Sky Soldiers killed in Afgahnistan

CASERMA EDERLE, Vicenza Italy – Two Soldiers with the 173rd Airborne Brigade Combat Team, currently deployed as Task Force Bayonet in support of the NATO International Security Assistance Force, were killed near the Korengal Valley, Afghanistan.

Killed were: Sgt. Joshua C. Brennan, 22, of Ontario, Ore., who died Oct 26 and Spc. Hugo V. Mendoza, 29, of Glendale, Ariz., who died Oct 25

The two Soldiers, assigned to Battle Company,2nd Battalion, 503rd Infantry, died of wounds sustained when they came in contact with enemy forces using RPG, machine gun and small arms fire during combat operations on Oct 25.

A memorial ceremony was held for Staff Sgt. Larry Rougle, Sgt. Brennan and Spc. Mendoza at the Caserma Ederle Post Chapel Nov. 2.

Able Company locks-in on Taliban

KUNAR PROVINCE, Afghanistan—Under the cover of darkness, Soldiers from Able Company, 2nd Battalion, 503rd Infantry (Airborne) air-assaulted onto Phase Line Ridgeway approximately three miles south of their forward operating bases located in the Pech River Valley Oct. 22 as one part of Operation Rock Avalanche.

Operation Rock Avalanche was a multiple-company mission running from Oct. 19-25 in the Chapa Dara, Korengal, Shuryak and Pech Valleys. Participating units were Able, Battle and Chosen Companies from the 2nd-503rd, Bravo Company, 1st Battalion, 508th Infantry (Airborne) and multiple companies from the Afghan National Army's 201st Corps.

The companies were moved into different areas of Kunar Province at different times hoping to flush insurgents out of one area into another, where U.S. and Afghan forces would be waiting for them.

From a vantage point 7,500 feet up and overlooking the Shuryak and Pech Valleys, Able Company's four-day mission was to locate and destroy insurgent command-and-control and logistical elements operating in that area, according to Capt. Louis Frketic, Able Co. commander.

After having set up a perimeter and establishing a command post on the top of Phase Line Ridgeway, 2nd Platoon was dispatched to the nearby village of Aybot. Previous intelligence had suggested that Taliban leaders might be holed-up in that area.

"We were looking for two named [high-value targets]. One of them is the commander of the entire Shuryak forces and the other guy is an IED specialist," said Frketic, "We searched their compounds and they were not there or in the area."

Frketic and his paratroopers were not dissuaded. A Low-Level Voice Intercept Team from Bravo Co., 173rd Special Troops Battalion (Airborne) was tasked to Able Co. for the mission.

The team had begun listening to Taliban radio traffic as soon as they hit the ground and were already getting a bead on the insurgents operating in the surrounding valleys.

The team was an invaluable

asset; one that Frketic uses every chance he gets to collect about talk about fighters and intelligence on the enemy.

officers. Other times we'll hear them about talk about fighters and commanders. The one talking about

"A lot of times we will start getting locations and then we will pick up names," said Frketic, "It is usually specific to that cell what kind of things they are talking about. Sometimes they will start talking about people, fighters, locations, ammo, or weapons systems that they have."

Even the smallest details, including the specific words used, can yield valuable information, said Frketic.

"A couple days ago, right before the mission started, we heard a cell talking about their fighters and their leaders in the terms of soldiers and

officers. Other times we'll hear them about talk about fighters and commanders. The one talking about officers and soldiers: that is a professional organization. Little details like that are very critical in my mind," explained Frketic.

With so much U.S. military and Afghan National Army activity on the surrounding mountains and in the surrounding valleys, the Taliban were never sure of Able Company's position and never mounted an attack on their position. The LLVI team used the time to continue to collect intelligence on enemy in area. The formerly suspected enemy locations were now known.

Around noon of Oct. 24, Frketic put that information to use and launched Soldiers from 1st Platoon, Destined Co. into action. The platoon is a heavy-weapons platoon attached to Able Co. for the deployment and commonly referred to as the Dragon Platoon.

They had air-assaulted onto the ridgeline with their MK-19 and M-2 machine guns. A mortar team with an 81mm tube from Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 2-503rd was also put in action.

Their fire destroyed one command-and-control node operating in the Shuryak Valley. But destroying the enemy position was probably the easiest part of the mission for the MK-19 gun team, said Spc. David Hooker, and a Dragon Platoon member.

"T've never air-assaulted in with a MK-19 before," said Hooker, "But since we just set in and manned a blocking position it was okay."

"The weight is the biggest challenge, getting it in and out," he

The MK-19 without the tri-pod weighs 75 pounds and the ammo cans weigh between 40 and 60 pounds each depending on the number of rounds in them. Many cans were brought for this mission.

The mortar team, one of the busiest in the battalion, also spent most of the day putting rounds on target. The team averages firing more than 1,000 rounds per month.

"As far as firing goes, this is hands-down the most intense deployment that I have been on," said Staff Sgt. Brandon Thomas.

While there are howitzers available for fire missions throughout the Kunar Province, the mortar teams are able to react the quickest when indirect fire is needed, said Thomas.

"We have eyes on a lot of the targets and our response is a little bit quicker," said Thomas, "The channels to clear the 155s go all the

way through battalion and then back through their fires. Ours are cleared right here. If we are in direct contact, I can engage freely."

The number of rounds fired combined with the danger of their job has earned the team the respect of Thomas and the Rock leadership.

"These guys are awesome," said Thomas, "Everybody has been put in for valor awards."

The mortar team and the pit in which they work are a favorite target of the Taliban, making it a dangerous job.

"There is no overhead cover and they stand out there and fire throughout the entire engagement and also in support afterwards by hitting exfil routes," said Thomas, "It's pretty remarkable what they do."

During the night of the 24th, Dragon Platoon was flown back to Able Main, but early the morning of Oct. 25, the remainder of Able Co. began what would end up a 10-hour trek down treacherous, slippery and steep terrain back to their base. No small feat for even the most fit paratrooper, yet a regular occurrence for Soldiers in Kunar Province.

"We go on ruck marches into the mountains every other day or every third day," said Staff Sgt. Brian Mading a member of Headquarters platoon.

"The first couple are tough. Then, of course, the more you are doing it, the more you get built up," said Mading.

"The guys that come here right out of basic or other units usually get broke down pretty quick or get into it pretty quick depending on what their physical fitness level was before," said Mading.

All of the gear these paratroopers carry is heavy: helmet, protective vests, rucksacks, weapons, ammunition, and water. It makes packing before the mission extremely important, leaving little room for extra cold-weather gear or even extra food.


During the trip down the mountain, the Able Co. Soldiers had hoped to drop-in on some insurgents the LLVI team had confirmed were hiding out in villages in that area. But none were spotted and no contact was made.

But that's okay, according to Frketic.

"Those villages are only a threeto-four walk from our base," Frketic said.

"They'll be getting visits from us again soon."



Army hero advocates employment of disabled veterans

Standing tall on her artificial legs, former Army helicopter pilot and current director of the Illinois Department of Veterans' Affairs Tammy Duckworth told Soldiers and families that many veterans were underselling themselves when they sought civilian employment.

"Where else can you find people who are used to guaranteeing their work with their lives?" Duckworth asked her audience in the Caserma Ederle Post Theater Oct. 29 as the guest speaker for the National Disability Employment Awareness

"Director Duckworth has helped develop state programs giving tax

credits to employers who hire vets who served in Iraq, Afghanistan or Desert Storm, more state grants to service organizations and backing for below-market mortgages for veterans," said Col. Virgil Williams, Vicenza garrison commander, in his welcoming remarks. He said that Duckworth, who followed a long family tradition of serving in the military, had decided to become a helicopter pilot "because it was one of the only combat jobs available to women."

Duckworth said she suffered serious injuries and lost both her legs after a rocket-propelled grenade struck the cockpit of her Blackhawk helicopter and exploded during a mission in Iraq in November, 2004.



Pipes, pipes, pipes

Millions in construction slated for SETAF

Although a dozen years away, 2020 is close for the engineers and planners at the U.S. Army Garrison, Vicenza. By that year, say the folks in the garrison's Plans, Analysis, and Integration office, the U.S. Army post in northern Italy will be the model for all other Installation Management Comman-Europe garrisons, providing the best maintained facilities, the highest quality services, the safest environment and the most efficient organizations.

Vicenza's ambitious long range plan includes about \$190 million of new military construction projects, renovation, and right-sizing, with the ultimate outcome an attractive and energy efficient campus, with plenty of parking and plenty of green space.

Fundamental to that outcome, say planners at this enduring installation, is the work of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Europe District.

"What we need the Corps for is to help us repair our old facilities – [both] buildings and infrastructure – to bridge the years before the MILCON kicks in," said David Murr, from the garrison's Directorate of Public Works' engineering services section. "It's going to be a shell game moving people around until then and we're going to rely a lot on the Corps to make that happen."

Historically, said Damian O'Neill, the District's acting resident engineer at Vicenza, the Corps has been asked to execute small-ticket infrastructure and renovation projects due to the primacy of the Navy's facilities engineering command – the principal military engineering agent south of the Alps. However, since the

announcement of USAG Vicenza's effort to enact one of the largest MILCON programs in Europe, the Corps has noticed a boost in duties – mostly, he said, showing up as infrastructure projects.

In fact, the infrastructure work awarded in 2007 is 76 percent higher than the five-year average, O'Neill said.

Greg Vallery, chief of the DPW's engineering services section, said the garrison in general has seen a similar increase due to the preparation for the 2020 plan. "Our overall program has probably doubled in the past three years," said Vallery. "the Corps is a big part of the team making it happen."

"There's big stuff going on here," said O'Neill, rattling off some of the larger MILCON projects coming to the garrison as part of the 2020 plan, including a \$10 million Soldier and Family Entertainment Center, a \$35 million Enhanced Health Services Center, and a \$54 million build-to-lease family housing complex in Quinto Vicentino. "We just support in whatever way we can – and that's mostly in utility work."

Currently, the Corps is working on about \$3 -million in utilities upgrades throughout the garrison's footprint, said Tom Perkins, civil engineer with the Corps' Vicenza office. This work not only sets the stage for the demands of future MILCON work, he said, but it also modernizes the garrison to accommodate the demands of current force levels.

"We're really the infrastructure go-to guys here," Perkins said. "It's our job to be receptive to the DPW's needs and support the garrison in any way we can."

Most often that involves what Perkins called "horizontal work" – the building and sustaining of infrastructure to support readiness, power projection, and the well being of Soldiers, families and civilian employees.

One of the larger infrastructure projects the Corps has taken to modernize the garrison is to revamp the existing roads and utility lines in the Longare military installation, a small installation now mostly used for barracks, storage, and maintenance space.

"The roads up at Longare used to be old goat trails," said Perkins, who was in charge of the \$350,000 project to widen, lengthen, and restore the roads, sidewalks, and curbs as well as install new drain lines, electric lines, and light fixtures. "Now it's a pretty nice road. It's pretty nice up there."

Another massive infrastructure project is the upcoming \$2 million co-generation power plant, a set diesel engines to be located on Caserme Ederle, which would produce enough electricity and heat to supplement almost half the existing electricity and heating draw

"In at least three of the four high electricity rate periods, it's going to save us money," said Vallery. "Effectively, we're going to be able to produce electric power cheaper than we can buy it. And the heating ... almost comes along for free."

The Corps' largest infrastructure project, however – which is in

support of the future MILCON work —is a \$2.5 million replacement of all the existing water, sanitary, and storm lines in the nearby Villagio Della Pace residential area.

The project precedes a \$50 million, 18,000-square-meter DoDDS complex – including a middle school, elementary school, child development center and school age services building – which will tie into the existing utility infrastructure of the housing area directly across the street.

"These utility systems ... have pretty much exceeded their life expectancy," said Vallery.

"We have to ensure we can match up and be able to handle what's coming out of the new DoDDS complex," said O'Neill of the project. "The water wells, water treatment system, and the discharge point for both the sanitary and the storm lines are in the existing housing area.."

All this utility work is the realization of one of the four guiding principles the garrison's master planners say is necessary to fulfill the 2020 plan.

"This is a very small base – a postage stamp base. But we don't utilize the space appropriately," said Kambiz Razzaghi, chief of the garrison's Transformation Construction Management Office.

"The work the Corps has done for us is to direct ... funds in an appropriate way to support not only the current needs, but also in the future when we go from 133 buildings to only 33 buildings, that all those buildings will be supported by the same system. This is part of the master plan," Razzaghi said.

"We're a happy customer," said Razzaghi. "The Corps is doing a great job here. ... When, from the command point of view, they don't really see a difference between the Army Corps of Engineers and the DPW, we think that's a good thing. It's one engineering team."

Vallery said he has valued the Corps' work in the five years he has been on the organization and will continue to rely on them in the future. "They're an organization of choice because they're an organization we trust," Vallery said. "You can quote me on that."

By supporting the garrison's long-range development plans, O'Neill said, the Corps is doing more than just lowering maintenance and utility costs. "We're making this garrison more livable, which improves the quality of life for the warfighter and their families and allows them to focus more on the mission."

Villagio construction

The contractor for the DoDDS School/CDC project at Villaggio plans to begin installing his construction fence on Nov. 12.

The biggest impact on residents will be school bus route changes, and additional construction traffic when entering and exiting Villaggio. Ceremonial groundbreaking for this project is set for Nov. 20 at 3:30 p.m..

In addition to this Villaggio project, the Corps of Engineers, through a contract managed by the DPW, will start an underground utility upgrade project in late November that will affect all remaining Villaggio units.

This upgrade will be phased through one section of Villaggio at a time. The overall upgrade will take a little more than a year.

A town hall meeting is scheduled for Nov. 13, at Villaggio, to go over these projects in detail, review bus route changes, and go over safety concerns with Villaggio residents.
