The Caserma Ederle community is experiencing problems with people driving under the influence of alcohol. As important as the reasons, are the results of drunk driving.

While the ultimate price is your life or that of another person, here's what you can expect for a DUI in Italy:

Expect to lose your SETAF driver's license and possible punishment by the garrison commander and commanding general.

This may include UCMJ action, administrative action, nonjudicial punishment, and/or additional duties and, if single and residing off post, it may include moving to the barracks.

In addition to any command disposition, the following Italian penalties are in effect:

If your BAC is between .05-.08, the fine ranges from 500-2,000 Euro (about \$780-\$3,100),

Don't risk career, car, life - use designated driver

If your BAC is between .05-.08, the fine ranges from 500-2,000 Euro (about \$780-\$3,100), your license is suspended for three to six months and you are assessed 10 points on your license.

If your BAC registers .08-.15, the fine ranges from 800-3,200 Euro (\$1,250-\$5,000), your license is suspended for six months to one year, possible jail time for up to six months, and you are assessed 10 points on your license.

Still thinking about hitting the club without a designated driver?

If your BAC is above .15, the fine increases to 1,500-6,000 Euro (\$2,350-\$9,376), your license is suspended for one to

two years, possible jail time of three months to one year, and you are assessed 10 points on your license. The big news is that at this point, the court can permanently take your vehicle. This means that your vehicle becomes property of the Italian state.

If the drunk driver causes an accident the punishment is doubled.

Should the driver be involved in an accident and injured as a result, he or she will be accompanied to the hospital by law enforcement officers and his or her blood is tested by the emergency room doctor. The blood results are given to law enforcement officers who proceed as above.

If a driver refuses to take an alcohol test the driver is arrested and loses their license for six months to two years. After the court trial, the vehicle may be confiscated.

If driver has had their driving license for less than three years the penalty points are doubled. you are assessed 10 points on your license.

The big news is that at this point, the court can permanently take your vehicle. This means that your vehicle becomes property of the Italian state.

If the drunk driver causes an accident the above punishment is doubled.

Should the driver be involved in an accident and injured as a result, he or she will be

accompanied to the hospital by law enforcement officers and his or her blood is tested by the emergency room doctor.

If a driver refuses to take an alcohol test the driver is arrested and loses their license for six months to two years. After the court trial, the vehicle may be confiscated.

If driver has had their driving license for less than three years the penalty points are doubled.

In addition to any action taken by the Italian authorities, the following courses of action take place for civilians:

In accordance with AER 27-9: The first offense of a DUI results in a mandatory 12 month suspension of driving privileges, Remedial Driver's Training

course and ASAP assessment.

A second offense within five years requires mandatory revocation of driving privileges for five years.

Under USASETAF 190-2: When a POV driver's license is suspended/revoked and the licensee possesses an international driver's license or driver's license issued by a host nation country, the provost marshal will notify the appropriate civilian authority that the USASETAF license was suspended or revoked.

Finally, if a civilian is cited for driving during a period of suspension/revocation, a mandatory five year driver's license suspension/revocation will be imposed.

"This has been a very welcoming community; it's sort of like extended family. The school has been friendly; everyone in the community that I have met has been very obliging and helpful," said

Lorena Reinhardt, who has been in the Department of Defense Dependent Schools for 27 years.

"I think families, who take advantage of living in Europe, and now living in Italy, may use it as educational for their family, their children. They really expand their knowledge of the world, and their opportunities for getting into college," Reinhardt

added.

Reinhardt also encourages the parents' participation in the school activities.

"Parents are very welcome in DoDDS in general and certainly here. We have some parents who came to us and they have started the parent program where there will be several activities for parents throughout the year."

Research does show that when parents become involved in their students' education, the students do better, according to Reinhardt.

"In some communities, parents are more active than others and this is one of the most active groups that I have seen, in terms of they plan ahead for the entire year, lots of different activities, it's excellent," she said.

In addition to working, she plans on taking some art courses and painting.

Prepare for winter weather

The gray skies of the past few weeks are confirmation of the change in seasons. With the approach of winter come new challenges to our safety stature. Thinking and acting safely on and off duty becomes more important as the weather worsens.

Snow, rain and fog are going to be more common in the weather pattern now and these conditions require some additional safety measures on several fronts.

First and foremost is allowing extra time to get to our destination. This will allow us to slow down if road or visibility conditions worsen during the trip.

Another action to improve our safety posture is to winterize our cars:

- Make sure wipers are in good condition

- Use non-freezing windshield washer fluid

- Ensure tires are properly inflated and have adequate tread.

- Certain areas in Italy require use snow chains during the winter months. To ensure proper operation of snow chains they must be sized according to the tire. Familiarize the instructions that come with the chains, and it is a good idea to practice putting on the chains before you actually need them.

- Have an emergency supply pack in your vehicle. It should include warm clothes or blankets, drinking water, flashlight, and snacks.

Winter in Europe gives us access to some of the best skiing and snowboarding in the world, as long as we can get to them safely.

Adding a few additional safety steps during the wet winter months keeps us Army Safe, and that makes us Army Strong.

The Caserma Ederle Motocross Club is a club for off-road motorbike riders stationed in Vicenza. In April 2001, two U.S. riders stationed in Vicenza organized the club to help soldiers and civilians learn about the sport.

Motocross, off-road, all-terrain motorbike racing, began in Europe after World War II, but did not gain a significant U.S. following until the late 60's.

Until the 1980's the sport was dominated by European riders, but since then U.S. riders have improved, winning the Olympics of motocross "trophy of nations" a record 19 times.

"When people around post see guys with vans covered with racing decals or spot a motocross bike on the back of a trailer, they ask about motocross and mention their interest," said Patrick O'Connor, vehicle registrar for USAG Vicenza and a member of the club since it's beginning. He rides a 2009 Honda CRF450.

"The club gives soldiers and civilians a chance to get together and ride," and "the goal of the club is to make people here aware of the sport as well as provide information for soldiers and civilians who may be about to PCS to Italy," added O'Connor. Other members of the club include SETAF Carabinieri and local Italian

civilians.

Members get together during the week to discuss scheduled rides during the weekend.

There is no motorcycle license required, but most local tracks require an "insurance card," which is purchased through the motorcycle club.

Club members are responsible for acquiring a motorcycle and obtaining transportation to and from the track. Some members "buddy up" for transportation. The cost of riding the local tracks ranges from 15 to 30 Euro. There are six motocross tracks within an hour commute, the level of difficulty ranges from beginner to expert and the tracks may be

traditional, outdoor style motocross tracks or newer, indoor supercross tracks.

"Most tracks are open all year, some close due to poor track conditions and bad weather," says O'Connor.

While riding motocross involves some risk, O'Connor feels that they are minimal, "Riders should always ride within their ability level; riders get into trouble when they try and ride above their ability," the chances of injury are the same as any other sport," said O'Connor.
