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

DoD employees cautioned against tax scam

Scammers are targeting Department of Defense employees with a series of "spear-phishing" e-mails relating to tax information, according to the Army's 9th Signal Command.

Phishers attempt to trick recipients into disclosing sensitive information, such as usernames and passwords, personal data, account numbers or other information.

Spear-phishing is a targeted attempt to

steal information in which a personalized message appears to come from a trustworthy source. A spear-phisher may use names, familiar organizations and relevant jargon to make the e-mail appear legitimate, according to Joint Task Force-Global Network Operations officials.

The current e-mail targeted at DoD employees supposedly concerns federal tax law changes for 2010-2017 and has an attached pdf containing malware, malicious software which invades a computer system without the owner's knowledge or consent.

Legitimate tax information is available from the IRS Web site at www.irs.gov, or community members can contact the Caserma Ederle Tax Assistance Office.

Community members should know that:
1) The IRS does not send unsolicited e-mail messages to taxpayers

2) The IRS does not discuss tax account information with taxpayers via e-mail or use e-mail to solicit sensitive information from taxpayers.

The construction of the new DoDDS middle and elementary schools, along with the child development center and School Age Services facility, at Villaggio della Pace are well on their way to completion.

The construction contractor, CMC di Ravenna, and construction agent, Naval Facilities Engineering Command, plan to turn over the facilities to DoDDS and FMWR July 12, said Kambiz Razzaghi, chief of the Transformation Construction Management Office.

This midsummer turnover will allow the furniture, phones and other items to be installed in time for start of the 2010 school year.

- 3) The IRS does not request financial account security information like PIN numbers.
- 4) Taxpayers should only access IRS information by going directly to www.irs.gov. Do not follow links provided in unsolicited email.

"Be wary of any e-mail that asks you for sensitive or

personal information, like Social Security Numbers or account numbers," said Maj. Bradley Kittinger, Battalion S3 for 509th Signal Battalion. "If you receive something you think may be from your bank or another organization, contact the bank directly."

Community members receiving suspicious e-mails can also contact the 509th Signal Battalion for information or guidance, Kittinger said.

The overall project was designed by Rogers-Lovelake–Fritz, based in Winter Park, Fla., in collaboration with Nesco Design of Rome, Italy. The contract was awarded Sept. 25, 2007, followed by a groundbreaking shortly thereafter.

The first phase of construction required the demolition of 100 family housing units in Villaggio. Once the land was cleared, construction started on the 260,000-square foot facility which is designed to the latest DoDDS requirements and conforms to current anti-terrorism/force protection guidelines.

"All parking is set back from the buildings a minimum of 25 meters and all doors and windows are certified blast resistant," he explained. "The CDC and SAS meet these requirements and are designed to the latest FMWR child care standards."

The design capacity is set for 1,050 elementary and 270 middle school students. A shared media center providing library and multi-media services is located between the two schools, linking both facilities.

Each school will have its own gymnasium but will share a multipurpose space with a kitchen and lunchroom, a stage for theatrical productions and special events. A screen will divide the shared space, when needed, for separate use by the elementary and middle school.

"In addition to general purpose classrooms, each school has rooms dedicated to art, science, music and special needs learning," said Razzaghi. "Both schools have two levels with elevators, wide stairs and corridors and are handicapped accessible in accordance with the

latest federal guidelines."

Parking spaces for 196 cars and a dedicated school bus parking lot has been constructed and will allow busses to drop-off and pick-up adjacent to the school so that students do not have to cross a road to enter the building.

The CDC / SAS facility is designed for a capacity of 348 children and has liberal car parking in front of the building for drop-off and pick-up. The CDC/SAS will be served by one central lobby which connects directly to the child care spaces on one side and the school age services spaces on the other side.

The SAS will have a large multi-purpose space for dancing, roller blading and other group activities. It will have a high-ceiling central gathering space and specialty rooms for computers, ballet and music.

The CDC will have a kitchen and 13 rooms for infant, toddler, pre-school and multi-age activities.

"This school and SAS / CDC complex is a welcome addition to the Vicenza military community," said Razzaghi. "This major construction project will be followed by a multi-age youth center and a high school in the coming years, which will consolidate youth activities at Villaggio della Pace, in accordance with the garrison master plan."

Also included in the \$52 million military construction contract is the new access control point at Villaggio della Pace. The first phase of that project is open and the final 10 percent is expected to be completed later this month.



t's not often that one can trace the footsteps of an ordinary man doing an extraordinary deed, but Soldiers and Airmen from Camp Darby, Italy got a chance to do just that during a Feb. 19 visit to the site of Lt. John Fox's last stand in Sommocolonia.

Fox, a Buffalo Soldier with the 598th Field Artillery Battalion, was a forward observer in the Rocca tower and played a key role in the War World II Battle of Sommocolonia, according to Italian Lt. Col. Vittorio Lino Biondi, historian and co-author of La Battaglia di Sommocolonia.

Traversing the steep stone path to the memorial site honoring Fox, his fellow Buffalo Soldiers and the Italian partisans of the region, Biondi shared his years of research and passion for military history with the Camp Darby troops.

"The battle, called Winter Tempest, began Dec. 26, 1944, at 4 a.m. when the German troops decided to breach the American line," said Biondi. "The 92nd Infantry Division Buffalo Soldiers were defending Barga and Sommocolonia in the Serchio Valley. The German 148th Division and the Italian 51st Corpo di Armata Alpinos, were very well trained, but the Americans fought with their heart and conviction."

With the rain pouring sideways and nail-biting wind blowing away umbrellas, Darby troops followed Biondi up to the last remnants of the tower.

"It was a hard and bloody battle, the largest in this area. Lt. Fox served in the high tower and was directing artillery against the advancing Germans. Once the Germans penetrated the defensive perimeter of the town, much of the fighting has hand-to-hand combat from house to house. At approximately 11 that morning, Fox sent his last set of coordinates. He gave his own position in order to destroy the main body of advancing Germans," explained Biondi.

Fox's sacrifice allowed the Americans to regroup in the

valley below and fight again.

"Fox was a strong leader who understood he needed to do something that he might not live through. One doesn't often hear about this part of African-American history," said Chief Warrant Officer Robert Carter, 3rd Battalion, 405th Army Field Support Brigade.

According to the Barga Mayor Marco Bonini, Dec. 26, 1944, is remembered as "the day of great fear."

"For us citizens of Barga, Lt. Fox is a symbol of resistance the townspeople did against the Germans," said Bonini. "Each year, Sommocolonia remembers the fallen and lets the younger generations know what happened and what our history is."

Biondi said that the Buffalo Soldiers did more than help liberate the town.

"Many of these Soldiers came from farms back in America and with many of the Italian men-folk gone, the Soldiers helped the local people work the land and farms along with sharing their food," said Biondi.

USAG Livorno Command Sgt. Maj. Felix Rodriguez said "the trip to Sommocolonia was important in remembering our brothers and sisters in arms sacrifices and contributions and learning more about U.S. military history around Camp Darby."

"I didn't even know about the 92nd until a few weeks ago when it was mentioned at the African-American Heritage Month council," said Airman 1st Class Takneshia Norris, 731st Munitions Squadron.

"It gives me a lot of pride to learn something new about the African-American culture, to see the monument and battle site and visit the private collection museum about the Buffalo Soldiers, to know we've done so much makes me want to read and learn more," said Air Force Staff Sgt. Jermaine McCrea, 731st Munitions Squadron.

The Buffalo Memorial trail, battle site and memorial are open to the public. Visit www.lucchesiaviaggi.com to arrange a personal tour and viewing of the private collection.


