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## **DoDEA 2006 Graduates: Postsecondary Plans and Scholarships**

At the end of every school year, each high school in the Department of Defense Education Activity (DoDEA) is required to document the postsecondary plans and scholarships of twelfth grade students. This report provides a summary of these data, including the postsecondary plans of students and the monies offered and accepted by these students for scholarships, grants, and financial aid. Data in this report are presented for DoDEA overall, as well as disaggregated by each of the three areas: Domestic Dependents Elementary and Secondary Schools (DDESS), including Cuba; Europe; and the Pacific, including Guam.

It should be noted that in SY05-06, changes were made to the procedures and system DoDEA uses to collect student data. These new data collection procedures resulted in missing and invalid data and non-standard data entry. Therefore, caution should be used when interpreting and comparing these results among Areas and against previous years.

Of the 3,191 seniors in DoDEA schools in SY05-06, approximately 99% (N=3,156) were reported as graduated. This is approximately 4% higher than reported in SY04-05; however, this difference may be due to differences in the data collection procedures rather than true differences in the graduation rates between the two years.

#### **Postsecondary Plans**

The second semester of their senior year, every DoDEA senior is required to complete a written postsecondary plan indicating their intentions the year after graduation. Of those seniors with valid postsecondary plans (N= 2,875), the majority were planning to continue their education at a 4-year (66%) or junior/community (13%) college or university (Table 1). These numbers are comparable to the postsecondary plans of DoDEA seniors in previous years, with an increase of eight percent in number of students reporting they plan to attend a 4-year college or university (Table 1).

Small differences were noted in the postsecondary plans of seniors by Area. The highest percentage of DoDEA graduates who planned to attend a 4-year college/university was found in

the Pacific (69%), while the highest percentage of DoDEA graduates who planned to enlist in the military (10%) was found in DDESS (Table 2).



#### **Scholarships and Financial Aid**

Prior to SY05-06 schools collected data only on the scholarship monies students were awarded. In SY05-06 schools began collecting data on the scholarship monies students were offered and the scholarship monies accepted. No direct comparison should be made between the monies awarded and accepted due to differences in data collection procedures.

The DoDEA graduating seniors of 2006 were offered over 38 million dollars in scholarships, financial aid, and grants (Figure 1). The majority of the monies offered were through state or institution scholarships (30%), ROTC (28%), and military academies (26%).




Figure 2. DoDEA Scholarship Monies Accepted (Total = \$27,906,591)\*

Of the 38 million dollars in scholarship, financial aid, and grant monies offered, DoDEA seniors accepted approximately 28 million dollars (Figure 2). The distribution of monies accepted closely parallels that of those monies offered, with the majority through state or institution scholarships (28%), ROTC (26%), and military academies (25%).

Monies offered and accepted varied by Area (Table 3). While the largest source of money for DDESS and Europe graduates was state or institution scholarships, the largest source of monies for graduates in the Pacific was ROTC.
