U. S. Army celebrates another year of service

U.S. Army Africa's Commander Maj. Gen. David R. Hogg, and Command Sgt. Maj. Hu Rhodes, along with more than 100 Soldiers and civilians from Caserma Ederle poured into Soldier's Theatre June 14 to celebrate the U.S. Army's 236th birthday, which was established June 14, 1775, to secure the nation's independence. Since then, generations of Americans have stepped forward to defend our freedoms

Garrison Command Sgt. Maj. Jeffrey Hartless asked those in attendance to take a moment to reflect on the things that the men and women serving in the Army have fought, sacrificed and died for over the past 236 years.

"I am very grateful to live in a nation and be part of an Army that is willing to put so much on the line, to ensure that our Families and the people of our great country, can continue to live and enjoy the freedoms that we so often take for granted," Hartless said.

The ceremony involved narration that detailed the history of the Army.

From the Revolutionary War to today's current operations, Soldiers have remained committed to the Army's values: loyalty,

duty, respect, selfless service, honor, integrity and personal courage.

Soldiers have selflessly and continuously defended our rights at home, and they have protected the rights of our friends and allies in various conflicts throughout the world. In addition, the Army has contributed to society with science, exploration and medicine. On June 14, 1775 at the outbreak of the Revolutionary War, the Army was established by a resolution of the Continental Congress of the 13 colonies that would become the United States of America. The strength of our Army was

USARAF civilian receives top transportation honors

If you've forgotten more about surface transportation than most in the business will ever know, it makes sense that your supervisor would nominate you for a prestigious award, right? In Chris Zahner's case that is exactly what happened. Zahner, U.S. Army Africa's Logistics Office Chief of Surface Transportation, was recently named U.S. Army's Transportation Corps Regimental Civilian of the Year for 2011.

Todd Johnston, USARAF's chief of mobility, said he nominated Zahner because he doesn't just know about 'moving' things, he knows how it should route, who to talk to, who does it best in which port, and which office/minister/official to coordinate USARAF cargo movement through borders smoothly.

"The recognition of one of our own reflects well on the quality of personnel and work being done in all of USARAF and AFRICOM," Johnston said. "As a nascent Army Service Component Command and Combatant Command, it's imperative that we be able to tell

our story and validate the significant investment the (Department of Defense) is putting forth as we seek to engage with our African

partners -- plus it highlights the progress we've made over the last 24 months and the way ahead," he said.


Bottom line, Zahner is fully dedicated to maturing DoD transport operations in Africa as well as the knowledge and experience to do so, according to USARAF Chief of Logistics Col. Michael Balser.

"This is recognition from our DAlevel transportation community on the complexity of the African mobility environment, and an affirmation of Chris

Zahner's tangible and immediate contributions," Balser said.

In numerous deployments to Africa, discerning commercial capability and customs issues, Chris continually punches above

"As the single authoritative source for movement execution in U.S. Army Africa Command, Chris lends his expertise repetitively to U.S. Africa Command, other services, and the Combined Joint Task Force-Horn of Africa," Balser said. "He is a role-model employee for the command whose supervisory execution, high level of motivation, responsiveness to employees, and vision are without parallel," he said.

Africa is a very large continent and although USARAF's Logistics Mobility Branch is a small organization, according to Zahner, it's a great team, with one purpose and one heart.

"My co-workers in the Mobility Branch have supported all efforts continuously in the development of the Surface Transportation Section into being the lead component organization for coordinating and executing all intra-theater surface movements and distribution for all U.S. military services for the entire continent of Africa," Zahner said. "If there is a truck, railcar or barge hauling U.S. military equipment or supplies anywhere in Africa, then our Mobility Surface Section is responsible for that movement, and without the support of my co-workers, we would have never gotten down that long road to Kitgum, Uganda or Kinshasa, Democratic Republic of Congo, or Dire Dawa, Ethiopia."

Zahner said he is honored to be selected as the Transportation Corps Regimental Civilian of the Year for 2011.

"Being selected as the top civilian transporter among all these outstanding logisticians is a great honor," Zahner said. "I know most of my peers and they are all superb employees and real professionals — I consider this award to be the greatest honor of my civil service career."

The Transportation Corps Regimental Civilian of the Year is awarded each year to the top-performing Department of the Army Civilian Transporter.

There is one award given in this category worldwide by the U.S. Army Transportation Corps each year. Presentation of the award is given at Fort Lee, Va., the home of U.S. Army Logistics.

the Soldiers and their families who fought tyranny and oppression to form a union of America.

Brave militiamen fought to defend freedom and defeat injustice for a new nation to rise up from oppression. Wives and daughters tended the wounds of the injured and even manned the cannons of the new Continental Army. In their hearts, they carried a spirit of revolution – a sheer determination and the will to sacrifice for their freedoms.

USARAF staff ride retraces Italian World War I trench battles

U. S. Army Africa leaders took part in a staff ride to explore and learn about Italian involvement in World War I, May 24-26. More than 40 people from the USARAF command took part in the ride that featured a guided bus and walking tour of World War I Italian battlefields, memorials and museums.

Taking part in the three-day staff ride that followed a route in northern Italy through the mountains of western Slovenia where the 1917 battle of Caporetto was fought were USARAF Soldiers and civilians, and Italian Army soldiers.

"This staff ride was an opportunity to learn more about Italy as a host nation and take back knowledge from lessons learned from the Italian Army's World War I battles," said Maj. Gen. David R. Hogg, USARAF commander.

Lt. Col. Angel Mesa, USARAF chief of operations, explained the reasoning behind staff rides.

"Staff rides have been a part of Army culture for many years, and this was a great opportunity to learn more about, and partner with our Italian hosts," Mesa said. "It was also a great opportunity to see another historical perspective of World War I and how we can use some

of the lessons learned for ourselves as we look at conflicts now."

The tour offered an expanded perspective of World War I politics and trench warfare. USARAF Operations Sgt. Maj. Frank Lauer said the tour enhanced his viewpoint of World War I.

"When most Americans think of World War I trench warfare, it's normally fighting in France alongside the British," Lauer said. "This staff ride really showed the tremendous sacrifice the Italians made in defending their country – and it's not something we see a lot of in our history books."

Italian military history experts gave staff ride participants the benefit of their vast knowledge of each and every memorial and battlefield during the ride. Italo Cati, an Italian military historian and author, provided insights' to the vast number of casualties the Italian Army suffered defending their border from troops of the Austro-Hungarian Empire during the war.

Cati spent a day guiding participants on a walking tour of trenches on former battlefields adjacent to the huge Italian war memorial known as Sacrario Militare di Redipuglia near Gorizia, Italy, where more than 100,000 Italian soldiers are buried at the memorial.

Italian Army Maj. Manuele Savio, who works with USARAF operations,

translated Cati's descriptions of the site into English for ride participants. Italian Professor Paolo Pozzato, a military historian and former Italian Army officer, spent a day giving ride participants detailed analysis of Italy's involvement in World War I that culminated in the battle of Caporetto. On the last day of

the tour, Lt. Col Lucio Merlo, Carabinieri commander of Southern European Task Force, provided commentary on historical structures in Venzone, Italy.

Ride participants also visited battlefield sites near Gorizio and Pozzuolo del Friuli, Italy, as well as in Koberid and Bovec, Slovenia.

Suggestions to prevent crime on your POV

Due to recent rise in vehicle break-ins, the following list was created to help protect you from becoming a victim.

If you have a garage, use it. If you do not have a garage, park in a well illuminated area and if you have a gated area where you can park your vehicle in, use it. Lock the gate if possible.

Secure your vehicle and leave nothing in plain view to invite a thief. Keep the inside of your vehicle clean and clear of clutter. A cluttered vehicle leads a thief to believe you are careless enough to leave valuable items in your vehicle. Many vehicles have alarm systems that only cover the front doors and this is well known by thieves and is why they break the back wing windows to get inside

It is suggested that vehicle owners purchase a system that covers all doors instead of just the front doors.

If you have no alarm system on your vehicle, even a fake system with a small red flashing light that can be attached to the front windshield, can be effective in scaring away thieves.

Reducing environmental impact now easier

As part of Camp Darby's good stewards of the environment initiatives, the Directorate of Public Works has started providing building occupants on the installation with paper recycling collection boxes and will soon be distributing mixed (metal, glass, plastic) recycling collection containers. The new recycling collection system is designed to make it easier for the garrison to recycle and reduce the amount of trash.

Building cleaning contractors will remove the collected recyclables as long as the building occupants properly separate the materials. The key is to make sure the paper box contains only paper or cardboard and the mixed recyclables box contains only glass, plastic or metal items. If the containers are not properly separated, the material will be disposed of as regular trash. The cleaning personnel will transfer the recyclables into the larger bulk containers outside of the buildings.

It is important for everyone to do their part to minimize waste. DPW officials said recycling containers are located throughout the garrison. Paper goes in the yellow dumpsters; glass, plastic and metal in the blue domes; and regular trash in the silver dumpsters.


Italian American Carnival: The annual Italian-American Carnival on Camp Darby is
