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## SETAF remembers Sept. 11

CASERMA EDERLE, Vicenza,

Italy – United States Army Southern European Task Force (Airborne) and U.S. Army Garrison Vicenza conducted a wreath laying and memorial to honor the sixth year anniversary of Sept. 11, 2001.

Included in the ceremony was the dedication of the SETAF flame, a torch that will burn 24 hours a day seven days a week to honor the Soldiers who have given the ultimate sacrifice and SETAF Soldiers who continue to be deployed around the world to

combat terrorism.

On hand to help light the flame for the first time were Lucia Curry, wife of 1st Sgt. Michael Curry, Missy Vimoto, mother of Pfc. Timothy Vimoto, and Sarah Johnson, wife of Sgt. Travon Johnson, all three Soldiers were killed in combat operations in Afghanistan earlier this year.

Maj. Gen. Frank G. Helmick, SETAF commanding general, remembered those who died on Sept. 11, and those who have given their lives since that day, defending freedom and fighting terrorism.

"Americans from all around the country and our friends from all

nations, joined together as a result of what happened that day", said Helmick. He continued to stress that even in difficult times to "continue to care for each other and to think about all of the Soldiers deployed, especially our American and Italian Soldiers deployed around the world tonight."

# Heaven can wait: Soldiers of Aid Station Orgun-E

**ORGUN-E, Afghanistan** — A Blackhawk helicopter screams groundward blasting waves of dust, dirt and nebbles. The medics turn

groundward blasting waves of dust, dirt and pebbles. The medics turn their backs to shield their faces from flying debris. Seconds later, they sprint to the helicopter door where a Soldier in a flight suit and helmet pounds chest compressions on a patient hidden from view. Grabbing the litter they sprint for the hospital doors. Life depends on their speed.

Inside, it's a frenzy. Chest compressions continue. Voices are loud and commanding, but no one is yelling.

Medics dart around the room grabbing supplies and equipment: needles, machines, tubes. Doctors sweat and furrow their brows as they work to stabilize the patient.

A nurse stands to the side mentally sifting the tumult, documenting the essentials. The scene appears wild and random, but it isn't.

The team is focused; every move is deliberate.

"The best way to describe it is controlled chaos," said Capt. Brian Shultz, 541st Forward Surgical Team from Fort Bragg, N.C., one of two general surgeons here.

"You try to remain detached, do your job effectively and to the best of your ability and maintain the efficiency of the team. Afterward, if we do lose people, we sit down and talk about it — if there are things we could've done better."

Despite the team's best efforts, the patient has passed away.

Some of the medics sit motionless around a table on the aid station's porch staring at the plywood floor. They only move to bring cigarettes to their lips. No one is ready to talk.

One stands in the gravel and pours hydrogen peroxide on his boot. This helps get the blood stains out he said.

"Everybody deals with it a little differently," said Sgt. 1st Class Stephen Junod, Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 1st Battalion, 503rd Infantry (Airborne) medical platoon sergeant. "Sometimes, I think just being together is the part that helps the most.

"I've been doing this for about 20 years now; I see a lot of stuff. People that you wouldn't think would get up and walk out, get up and walk out.People you expect to get up and walk out, never leave," said Junod.

"Some people, if you did everything right, are still not going to make it. It's obviously not in our control, but we'll do everything we can to give them the best chance."

"It does take an emotional toll," said Shultz. (Continued on Page 2, Heaven can wait)

"Everyone has their own way of dealing with the shock of losing someone and realizing the finality of it that they're not coming back," Schultz continued. "Some guys go to the gym, some guys run, some guys read."

Chess is a mainstay here. All but two of the 19 staff members play. Some of the junior members once played while wearing night-vision goggles. It helps pass the time between patients, keep their minds busy, fuel bragging rights.

They use the matches as a jumping-off point to mock each other and poke fun. Swarms of jokes and biting sarcasm ensue.

"You use a lot of humor amongst the team," said Air Force Capt. Jeffrey Marsh, a critical care nurse. "It's not humor about what you're seeing; it's humor about what you're doing [outside of here]."

Marsh is here temporarily, filling in for another nurse who is on leave. He's been here for about five weeks.

"It's been truly an amazing

experience. Some of this stuff, the emotion, the trauma, the death, the burns and everything I've seen here, I'll probably feel later. You kind of tuck it away. I'm sure once I'm away from this environment and I'm back in the States, I'll have time to recollect some of what I've seen and done," said Marsh.

This team has done plenty. Some have been tasked with a nearly impossible chore: growing up facing loss, tough calls and suffering.

Pfc. Joshua Ashford, HHC 1-503rd and just 20 years old, is the youngest on staff. By American standards, he isn't old enough to drink a beer, but he's old enough to have someone's life in his hands.

"When they come in, I kind of just 'blank' and I just work. You just do it," said Ashford. "All your training comes back; you know what has to get done. You don't really think about it. Once you're all done and they leave, you kind of sit out back and think about what you went through."

Medical care here runs the gamut from IED blasts to gunshot wounds, shrapnel, burns and

broken bones; intravenous lines, X-rays, splints, atropine and morphine.

"I think we do good things," said Shultz. "I think we've made an impact on the field medical care available, especially in the forward emergency resuscitative realm. All in all, everyone likes what they're doing here. This is what we've been trained to do, so everyone here is happy taking care of injured patients."

"I sleep so well at night," said Junod. "I like knowing that what I do counts for something." The helicopters will still deliver every mother's bad dream. The staff here fights to keep that from becoming her nightmare. Sometimes, the nightmare wins. More often than not, it disappears under the care of experts.

The doctors, medics and nurses of the Orgun-E aid station remember the Soldiers who go home to long hugs and family dinners.

They keep these memories handy, close to their hearts. It's just another tool in their medical bag of tricks. It fits snugly next to hope, chess and an overdose of reality.

Commercial agents (including but not limited to representatives of loan, finance, insurance or investment companies) are not authorized to participate in any educational or orientation program which discusses financial topics. Further, it is improper for an Army unit or Soldier to sponsor such a

presentation.



# DFAC scaling back service

Beginning Sept. 22, the South of the Alps dining facility on Caserma Ederle will severely restrict meal service. Beginning on Saturday only those Soldiers holding meal cards and personnel on orders authorizing subsistence allowance will be served at the DFAC. This is due to major renovations to the building that will take approximately six months to complete.

"This has to be done," said Marshall Fowler, DFAC general manager. "With the majority of our Soldiers deployed, this is the best time to do the work."

"Right now we are serving about 300 people for lunch alone, our biggest meal," said Fowler. "During

the renovations we will only have one grill, one stove and a deep fat fryer. So, we are limited in our capabilities to serving only 100 Soldiers a meal." The DFAC staff will be reduced by 75 percent during the construction as well.

Although more than a facelift, the renovation is not a complete makeover, explained Fowler. However, the new DFAC will have a completely new décor when

The regimental dining room and the entire glass-roofed area will be completely redone as a more permanent structure with a new air conditioning system. Larger refrigerators and an improved ventilation system will be added to the kitchen. There will be complete handicap access to the facility to include enlarged and improved bathrooms as well.

Improvements in the dining facility will include a new rotisserie chicken section, expanded grab-

and-go service, with more selections, and a new section serving hot and cold made-to-order sandwich line.

"The annual Thanksgiving meal will be served at the Mensa Club Veneto," said Timothy Burgess, USAG Vicenza chief, supply and services, directorate of logistics. The Thanksgiving meal will be open to all community members, including civilians and host nation personnel, Burgess explained.

The Thanksgiving holiday meal

will be served from noon-4 p.m. The holiday meal costs \$6.05; however, spouses and family members of enlisted personnel E-1 through E-4 will receive a discounted fare of \$5.15 per meal. More information on the Thanksgiving meal will be forthcoming.

"This is best way to have the least amount of impact on the community," said Fowler. "The main thing to remember is please be patient while we work to improve the facility for everyone."

### **Enhanced Health Clinic groundbreaking**

Ground breaking for the Enhanced Health Service Center took place Sept. 10.

The new clinic consolidates the aging dental, health care and social work facilities currently scattered throughout the post into a single building that will exceed environmental standards.

The facility consolidates the assistants and support staff,

following outpatient services: primary care, orthopedics, women's health services, pharmacy, radiology, physical therapy, optometry, education and developmental intervention services social work and expanded dental services.

This will be the largest ERMC health services construction project in Europe in the last 20 years.

Italian doctors, nursing

alongside their American counterparts, will work to serve Soldiers and their families inoutpatient and birthing services.

The U.S. Naval Facilities Engineering Command awarded a 30 million euro joint venture contract to the construction firms Bilfinger/Berger from Germany and Pizzarotti from Italy.

Construction on the new 13,000 square-meter facility is expected to be complete by spring 2010.



### Mystery wreath appears at Camp Darby Patriot Day tribute

In the early morning hours of Sept.11 USAG Livorno Soldiers placed a wreath resembling the American flag at the installation's flagpole. Near sunset a group of Italians and Americans paid tribute by adding their wreath. Sometime in between a wreath in memory of Jeanette LaFond-Menichino appeared.

The wreath was composed of white lilies with a gold embossed ribbon. This wreath wasn't just in memory of all the victims. This one had a single name and somewhere a story.

An internet search revealed that LaFond-Menichino had been a senior account analyst at Marsh & McLennan. She was 49-years-old when she died during the attacks on the World Trade Center. She has a sister, Anita LaFond Korsonsky. But the research didn't answer how the flowers with her name ended up at Camp Darby, Italy.

After three days of asking various community members if the name "Jeanette LaFond" meant anything to them came an answer.

"On Sunday, Maria Rosa (Contadini-Piurucci) brought in the flower display and placed it in the chapel," said Elizabeth Speck, an employee at ACS. "After the service, it was stored in a refrigerator until it could be placed at the flagpole on Patriot Day."

Locating Maria Rosa Contadini-Piurucci, an employee at the child development center, she told her story of Jeanette.

"Jeanette was my cousin. My mother was American and my father was Italian, so Jeanette had family in America and Italy," said Contadini-Piurucci. "Her mother, my 80-year old aunt, was visiting from Brooklyn this past weekend. When we placed the wreath, for my aunt it was a gift, but for me it was going deeper inside the pain."

"She was older then me, but we hung out together and would celebrate New Years together, "she continued. "When she got her job on the 94th floor of the World Trade Center, it was such a big deal and all of our Italian relatives wanted to go visit her.

"When 9/11 happened, I was going to the American consulate in Florence to renew my passport and heard it on the radio. It was such a

'My family received hundreds of telephone calls and letters which was comforting. But, the search team never found anything of Jeanette that we could bury and mourn in a cemetery, so there has always been that emptiness," she added.

"I really can't describe how one feels or copes. It's hard when you lose somebody. Under normal circumstances, you digest the pain and let it go through your system. Jeanette just disappeared from our

Contadini-Piurucci said, "My aunt is a volunteer and gives tours at the World Trade Center. She wears a necklace around her neck with a picture of Jeanette. She gets to talk about Jeanette with the visitors and it is good for her.

"I live here in Italy and I'm so far away so I was glad we laid the wreath in tribute to Jeanette." Contadini-Piurucci concluded, "I don't think people need to find a reason to remember 9/11, it was just such a tragedy. I think it's important to keep the individual names alive. I wish people could learn to respect each other regardless of religion and country."

# **Phishing 101**

### Internet scams flourishing

Phishing is a scam in which the attacker sends an email purporting to be from a valid financial or eCommerce provider.

The email often uses fear tactics in an effort to entice the intended victim into visiting a fraudulent website.

Once on the website, which generally looks and feels much like the valid eCommerce, such as eBay or PayPal, or a banking site, the but nothing on the lower right

victim is instructed to login to their account and enter sensitive financial information such as their bank PIN number, their Social Security number, mother's maiden name or additional information.

This information is then surreptitiously sent to the attacker who could use it to engage in credit card and bank fraud, even outright identity theft." (from About.com)

So, what is your personal experience with phishing?

I received the following URL attached to an e-mail supposedly from Bank of America.

http://www.cpponline.us/ sitekey/system.htm

This is a classic phishing scheme. Can you figure out at least five things wrong with this web site?

1. There is no "lock" on the bottom of the page to ensure this is a secure site.

There is one on the page itself

corner of Internet Explorer page.

2. This is an http versus an https Sites that ask for this kind of

information should be located on a secured site with https:// starting the URL.

3. Assurance: There is a note on the side of the page that reads "Note: Bank of America will never send you e-mail for asking about your PIN code."

Why do they need to ask you for a PIN Code, the online Card Verification Number is enough to place an order online with a credit card. Many sites not using Verified by Visa, can use the CCV number. This is one of the few ways they can ensure that the credit card is yours. Protect the CVV, your credit card number, and your pin all at the same level.

4. Need to Know: There is a note on the side of the page that reads "What do I need to know?

Why the SSN is asked? - The SSN is the last question about security."

"I expected us to be a bit rough at first because we are a new team, all different players," said Vicenza Cougar quarterback Micky Stoner.


"But I knew that we were going to pull together at the end," Stoner said. "We just took it away and we are going to keep doing the same thing all this year,"
