MINA SALMAN PIER, Bahrain — Members of Boy Scouts of America Troop 826 and Cub Scouts of America Pack 826 visited coastal patrol ship USS Whirlwind (PC 11) and U.S. Coast Guard Cutter (USCGC) Aquidneck (WPB 1309), Jan. 7.

Despite their name, the Scouts based in Bahrain, are international groups representing the United States, Bahrain, Britain, Australia, New Zealand, the Netherlands, France, Germany, and Russia.

The forty boys, ranging in age from six to 17, were given guided tours of the ships' mess decks, berthings, engine rooms and pilothouses.

"The boys are thrilled," said Mark Coalmer, Troop 826 Scoutmaster. "You can see they are all very excited to have the opportunity to come out and take a look at the ships today."

The visit brought back memories for Whirlwind's Executive Officer, Lt. Mat Rechkemmer.

"I remember being in the Boy Scouts," said Rechkemmer. "I am an Eagle Scout, so it was really fun to get to show kids around who are where I was only 15 years ago, and to show them what we get to do."

The boys were inquisitive, especially about the ships' guns.

"The parts of the ship that got the most questions were the weapons," said Coast Guardsman Lt. j.g. George Shepherd, Aquidneck's executive officer. "They were asking questions about the different types of armament we have on board. They had a great time, and I had fun taking them around and answering their questions."

Whirlwind and Aquidneck are assigned to Commander, Task Force (CTF) 55, supporting maritime security operations and theater security cooperation efforts in the U.S. 5th Fleet area of responsibility.

Capt. Richard J. Knittig relieved Capt. Rachel D. Haltner as NBHC Bahrain officer in charge.

Haltner assumed charge of NBHC Bahrain in Mar. 2010. During her tenure, she oversaw the provision of primary care delivery to more than 3,800 beneficiaries ashore and medical support to more than 12,000 fleet Sailors, Marines and other DoD personnel operating in the Central Command theater.

Guest speaker, Commander, Navy Medicine National Capital Area, Commander, Walter Reed National Military Medical Center at Bethesda, Rear Adm. Alton L. Stocks, presented Haltner with a Meritorious Service Medal for her service at NBHC Bahrain.

Haltner thanked personnel assigned to NBHC as well as individuals who support the clinic in its mission to deliver health care to NSA Bahrain and its 89 tenant commands.

"I would like to thank each of you that

work at the clinic and those that support the clinic for your unwavering hard work, dedication and support," Haltner said. "To our medical colleagues at the U.S. Embassy, U.S. Naval Forces Central Command and the operational commands; together we accomplished an enormous amount of change and improvement. We brilliantly anticipated, prepared for and responded to the medical needs of those assigned in and deployed to the Kingdom of Bahrain and U.S. Fifth Fleet Area of Responsibility."

Haltner's next assignment will be aboard USNS Comfort (T-AH-20) where she will be the ship's Executive Officer.

Knittig said he is grateful and humbled to have been selected to lead NBHC Bahrain. He emphasized NBHC's continued focus on delivering outstanding health care to those NBHC supports.

"You can count on our commitment to continue exceptional medical support and force health protection," Knittig said. "We will be conscious of the need to be effective and efficient, leveraged by a strong sense of mission and compassionate care."

NBHC Bahrain is the most forward deployed clinic attached to U.S. Naval Hospital Sigonella, Italy, which provides care to NSA Bahrain and U.S. Naval Forces Central Command, Commander Fifth Fleet community.

with new structures. U.S. Naval Forces Central Command and Naval Computer Telecommunications Station, Bahrain moved into their new building in January 2004. The Freedom Souq opened its doors in June 2006. The 188,000 square foot facility consolidated the operations of more than 20 buildings on NSA Bahrain into one force-protected building.

In May 2010, the government of Bahrain and the U.S. Navy hosted a groundbreaking ceremony at Mina Salman Port, marking the beginning of a \$580 million military construc-

Hosted by Navy Entertainment, Karges's visit was one stop in a three-week world tour at venues in multiple locations throughout Asia, Italy, Bahrain and the U.S.

tion project. Scheduled to be completed in 2015, the project will develop 70 acres on the waterfront to support U.S. and coalition ships and personnel as well as a flyover bridge that will link the site to NSA Bahrain.

September 2010 marked the completion of the sports complex. Covered with artificial turf, the ball field saves millions of gallons of water and countless dollars in grounds keeping salaries

The buildings and structures haven't been the only changes and improvements on base. The NSA Environmental Department and base volunteers have worked on numerous occasions to make the base aesthetically pleasing as well as Earth-friendly with tree plantings and base cleanups in honor of Earth Day. NSA's Environmental team has been recognized for its efforts with more than 15 awards from the CNO, Secretary of the Navy and Secretary of Defense from 2003-2010.

In addition to being good stewards of the environment in Bahrain, NSA focuses on families. One of the major events concerning families was the departure of more than 900 Department of Defense dependents in July 2004. Dependents were ordered to leave due to

tensions in the region. Adult family members were allowed to return in Nov. 2008 and all family members were authorized in June 2009. With the return of all family members, the Child and Youth Programs opened a new Child Development Center, School Age Care program and Teen Center in Jan. 2010.

There have been many changes in leadership on the installation. In January 2009, Commander, Navy Region Europe (CNRE), Naples, Italy, assumed operational and administrative control of Navy Region Southwest Asia (CNRSWA), formerly headquartered on board NSA Bahrain as well as remote bases and installations within its area of responsibility. With responsibilities for support to USAFRICOM, established October 2008 and the disestablishment of CNRSWA, CNRE has been renamed Commander, Navy Region Europe, Africa, Southwest Asia. The realignment eliminated NSA Bahrain's regional support role, allowing the command to focus on its support to the facility and the then 80 tenant commands assigned.

TMU also carefully monitors and disseminates local protest information in an effort to keep U.S. service members out of harm's way during local protest activity. We rely on your reports to ensure the safety of our base, our personnel and our families. Contact TMU 24 hours a day, 7 days a

week at 3940-4271.
