took the thousands of auto photos that were shown. (I did the same on the other 2 sites). I made a small amount of money on optional donations, and would not accept advertisers, even though they offered me pretty good money.

People who do creative things, do it for the love of creating. Anyone who steals the soul of another person by calling their art and creations their own, should be held accountable for damages caused by that theft of intellectual property.
