Before the move Moving can be a very stressful time. Children often have many worries and concerns about the new place. Step into Your Child's World with these ways to



Reassure your children

help your children during the move.

- Let them know it is okay to share any feelings they have about the move.
- Show them how the new location is like their old home, school, and neighborhood.
- Remind them that the friends they leave behind will still be their friends, even though they are far away.
- Remember that the way you feel can change how children feel about the move.

Take time to talk—and listen!

- Children need to be told what is happening.
- Be ready when children want to talk.
- Show your children you care about their feelings.
- Let them know you understand their feelings. ("You're going to miss your friends. I can understand that. I am going to miss my friends, too.")

Encourage your children

- Help them share their feelings.
- Give them time to sort out feelings about the move.
- Share with your children by reading books about moving.
- Host a moving party for your children with their neighbors and friends.
- Help your children to stay in touch with friends.
- Help your children find their new home on a map.
- Help your children say farewell to friends.
