

# VCNO Ferguson's first visit to Bahrain

**NAVAL SUPPORT ACTIVITY, Bahrain** — The vice chief of naval operations (VCNO) conducted an all-hands call with Sailors and Marines stationed at Naval Support Activity (NSA) Bahrain, Nov. 23.

This marked the first time Adm. Mark E. Ferguson III visited service members stationed in the U.S. 5th Fleet area of responsibility (AOR) since becoming VCNO in August.

Ferguson, along with Total Force Fleet Master Chief Scott Benning, discussed the future of the force, what is expected of Sailors today, and the importance of theater operations to the Navy and nation. The two answered questions on a range of topics to include budget cuts, the enlisted retention board, and benefits.

"The Navy may be a smaller force, but our missions have never been more relevant than right now. I am here with my wife because what we care about most is taking care of you and your families, ensuring that you have the right tools, training and support structure to do your job. We really have enjoyed spending the Thanksgiving holiday with our Navy family."

Additionally, four Sailors were given the unique opportunity to be re-enlisted by the VCNO.

"I'm re-enlisting for six more years and I feel honored that the Navy's second-highest ranking officer is taking time out of his busy schedule to re-enlist me today," said Yeoman 1st Class Derrick Cunningham.

## USAGSO conducts overnight camp out at NSA

**NAVAL SUPPORT ACTIVITY, Bahrain** — More than 115 girls and volunteers from USA Girl Scouts Overseas (USAGSO) Bahrain participated in a treasure hunt and neighborhood camp out at Naval Support Activity (NSA) Bahrain, Nov. 18.

Comprised of girls from six troops representing grades K-12, the two-day event taught important skills such as fire-building, how to set up a tent, knife-handling, compass use and navigation with Global Positioning Systems.

USAGSO Bahrain Overseas Committee

Chair Becky Goodridge said the camp out allowed the troops an opportunity to work with other girls from various age groups to develop mentoring and teamwork skills.

"A big part of Girl Scouting is not only working within the individual troops, but to work alongside older and younger girls," she said. "As the girls move from one age group to the next, having the experience of working with different age groups facilitates an easier transition."

Goodridge added that conducting such an event would be impossible without strong volunteer support.

Bahrain, began volunteering for the USAGSO shortly after her arrival to NSA approximately six months ago. During that time, she has become a Brownie troop leader and is a key figure in coordinating support from NSF Bahrain.

"We have 20 volunteers from the NSF community that came to offer their support," Wiley said. "Each volunteer worked for approximately five hours to help set up tents, fetch water, turn jump ropes, whatever the girls needed."

Wiley said she got involved because of her love for children, but most of the NSF volunteers gave their support because it offered them a unique opportunity to con-

nect with their children back home.

"A lot of the volunteers have kids back in the States who are also in Girl Scouts and it really warms my heart that they would go out of their way to support their community here," she said.

In addition to volunteer support from service members, Goodridge said that parental contributions have also been outstanding.

"Many of our parents have gone the extra mile to undergo the requirements necessary to become troop leaders," she said. "It's a relief actually because in general it's hard to get volunteers, but that's not an issue here."

**P - PURPOSELESSNESS** - Seeing no reason for living or having no sense of meaning or purpose of life.

**A - ANXIETY** - Feeling anxious, agitated, frequent nightmares, or unable to sleep (or sleeping all the time).

**T - TRAPPED** - Feeling trapped, like there is no way out.

**H - HOPELESSNESS** - Feeling hopeless about self, others, the future.

**W - WITHDRAWAL** - Withdrawing from family, friends, usual activities, society.

**A - ANGER** - Feeling rage or uncontrolled anger, seeking revenge for perceived wrongs.

**R - RECKLESSNESS** - Acting without regard for consequences, excessively risky behavior.

**M - MOOD CHANGES** - Experiencing dramatic changes in mood. Unstable mood.

Based in the United Kingdom, Hamilton has performed at various locations in the region including venues in Qatar and the United Arab Emirates. The performance marked the first occasion the thespian has entertained the military community.

With more than a decade of acting experience, Hamilton performed a play he created titled "The Fisherman's Friend," which details Bible stories about Jesus as told through the eyes of the apostle Peter.

Hamilton, who specializes in working with and performing for children, said that his passion for exploring story through theater offers a unique medium.

"As an actor, I am really passionate about bringing the Bible to life and to help people understand it in a new way," he said. "Using the gifts of acting and story telling, I can passionately share my faith, particularly with children, to help them

experience the Bible and feel like they are a part of the stories instead of simply hearing about them."

Navy Chaplain Lt. Kenneth Dowdey said that hosting Hamilton facilitated the creation of an environment devoted to entertaining whole families, but with a particular focus on church youth.

"We wanted to be able to have ministries specifically for children while creating an atmosphere that encourages bringing families together and spending some quality family time together," Dowdey said.

Among those in attendance, Reiko Allred said she appreciated the lengths Hamilton went to reenact the Bible stories that she shares with her children to make it a more personal experience for them. She said the audio and visual aids Hamilton used in his performance really brought the lessons from the Bible to life.

"I have a 2 year-old daughter and I sometimes wonder if she comprehends what we're reading to her," Allred said. "But to have it recreated for her to absorb visually, I think she's able to retain it more at that age. Additionally, it assists us in teaching those stories to her so that she can keep those lessons with her."

"As somebody who's been deployed before, it's always nice to get something because the mail is slow and it's far and few between," he said. "It's a lot better than email when you can actually get a package. It makes you feel good."

"CNIC tries to give something back to the Sailors that are away from home during the holidays," he said.

Liberty is an immeasurable morale boosting privilege that should be valued and protected. Alcohol related incidents are inconsistent with our duty to be mission ready and our roles as ambassadors of the United States and U.S. Navy in host countries throughout the region.
