

U.S. Army Garrison Vicenza changes command

The leadership of U.S. Army Garrison Vicenza changed June 1 as Col. David Buckingham accepted command from Col. Erik Daiga in a ceremony on Hoekstra Field at Caserma Ederle.

Daiga led USAG Vicenza since August 2008, will head to his new assignment with the Combined Joint Interagency Task Force in Shafafiyat, Afghanistan. Incoming commander Buckingham has been serving as the G3 Director of Operations for U.S. Army Africa since February 2010.

IMCOM Europe Region Director Diane Devens presided over the ceremony, remarking that garrison leadership is a hard job but also one of the most rewarding positions, and praised Daiga for his accomplishments while serving as the USAG Vicenza commander. The ceremony was attended by IMCOM Europe leaders, post leadership, many Italian dignitaries and community members.

Devens commended Daiga and his wife, Cathy, "for their professional and personal sacrifices as they led, mentored, and inspired the staff of the garrisons and indeed the entire communities here in Vicenza and in Livorno to great accomplishments during a period of unprecedented changes to both the Army and to this installation."

She noted that Daiga oversaw challenges

386th MCT Soldier lauded for nabbing robbery suspect

A Vicenza section sergeant has been deemed a hero after detaining a suspect who had alledgedly just committed a bank robbery and holding him until the police arrived.

Staff Sgt. Eddie Peoples from the 386th Movement Control Team, 16th Sustainment Brigade, 21st Theater Sustainment Command, was visiting on leave. On the afternoon of May 31, Peoples and his two children stopped at a local bank in Sarasota. While he was there with his children, the suspect who has been charged with armed robbery and is being detained by local authorities, entered the bank, demanded money

from bank employees and left with an undetermined amount of cash.

Peoples, who watched the whole situation transpire, said he knew he could not stand by. He had to do something.

"He waved the gun at one of my children. So after he walked out of the bank, I followed him out," said Peoples, speaking with a local television station reporter in the parking lot of the bank after the entire ordeal.

After leaving his children with some family members in Sarasota, Fla., while innocent bystanders inside the bank, Peoples quickly went outside, jumped in his rental car and pulled up behind the suspect's getaway car, blocking him in. After ramming Peoples' car several times, the suspect jumped out of his car and approached Peoples, brandishing his

"I sincerely appreciate all who ventured out this morning to acknowledge the paratroopers standing in front of you and I'm truly honored by your presence," said McFarlane.

Clinic loses employee, friend to cancer

U.S. Army Health Clinic Vicenza

Brian O'Connor, 53, died May 31 at Mercy Fitzgerald Vitas Hospice Care Unit in Darby, Pa., following a battle with cancer.

O'Connor was a physicians assistant in Orthopedics at the U.S. Army Health Center Vicenza. He was very well liked and respected at the clinic, said Jo Pennhallegon, Patient Advocate at the clinic.

"Mr. O'Connor took care of every member of my family," she said. "He was not only someone I worked with, but also a friend. I will always remember him as a caring person who chose to see patients up to the last days of his short life, and who had a great sense of humor and the ability to smile even during very difficult times."

Kathleen Wiber, also of the health clinic, said O'Connor was very dedicated.

"Even though Brian was very ill, he really felt compelled to return to giving care to his patients," Wieber said. "Many of these were Soldiers that had a lot of orthopedic issues from frequent deployments. It was hard for him to leave Vicenza."

O'Connor was originally from Pottstown, Pa. He enlisted in the U.S. Air Force in 1986 and was later commissioned as an officer. After

completing his studies as an orthopedic physician assistant, he went on to serve at air force bases in Germany and Italy. He retired as a major in 2007, and continued to serve as a civilian at Vicenza.

O'Connor was especially dedicated to taking care of Soldiers wounded in the wars in Afghanistan and Iraq, according to his brother, Ray O'Connor.

He is survived by his mother and father, and six siblings. In lieu of flowers, contributions can be made in his honor to the Brian P. O'Connor Educational Trust Fund c/o 1102 Wilson St., Pottstown, PA 19464.

weapon. Peoples remained undeterred.

"I've been through five deployments. I've fought the Muqtada militia (in Iraq), everybody you can think of, so weapons getting pointed at me, it doesn't really bother me anymore," Peoples said. "I took the weapon away from him and put him on the ground and the rest was history."

Peoples held the suspect down until local authorities arrived on the scene. Deputies arrested the man, and Peoples went back inside the bank to retrieve his children.

"Every time I get deployed, I always tell my children I'm going to fight the bad men. When I walked back in the bank, my oldest boy said 'did you get the bad men?' and I said 'yep, I got the bad men' and everyone applauded," Peoples said.

Peoples' unit found out what happened shortly after when local media outlets contacted the Army so they could interview Peoples.

"We were surprised by what happened, but not really shocked," said Capt. Jedmund Greene, commander of the 386th MCT. "Defending his kids and other people – that's what he does on a daily basis. He's taken an oath to protect his country, and he saw an event taking place and reacted in the interest of protecting his children and people who he didn't even know."

"Peoples is a great NCO to work with, and he's always at the front doing what he needs to do to take care of the troops, said Staff Sgt. Chad Mitchell, 386th MCT detachment sergeant. "Just like this situation in Florida, if there is something he feels he needs to stop and take care of, if he feels that something isn't right, he's going to step in."

The Sarasota Police Department presented a commendation medal to Peoples later that day for his selfless actions in the face of danger.

509th Soldier reflects on somber visit to Holocaust camp

n a somber moment of reflection for Holocaust Remembrance, members of the 509th Signal Battalion visited the Trieste suburb of San Sabba to pay homage to those who were imprisoned and lost their lives in the "Rice Mill of San Sabba".

Organized by Sgt. 1st Class Carmen Leggett, the Equal Opportunity leader, the May 13 trip focused on a collection of buildings infamously known as the only death camp to operate in the Italian territory during World War II. Deriving its colloquial name from the original purpose of the complex, the "Rice Mill" was requisitioned as a temporary prison camp during the Nazi occupation, and rechristened as Stalag 339.

It was used as a sorting area for deportees from Germany and Poland. Later, as overcrowding of the prison camp became a concern to the Nazi leaders, a large crematorium was installed in the courtyard, which the Nazi occupiers used to exterminate the prisoners in cruel and inhuman mass murders.

When prisoners first arrived to the camp, the long

narrow entrance hallway gave an ominous sense of doom, enhanced by the large mass holding room at the end that prisoners referred to as "the death cell". There prisoners were sorted and assigned their fate, including forced labor, temporary holding, or transportation to the death camp prisons of Dachau, Auschwitz, or

They were tortured and stripped of all their possessions, and made to live in small prison cells, barely larger than the small wooden beds provided. As the war drew on, prisoners were packed in with five or six people to a cell, with no light and only one hour a day to even open the cell's window. The prisoners were given just enough food and water to keep them alive, often expiring within their cells and their bodies left with the survivors for up to a week, until the German SS would remove them to the crematorium.

Our trip shed new light on the atrocities and the soulless depravity of which human beings can be capable.

The detachment to human life that these villains must have possessed to commit such horrible war crimes is almost incomprehensible. Our hearts hung heavy as

we walked through the same walkways, corridors, and prison cells that were the setting for the last weeks of so many innocent peoples' lives. It was truly a sad time in the world's history, and a mistake that I pray we never allow to happen again on this earth.

Health Center asks community to complete, submit health care surveys

U.S. Army Health Center Vicenza

Have you ever had something worth a lot of money and just thrown it in the trash? When you last opened your mail, did you see a patient survey and throw it away? For those who did, take a second look. Those are worth a lot to our community's health care. Your comments help generate resources used to improve facilities, equipment and services.

The Army Provider Level Satisfaction Survey program is a tool that allows patients to communicate with the U.S. Army Medical Department leadership on how your health center is meeting your needs. The Vicenza Health Center is missing out on incentive revenue for every survey thrown away.

The APLSS program, administered by the Office of the U.S. Army Surgeon General, sends beneficiaries a brief questionnaire regarding their care. There are three ways to receive the questionnaire:

- a short-form survey of nine questions using a toll-free number and a voice response system;
- a two-page written survey that can be mailed free to the Office of the Surgeon General;
- and a web survey which patients log in and

The survey focuses on how the provider communicated with the patient during the visit, including if the provider listened carefully, understood the problem, showed courtesy and respect, spent enough time with the patient and helped with the problem. It also asks about access to care, courtesy of support staff, coordination of care, facility comfort and cleanliness, and services such as lab, pharmacy and X-ray.

The confidential surveys are processed to provide immediate feedback to leadership. At Vicenza, leaders review the survey data weekly share it throughout the organization, down to individual healthcare-provider level.

The information is used to recognize staff who consistently exceed patient expectations and to identify areas that needed improvement and staff who needed additional customer service training. Patient feedback was also responsible for changes to the appointing system and the hiring of additional staff.

So, the next time you get one of those APLSS surveys in the mail, don't throw it away. Please fill it out and help us improve your health center.





Fallen service members honored at cemetery

On Memorial Day, the Florence American Cemetery held a ceremony honoring those who lost their lives during World War II.

Among the military and civilian authorities participating in this year's memorial events was the U.S. Ambassador to Italy, David Thorne. He said the first place he had ever been in Italy as a young boy with his father was visiting the American Cemetery in Nettuno near Rome, where he learned the importance of honoring those Soldiers who lost their lives for the freedom of others.

"Those young Soldiers gave their lives to grant freedom to people they didn't even know," said Thorne. "With their unselfish dedication to the cause they fought and lost their lives, it's imperative for the generations to come to find some time to pay tribute to the fallen Soldiers."

Many veteran groups also took part to the occasions along with those who wished to pay their respects.

"We have attended this celebration every year for the last 40

years," said Valerio Bianchi sitting next to his wife Carla. "This is our way to demonstrate our gratitude towards these young soldiers who lost their lives for our freedom."

Carla Bianchi added that she can still recall the great feeling she had when the American troops arrived in Florence and began to distribute food and bread to everyone.

"I remember for us it was really hard at that time even to get a piece of bread. We were entitled one loaf of bread per family and most times that was really not sufficient," Bianchi said.

The Florence American Cemetery is the place of rest for 4,402 military service members, who fought after the capture of Rome in June 1944. There are also some casualties of battles in the Apennines before the enemy troops in northern Italy surrendered in 1945, according to John Luncheon, American Cemetery superintendent.

The cemetery is open daily to the public from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., except Dec. 25 and Jan. 1. There is a staff member on duty in the Visitor Building to answer questions and escort relatives to grave and memorial sites.
