Local civil affairs troops train as combat lifesavers with Italians

Soldiers of A Company, 457th Civil Affairs Battalion, hosted their first Combat Lifesaver Course with Italian reserve officers at Longare Feb. 26-28.

The training included prevention of hot and cold weather injuries, casualty evaluation, treatment of various types of wounds and administrating intravenous fluids. It also included a demonstration of various methods to evacuate casualties.

As part of the unit's international partnership with the Italians, 10 members of the Unione Nazionale Ufficiali in Congedo d'Italia participated in the training alongside the Soldiers of A Co., 457th CA Bn. UNUCI is the reserve officers association of Italy, which provides professional development, training and organizes physical activities.

"This is a very particular activity not only to prepare us for a tactical theater but also to be ready for a civil protection emergency during an international or local

First female general visits 173rd troops

International Women's Day, March 8, is a global day celebrating the economic, political and social achievements of women past, present and future. In some places like China, Russia, Vietnam and Bulgaria, it is a national holiday.

General Khatol Mohammadzai, the first female parachutist and general in the Afghan National Army, spent the day speaking to the Task Force Bayonet command group and women of the Logar Province, Afghanistan.

She recognized the vital roles that women possess in the military.

"The whole world knows the military

VA home loans remain valuable yet underused GI benefit

Susan Petersen laughs when she talks about her first house. "We bought in 1992 and it literally cost \$40,000," said

the Marine spouse, smiling. "It doesn't sound like a lot but we couldn't have bought it without the VA loan."

It's been almost 20 years since Petersen and her husband Jon, a KC-130 pilot, bought that Havelock, N.C., home and, despite a vast difference in rank and pay, when they recently

upgraded to a four-bedroom Colonial walk-up in Northern Virginia, "The VA loan fit what we needed this time around too," said Petersen.

Made available in the years following WWII, the VA loan is largely credited with hatching middle-class America and is still a beneficial tool. Today's market is similar to post-WWII and ripe for VA loans: vets don't have a ton of cash to put down, interest rates

are low, it's a buyer's market, and scores of homes are up for grabs.

Despite its significant history, it's still a misunderstood and widely underused program—less than 10 percent of eligible military take advantage of the VA loan.

Ed Sexton, a real estate agent in Yuma, Ariz., and former

Marine, says he's seeing an increase in the number of VA loans—a far cry from just four years ago when military clients could easily

score a cheap conventional loan. Today, however, many would-be buyers, military and civilian, wash out when lenders demand healthy credit scores and hefty down payments.

"If we didn't have both VA and FHA (Federal Housing Administration) loans right now the real estate market would certainly be a lot tougher than it is," said Sexton.

Like a conventional loan

The VA loan works similarly to a conventional loan:

- 1. The buyer finds a house.
- 2. The buyer secures a lender (i.e.; USAA, Navy Federal or other bank, savings and loan or mortgage company).
- 3. The buyer is certified as eligible for the VA loan (typically the lender has access to the web-based system to certify eligibility).
- 4. The buyer completes the loan application and closes.

The difference between the VA and a conventional loan is simple, and yet very powerful says Terry Jemison of the Veteran's Administration.

"What the government is doing is reducing the lender's risk by promising the full faith and credit of the United States government behind a portion of the loan, which may make the loan more attractive to lenders," explained Jemison.

The amount of the loan the government will guarantee is called entitlement, and is basically a form of insurance for the lender should a buyer default on the loan.

No red tape

Petersen and Mike Roberts, another recent VA loan patron, say the government-run program is surprisingly devoid of red tape, fees and bureauThe difference between the VA and a conventional loan is simple, and yet very powerful says Terry Jemison of the VA.

cratic delays. Both say the process is streamlined, simple, and most importantly, saved them money.

Still cheaper

"We still had to pay the VA funding fee, but since we only had 5 percent available to put down, it was still cheaper than paying PMI (private mortgage insurance)," said Roberts.

The funding fee, which reduces the program's cost to taxpayers, is 2.15 percent for first-time users who don't put any money down. That fee drops if, like Roberts, you put even some money down.

Crunching the numbers

Roberts spent time crunching numbers before settling on the VA loan for his Crofton, Md., house. For example:

VA loan with zero down payment:

- \$200,000 house
- 6 percent interest rate on 30-year fixed mortgage
- \$4,300 funding fee (spread out over the course of the loan)

■ Monthly mortgage payment (with tax, insurance etc.) = \$1,474.88

Conventional loan with zero down payment:

- \$200,000 house
- 6 percent interest rate on 30-year fixed mortgage
 - Zero down so PMI is required
- Monthly mortgage payment (with tax, insurance etc.) = \$1,615

Conventional Loan with 20 percent down payment:

- \$200,000 house
- 6 percent interest rate on 30-year fixed mortgage
- 20 percent down on the house to avoid PMI
- Monthly mortgage payment (with tax, insurance etc.) = \$1,209

Mortgage poor

Besides doing the math to determine the best financial option for the individual buyer, JJ Montanaro, a certified financial planner with USAA, reminds veterans not to buy a house just to wind up "mortgage poor" every month.

"Make sure you have a cash cushion and an emergency fund," said Montanaro. "Buyers need to be prepared with all the potential financial issues that come with owning a house."

Refinancing option

Vets can also take advantage of a VA refinancing option in order to reduce monthly mortgage payments with a better interest rate.

As for eligibility, see a detailed list of qualifications at http://www.homeloans.va.gov/elig2.htm.

When WWII ended, Congress saw its chance to make amends for its disastrous treatment of vets in the years following WWI. The VA loan falls under The Serviceman's Readjustment Act of 1944, more commonly called the GI Bill.

It was drafted in an effort to stem a potential onslaught of unemployable and undereducated veterans returning from WWII. While civilians were attending universities, working and establishing credit, Soldiers were fighting in Pacific and European battlefields.

Most valuable legislation

The Veteran's Administration was tasked with ensuring the returning vets had ample opportunities to catch up to their civilian counterparts.

The bill, signed into law by President Franklin Roosevelt in 1944, is widely viewed as one of the most valuable piece of legislation ever passed by Congress. He stated that it gave "emphatic notice to the men and women in our armed forces that the American people do not intend to let them down."

The Obama administration recently announced an increase in the VA budget, the largest in 30 years.

females are real heroes. They left their families behind and came to Afghanistan or to any other country, and are working shoulder to shoulder, and side by side their male counterparts," she said.

Mohammadzai said that women must work to empower other women.

"These women can make other women braver, and tell them what they do. Just as you made me brave today, and convinced me to come to Logar province, you can convince other ladies to come to the military and work with their male counterparts. Women can work alongside males in the community," she said.

Mohammadzai spoke of unity and the female Afghan community.

"Even though we are away from each other, I am in Kabul and you are in Logar, we are not far away in our hearts," she said. "I am part of your body, as one of your hands. When you need me, I'll be here to help."

You have to work diligently in this community, she said.

"Becoming a general, especially in Afghanistan as a female, is not an easy thing. I wanted to do this. I wanted to work hard for it and show the other Afghan females that a female can be a general in this community," she said

This diligence is required not only as a commanding officer, but also as a parachutist, said Mohammadzai.

"As a parachutist, or as a jumper, you have to be a storm, you have to be an earthquake, you have to be something that can move the whole world with your jump," she said. "We have all proved ourselves in the sky as parachutists."

Mohammadzai said her first experience with parachuting was not without anxiety.

"The first time I jumped, I screamed so hard, thinking that the parachute was just there, not moving anywhere. There was nobody there to help me, and I thought I was just standing there not moving. I was so lightweight that all of my fellow parachutists were already on the ground and I was still in this sky," she said.

"When I reached the ground it was so comfortable and very nice; that was the only time, the first jump and the last jump, that was very comfortable. I didn't tell my family ... when my mom found out she was crying and screaming, asking what kind of job I had chosen," she said.

"Every time I was jumping, my mom could not sit in the house. She would go crazy running and walking around, praying to God for my safety. At the time I didn't understand because I didn't have kids. Now that I have kids I understand both the pain in life, and how sweet kids are," said Mohammadzai.

Mohammadzai thanked her mother for playing such a vital role in her life. "It was the prayer of my parents, my mom, that made me reach what I am today," she said.

Prayer and hard work pushed her forward, she said.

"I had to work very hard; sometimes I was even scared for my life. I still went ahead and did it," she said.

Mohammadzai said she grew brave because of all her hard work.

"If you receive, or get, or achieve something difficult, then you are so proud and always happy. If you get something easily, then you are always looking to the ground, you don't think that you worked hard for it, you just got it. I'm so proud and I can talk to anybody bravely because I worked hard," she said.

Mohammadzai left with parting words igniting a call to action for the women present.

"We should work to make our male co-workers understand that women can do something like this," said Mohammadzai.

"I know males and females because I've worked with both and understand," she said. "The reality is that women deserve more respect than what they are given."

Sunday's matinee performance was heavily attended by the under-10 crowd, and all of whom were glued

to their seats and clearly enjoying the musical comedy.

"I liked all of it," said 2nd-grader Micah Dorrel after the show. His sister, Sarah concurred, noting "Peppermint Patty and Lucy were my favorite."

crisis," said Italian 1st Capt. Antonio Scalia, vice president of the Unione Nazionale Ufficiali in Congedo d'Italia Verona branch.

"Using medical prevention techniques to sustain life on the battlefield through training is the best way to enhance the combat mindset and maintain Soldier readiness," said Sgt. Laura Derry, a combat lifesaver trainer at A Co., 457th Civil Affairs Battalion.

About 20 Soldiers and UNUCI members took part in the three-day training at the Longare conference facility to learn battlefield medical treatment techniques.

At the conclusion of the training, U.S. and Italian participants tested their knowledge and skills in written and practical exams.

The biggest challenge was overcoming the language barriers in the joint training, said Lt. Col Michael O'Connor, the commander of the 457th CA Bn.
