games. "I brought competitive gaming into the club system when I was stationed at Thule Air Base, Greenland. I saw the success there and knew, after listening to the young Soldiers and airmen here, it would be a great thing to bring to Camp Darby."

Once Haraschack and Woody complete the system installation and test it out, Camp Darby gamers can go to the Club to compete against each other. There will enough counsols for 10 gamers to play at any given time. However, slots are available on a first come, first served basis. The club will have Madden and Halo 2 on hand, but gamers can bring their own games if they want.



Genoa: Home of Christopher Columbus

Looking beyond the colorful cruise ships full of tourists with cameras poised, ready to capture the standard postcard shot, and the wide array of foreign dock workers talking in sounds that some might think as clicking and clucking, you'll find Genoa is an Italian port city worth exploring.

Genoa is believed to be named after the two-headed *Giano Bifronte*, an ancient mythological god, which is the protector of ships and coins.

The port of Genoa, once just a natural inlet, started to become active as early as the 5th century BC. The first port facilities, for which there are records, date back to shortly after the year 1000 AD.

Genoa – like the two-headed Giano – has two faces: the Italian Riviera looking out to sea, with its mountainous coast surrounded by olives and vines, and the second face of heavy industry.

It has always been the crossroads of traffic and culture between Europe and the Mediterranean sea.

The Genoa Aquarium is Europe's largest aquarium and one of the most popular cultural venues to be found in Italy.

The 71 tanks, which are constantly renovated, faithfully reproduce the habitats of the Mediterranean and of the oceans, of the pole and of the tropical islands, ensuring life and reproduction for the more than 500 fish species on site.

But Genoa may be best known to Americans as the birthplace of Christopher Columbus (1451-1506), who is credited with founding 'The

New World, and the Americas.

Down at the port, at the *Galata Museo del Mare* is a Christopher Columbus exhibit celebrating 500 years in the Mediterranean. The exhibit is open through Oct. 15.

Genoa's newest tribute to Columbus is the inauguration of the *Columbus Galleria* set for Oct. 11, at 5 p.m. at the Archive of the State of Saint Ignazio, which will look at Columbus's contribution as a man between the old and new world.

When Columbus originally approached the bankers of Genoa to finance his trip, he was turned down because they thought he had miscalculated the distance.

Pretty smart for a time when many thought the world was flat. However, he did get funding from the rulers of Spain and the new world would never be the same again.

Columbus' house is located in downtown historic district and open to the public on Saturdays, Sundays and on special occasions, like Columbus Day.

In fact, the American community in Genoa has joined local authorities for commemorative ceremonies at the Columbus house and for this year's ceremony, they will lay a wreath and the winner of the Paganini International Violin Competition will play Paganini's "Cannone."

Columbus is only one of many historical figures from Genoa, but history is much more exciting when explored first-hand.

Vicenza's Information, Tours and Registration has a trip to Genoa that includes transportation, entrance to the Genoa Aquarium and escort assistance.
