Don't get caught redhanded: know what you can ship stateside

If youthink you can ship wine to the U.S., think again.

If you're sure that shipping olive oil is prohibited, don't be so certain.

USAG Vicenza Postmaster Matt Stanley said community members should know what they can and cannot ship to avoid legal troubles and ensure friends and family receive their holiday gifts.

Shipping any type of alcohol is prohibited. Olive oil, however, can be shipped, "as along as it is packed properly with absorbent material and double-boxed," said Stanley.

Customers who attempt to ship alcohol will be reported to the MPs, said Stanley. "And if they list the alcohol as a nonprohibited item on the customs form, they can additionally be charged with falsifying an official document."

MREs no longer mystery meat of yesteryear

DoD's Combat Feeding Directorate set up an elaborate display with interactive activities on the floor of the Association of the United States Army annual meeting and symposium, including a place for Soldiers to taste-test new ration items Oct. 8.

Some of the items available were the shelf-stable on-the-go sandwich, new MRE entrees and high-pressure spiced apples.

"We put a lot of science in that bag, probably more science than the average consumer realizes," said Kathy-Lynn

Satisfy your curiosity: Find out what AWAG is and how you can get involved in Italy

AWAG is an IMCOM-Europe approved private organization, administered entirely by a volunteer board of governors, representing all branches of the Armed Forces and civilians serving within the European Command. By being a volunteer in any organization; you are a part of AWAG. (Previously known as American Women's Activities, Germany, the organization is now simply called AWAG.)

HOW IT ALL BEGAN

For the past 63 years, meetings of American spouses living in Germany have been held at least once a year. The origins of AWAG can be traced to the fall of 1946 when Mrs. Anthony Biddell, wife of the commanding general of the U.S. Army of Occupation, formed a committee of eight women to plan one of the largest welfare organizations ever set up by volunteers. This group was known as AOWVS (American Occupation Women's Voluntary Service). It helped to coordinate the distribution of

relief aid sent by stateside clubs and central Europe. church groups to post-war Germany.

INTERNATIONAL FLAVOR

From 1950 until 1954, clubs in France, the United Kingdom and Italy were invited to participate in these conferences. The International Conference of American Women's Activities met annually until 1964 and eventually included representatives from Spain, Portugal, the Azores and the countries of the Near and Middle East.

Through the 1960s and 1970s, AWAG grew to 13 geographic areas encompassing all of western Germany. The annual conference brought hundreds of delegates together to share ideas and learn skills that they could take back to their clubs and communities.

An AWAG logo was designed to symbolize the structure and purpose of the organization. AWAG edited and published the first edition of Never a Dull Moment, a travel and shopping guide written by spouses stationed in Germany. Subsequent editions of this popular book have been expanded to include much of

GETTING TOGETHER

The four-day annual conference traditionally is held in May, so that organizations can send their newly elected or appointed volunteer leaders. The working conference provides a framework to share ideas, lessons learned and successes.

In 2000, a committee chaired by Brandie Sinkler developed a mission statement: AWAG exists to train, strengthen and connect volunteers, their organizations and their communities.

KINDRED SPIRIT

Throughout the years, AWAG conferences have provided a unique opportunity for volunteers to obtain the necessary training and guidance to govern their organizations more effectively, as well as interact with members of our host nations.

Although times and fashions have changed, the delegate of nearly 50 years ago would find a kindred spirit in today's conference participant. AWAG remains

ACUs off post OK sometimes

Policy makes dining easier

Soldiers no longer have to dash to the bathroom for a quick change of clothes before heading off post to lunch.

This is especially good news for Soldiers assigned to, or housed on, Longare, where hot meals are hard to find and eating establishments are off post.

U.S. Army Africa Commander Maj. Gen. William B. Garrett III issued command policy letter No. 23 Oct. 27 to modify the wear of the uniform while on duty in and around the Vicenza and

Livorno military communities.

The policy applies to all uniformed personnel while on duty in and around the Vicenza and Livorno military communities under current force protection conditions.

According to the policy, military personnel are authorized to:

1. Wear a military uniform off post while conducting physical training excluding the historical Vicenza Centro Storico—old city center—downtown area, Monte Berico (steps, museum and park), Livorno Centro and Pisa Centro downtown area.

2. Dine off post in duty uniform from 7:30 a.m.-1:30 p.m. at restaurants where
(a) the primary purpose of the

establishment is the service of food and

(b) where the restaurants are colocated with other businesses, such as shopping malls.

However, uniformed personnel are not authorized to dine in the :

- historical Vicenza *Centro Storico* or old city center
- Monte Berico (steps, museum and park)
 - Livorno Centro and
 - Pisa Centro downtown area.
- **3.** Commute from home to the place of duty, via any method of transportation, in uniform.

Personnel may stop only for emergency assistance or to service their vehicle at local gas stations.

Package items properly for safe holiday delivery

Sending meats is prohibited, "including canned meats," said Stanley. "But right now, customers can send vacuum packed hard cheeses, such as parmiggiano. Soft cheeses cannot be mailed.

Coffee can be shipped from Italy because it is not rationed. Flammable items, such as lighters, propane tanks, and aerosol cans cannot be shipped. In addition, Stanley noted that most perfumes' alcohol content exceeds the minimum allowable amount that can be shipped.

"There's a very, very long list of items that customers should know if they can send. We've got the list posted at our postal service center. All they need to do is come in and see it. It even explains how items should be packed," he said.

With community members in the midst of holiday shopping and shipping, Stanley suggested the following tips:

■ Remove batteries when shipping battery-operated items.

Larger **shipping boxes** can be purchased at the PX or obtained from recycle bins. Boxes should be plain brown or wrapped in brown paper.

■ Customers can schedule a private **shipping appointment** by calling the post office if they have five or more packages to mail. "We can usually handle six appointments before we open up in the morning, depending on manpower and workload" said Stanley. "Just make sure that customs forms are filled out in advance and everything's properly addressed before you arrive."

Properly protect items. "Take the time to wrap items properly. You've got to put appropriate packaging around the items. These packages go through a lot of hands from here. Just think of the the luggage you see people slinging on airport conveyor belts. Everyone sees them fall off the belt. Just think--that could be happening to your packages," he said. For more information, Stanley suggested community members visit the postal service center to view the list of prohibited items.

Evangelos, team leader and executive assistant for the DoD Combat Feeding Directorate (CFD).

Food technologists and behavioral scientists survey 200-400 Soldiers annually. Using the current year's MREs as the control, scientists field-test 32 to 33 new items per taste trial.

"We use a pedantic scale with nine points," Evangelos said. "If it doesn't rate a six or higher with Soldiers, it doesn't get packaged."

Two things new to the CFD are the First Strike Ration and Unitized Group Ration Express.

The First Strike Ration is particularly effective for warfighters on foot patrol outside of the wire who usually carry two to three MREs with them per day, said Gerald Darsch, director for DoD's Combat Feeding Directorate. "We have found that they are stripping the MREs and throwing out up to 50 percent," Darsch said. "Not that they don't like the product, but it takes up too much room in the rucksack."

The First Strike Ration reduces weight and bulk of the MRE by 50 percent, and reduction in cost to the taxpayer is roughly 36 percent. The first Strike Ration contains the newly developed Shelf Stable sandwich, similar to a hot pocket sandwich. They recently created a French toast pocket with maple syrup in the middle. In the future, the CFD hopes to advance its newest technology approved by the FDA which is high-pressured packaging of fruits and vegetables.



Vicenza swim team excels in second meet of fall season

Hot, intense, humid, loud, exhausting and exciting are words that could be used to describe Sunday's Mako Sharks swim meet at Aviano Air Base.

At the last meet, three swimmers qualified for the championship in various events: Kyla Hallam for the 100 free and 50 fly, Chris Unger for 50 free and Rima Gasparini for 100 breast stroke.

For many parents, it was the only chance they may have to see their son or daughter compete before they leave for their one-year deployment. Families, friends and fellow swimmers took the opportunity to cheer, scream and stomp their enthusiasm for the swimmers.

The Mako Sharks team is in its second year of revitalization after a two-year hiatus due to a variety of factors including the closure of the indoor pool on base. loss of coaches and the PCS moves of many of its members.

This year swimmers joined the team from U.S. military communities in the United States, Germany and Egypt, bringing their experience, strokes and camaraderie to the team. Megan Buffington and Bailey Butler were on the original Mako Sharks swim team prior to its untimely departure from the EFSL swim league.
