## Community celebrates return from deployment

The main events will take place April 30 in a new fest location, behind the Ederle Inn parking lot.

The event kicks off with a five-kilometer Fun Run at 9 a.m. on the track. The first 50 to cross the finish line will receive a T-shirt, along with water and fruit for all participants. More shirts will be given out during the day.

Selected redeployed Soldiers from Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 1st Battalion and 2nd Battalion, 173rd Airborne Brigade Combat Team and 14th Transportation Battalion will form six-man tribes and meet at 2:30 p.m. at the tribal council fire pit to compete in Vicenza's version of "Survivor" the TV show. The first challenge begins at 3:30 p.m. Losing tribes

will vote off a member. The winners of this event will receive a \$500 gift certificate from Outdoor Recreation.

Free food, rides, crafts and activities for the whole family begin at 3:30 p.m. in the main fest area. People can enter the hot dog eating contest at 5 p.m. Everyone who attends may enter drawings from event sponsors USAA and AFRC Edelweiss. As a reminder no alcohol, glass bottles, roller skates, skateboards, heelies, bicycles, mopeds or pets are allowed in the festival area.

### Local wounded Soldiers participate in long distance bike ride

Two Caserma Ederle Soldiers went to Texas in late March to participate in a 350-mile bike ride that spanned six days.

Spc. Phillip Brown and Spc. Michael Paulino, Warrior Transition Unit, joined around 230 riders for the Texas Challenge, a part of the Ride 2 Recovery series.

Riders in the event were not only active-duty Soldiers, but some were even Vietnam veterans, all with different types of medical issues, including amputees. Paulino has nerve damage to his arm, making many things difficult, including saluting. Brown suffers from a debilitating knee injury, but says the riding is making it better.

"When the doctor handed me a cane and it became my reality, it really brought me down," he said. "Participating in these rides helps to forget all the things that bother you every day."

Both Soldiers heard about the rides from visiting promotional teams. Paulino became interested in bicycling after he arrived in

"I would ride on the weekends at my own pace," he said. "I try to ride every day."

While Paulino takes the ride as "race with yourself," Brown enjoys the comaraderie of the event.

"I'm not doing this for myself. I ride for the people who didn't make it home," Brown said.

For Brown, this wasn't his first time doing a long-distance bike race. Last summer he, along with his father, rode in the Great Lakes

Challenge, a 400-mile bike race in six days. On just one day, he rode 105 miles. Paulino had planned to do the race, but couldn't because of a surgery.

"During the first race, when you were struggling to get up a hill,

## Special forms needed for fuel in Netherlands

SCHINNEN, Netherlands -Procedures for purchasing rationed fuel in the Netherlands impact personnel stationed outside the country by requiring special paperwork and authorizations before tanking-up.

Individuals not stationed in the Netherlands must be on official travel or leave orders to purchase fuel in the Netherlands, according to Army in Europe Regulation 550-35. This regulation clarifies fuel purchasing procedures for the paper/coupon-based system in the Netherlands.

"AER 550-35 provides clear procedures for personnel stationed in Germany to buy rationed fuel in the Netherlands and, most important, complies with authority granted from the Netherlands government," said Tom Budzyna, USAG Schinnen's Public Affairs Officer.

When the new automated fuel ration card arrived in Germany in 2009, personnel assigned outside Germany had to obtain AE Form 550-175L from a Military Police Station in Germany, provide their identification card, vehicle registration, and current leave/pass or temporary duty orders, in order to receive a temporary (limited) ration to purchase fuel when travelling in

A similar procedure applies for personnel assigned outside the Netherlands who wish to purchase tax-free fuel in the Netherlands.

Individuals in Germany who wish to obtain rationed fuel in the Netherlands must complete AE Form 600-17A, which serves as the authority document for their supplemental fuel ration. Once approved and signed by their commander or supervisor, the individual then presents the form to the USAG Schinnen MP Station along with an ID card; vehicle registration; and TDY orders, leave document, or military pass.



Before trying to buy fuel coupons in the Netherlands, be sure to prepare AE Form 550-35B, the form that authorizes visitors to purchase tax free fuel while on official leave, TDY or pass in the Netherlands.

The leave document should be the multi-purpose OPM Form 71 (if civilian) or a DA Form 31 (for Army). The MP will then issue AE Form 550-35B with a temporary (limited) ration authorization that can be used to purchase fuel coupons at the Schinnen Main Exchange or fill-up directly at the AAFES service station on USAG Schinnen.

"It's important to get your paperwork in order because the changes that took effect in 2009 also means that customers cannot buy Netherlands fuel coupons from AAFES operations outside the Netherlands. So if you're driving to USAG Schinnen and planning on buying fuel, you need to arrive with your documents in order," Budzyna said.

In 2008, "dual use" fuel coupons for Germany and Netherlands were withdrawn from the system and replaced with coupons specifically for the Netherlands. This change occurred as Germany began using the automated fuel ration card. The Netherlands continues to use a paper coupon system.

When personnel assigned to Germany travel to the Netherlands, access to rationed fuel is limited and controlled to ensure monthly per-vehicle ration amounts are not exceeded.

Once a vehicle has consumed its monthly ration of tax-free fuel, operators who need more fuel must fill up at local service stations and pay

Regulations governing fuel purchases are written on a by-country basis and comply with existing Status of Forces or other host nation Agreements made between the U.S. and the particular nation.

Other activities include a bean bag toss, novelty-photo opportunities, and crafts such as "Fill an egg", decorating an Easter bag and "Paint in a box".


Better Opportunities for Single Soldiers will be selling hot dogs, chips and beverages.

## Street sign in Germany dedicated to former SETAF civilian attorney

KAISERSLAUTERN, Germany – A Soldier's name lives on, not just in spirit, as the 7th Civil Support Command, honored the life of Lt. Col. Douglas Yocum, 45-year old native of Burlington County, N.J., at a street dedication ceremony held on Daenner Kaserne, April 2.

Soldiers, friends and family members gathered on the street in front of the 7th CSC headquarters to paid tribute to Yocum, who died Feb. 4, 2010 in a Philadelphia hospital following an illness.

Yocum was born into a military family and it was the family that he came to embrace. Throughout his career, he served as a military lawyer and was a third generation of military lawyers in his family. His grandfather was an Army Judge Advocate during and after World War II; and his father was an Air Force Judge Advocate.

As an Army Reserve Soldier, he served in a variety of positions with the 7th Army Reserve Command and the 154th Legal Service Office in Schwetzingen, Germany, the Southern European Task Force Augmentation Unit in Longare, Italy, and the 7th CSC in Kaiserslautern. In his civilian capacity, he served as a senior civilian attorney for the SETAF office of the Staff Judge Advocate in Vicenza.

"We have long wished to find a fitting way to recognize Doug's service and the tremendous impact he had on this unit and the United States Army," said Brig. Gen. Jimmie Jaye Wells, commanding general of the 7th Civil Support Command and presiding officer of the ceremony.

"This street that runs in front of our headquarters will be forever called Yocum Way," Wells continued as he paid tribute. "Doug will always be with us, and

we will be reminded of him and the selfless service he commander, 501st Combat Support Wing, Royal Air rendered to his country."

Yocum was diagnosed with an illness and it took a turn for the worse, the command immediately mobilized Reserve Soldiers on three continents to medically retire him and ensure his family obtained the benefits of his 19 years of service to the Army. This process normally takes months and was complete in less than 48 hours.

"From the onset of Doug's illness right up through today, there has been no obstacle Doug's Army family hasn't been able to overcome, no service they wouldn't render, no support they haven't provided," said his brother, Air Force Col. Jeffrey Yocum, vice

Force, Alconbury, England. "No matter the request, the only answer we've ever received is 'Yes', and then some team of professionals has gone about the business of getting it done as quickly as possible."

This is what our motto of "Army Strong" is all about,

"... so we dedicate 'Yocum Way' not in sadness that such a man died – but rather, to celebrate that such a man lived."

Yocum is survived by his wife, Yumiko; a daughter, Naomi; a son, Tyler, his mother, Phyllis; a sister, Jocelyn DiChiara; and two brothers, Jeffrey and Steven Yocum.

## Vicenza to host EFMP Field Day for children, volunteers needed for events

The Army Community Service Exceptional Family Member Program, with support from the Directorate of Family and Morale, Welfare and Recreation and a donation from the Vicenza Community Club, will host a special event for our registered Exceptional Family Members and similar guests from around the Vicenza Province.

EFMP Field Day will take place May 12, 10 a.m.-3 p.m. on the North 40 Track Area and will be for participants and spectators alike. Participants will join in with a volunteer Soldier Buddy and participate in any of the 17 sporting events

that interest them and match their abilities.

Similar to the Special Olympics held each year in Kaiserslautern, Germany, which has been a success in bringing the children together for levels of competition, U.S. Army Garrison Vicenza is hosting this event for the first time.

Events to choose from include running, jumping, softball and football throws, basketball, volleyball and soccer skills. Also included are arts and craft activities, Humvee and fire truck displays, a working dog demonstration from the military police and lunch. Children will compete in groups with similar age and abilities, but there will be awards for everyone.

Official registration is required before Monday. Parents of participants will be required to remain on site during the event. Other interested community members are also invited.

The schools will not participate intermediate swimming classes.

officially, however they will accept parental permission for those parents who desire their child participate in this event to be excused from classes.

Regulations require Exceptional Family Members to be registered in order to ensure that appropriate services and education can be provided before a Soldier receives orders. EFMP serves a wide range of special needs that vary greatly, from mild skin conditions to more moderate or severe issues.

Because of limited services in the overseas environment most of the registered family members are not coded as severe. The Vicenza EFMP program works with families to develop programs that accommodate each child no matter what their individual skill level. Currently, the EFMP hosts weekly athletic skill building classes and beginner and

Volunteers are needed for the day. Youth who volunteer will receive an excused absence. Volunteers are needed for food handling, sports events and other positions. Adults will be the only ones permitted to help with the sporting events. Others who are needed to help include translators and those who are registered with myarmyonesource.com. If you are interested in helping with food and do not have a handler card, a class will be held Monday, 3:15-4:15 p.m., at VES.

## Camp Darby

Darby Library renovates 60-year-old building

During National Library Week April 10-16, the Camp Darby Library staff decided to highlight just how far the library had come from its original home in 1951 in the Corallo Hotel, in Livorno, to its present day, recently-renovated building.

Librarian Michael McDaniel and his staff poured through hundreds of archived photos and repaired scrap books from the '50s, '60s and '70s to share top photos with community members.

"Long ago, the United States government recognized the importance of providing library services to its military members and communities, for educational, recreational and personal pursuits. That's why military libraries have been around for decades," said McDaniel.

According to the Camp Darby library historical document, the first Special

Services Library was part of the 7617 USFA Support Command. In April 1952, Mrs. Parenti opened a branch library on the construction site in the woods at Tombolo with 200 books in a van.

With a large demand for books, the temporary library then moved into a tent. However, by wintertime heavy rains soaked through the books and the commander, Col. Norman Vissering, was concerned when he found out that the library staff was forced to work in rain coats and rubber boots in order to stay dry.

The 2,000 books and library staff were moved indoors in the second building that was completed at Camp Darby.

By 1954, the first formal post library was built as seen in the black and white photo above. It addition to having books there was also a small music room for Soldiers.

Fast forward 60 years, and the library has more than 19,900 books, 950 movies, 2,200 music CDs, 35 magazines, Stars and

Stripes and International Herald Tribune newspapers, 15 public computers, free Wi-Fi access along with Wii, XBox 360, NintendoDS and PlayStation video games, according to McDaniel.

"Libraries have come a long way since just providing books. You can now study and take practice tests online, do ancestry research, check your mutual fund performance, learn how to do small engine repair, find historical facts for a research paper, all by using some of the databases paid for by the Army libraries," said McDaniel.

Another way the Camp Darby library is focused on blending today's high-tech world with library services is the online library web site *www.library.eur.army. mil.* The site allows one to download eBooks and audio books, order books, CDs and movies from other libraries, and even renew overdue items.

"We are here to support the community, and we do it at a price that cannot be beat!," said McDaniel.

Some parents may be too busy or just too tired after a hard day's work to come home and read a story to their children. Luckily for them, a couple of volunteers and the Camp Darby Library have teamed up and found a way to keep children and their parents happy.

Every Wednesday morning is the children's weekly story hour. The children vote on three short stories to read, and when finished, they're allowed to check out one book to bring home.

"We read about how to clean your room and about a little boy who turned into a cheeseburger," said Jen Lindstrom, volunteer storyteller. "When the children listen to the stories, they hear and also see how you open the book and what direction to read. For the five and six year old children, it's very important for them to hear the words, orally they see the words that you are reading, and they also get a fun story to listen to."

#### **Local events**

This year Easter (in Italian Pasqua) is celebrated April 24. Easter in Italy is a sacred season for Catholics, accompanied by several traditions and cultural customs. For example, on Good Friday many communities remember the day with Passion processions. Although Italians do not decorate hard-boiled eggs, many pastry shops, supermarkets and bars feature brightly wrapped Uova di Pasqua – Easter eggs. They come in many different sizes and prices, and you can choose between milk and dark chocolate. All except the tiniest eggs contain a surprise.

Among the typical Easter dishes are special stuffed or layered pasta dishes such as lasagna manicotti and pasticcio, and lamb. Special pastries are served, such as Colomba, the Dove. This symbol of peace gives form to this traditional sweet bread that is to Easter what Panettone is to Christmas. It has the same consistency, without the candied fruits, and is covered with glaze and almonds.

Pasquetta, or Easter Monday, is another important holiday in Italy. It is more than an extra day off work. It is the unofficial start of spring and a chance to picnic with friends and family.

Schools and most of the stores will be closed.

Monday is a national holiday celebrating Liberation Day in Italy. It marks the anniversary of the 1945 liberation from the Fascist party and the end of World War II in Italy.

### Via Crucis - Live Stations of the Cross:
