I am a songwriter and producer working out of LA. I had hoped to make a full time career of my trade but my first CD came out in 1999 just when Napster was at it's peak. I saw, first hand, the damage that file sharing can do to someone's career. I was contacted by many fans who told me how much they enjoyed my music with some even admitting that they got the music through Napster. I can understand that our culture is based on money and if someone can get something for free, they will. To this end I believe that it's important to impress upon people that while there are a few artists who make tons of money, there are thousands of us who can't even make a living if people are sharing our music. I will often tell people that in 1968 an album cost \$10 and today an album on iTunes costs \$10. Taking into consideration the rate of inflation that album today should cost \$100!!

I trust that you will try and educate the public on our blight and put some teeth into the laws that we have.
