- (2) TEXTILE IMPORTS.—Any action which the head of the relevant agency and the Administrator of the Office of Information and Regulatory Affairs certify in writing is a substantive rule, Interpretive rule, statement of agency policy, or notice of proposed rulemaking to interpret, implement, or administer laws pertaining to the import of textiles and apparel including section 334 of the Uruguay Round Agreements Act (P.L. 103–465), relating to textile rules of origin.
- (3) CUSTOMS MODERNIZATION.—Any action which the head of the relevant agency and the Administrator or the Office of Information and Regulatory Affairs certify in writing is a substantive rule, interpretive rule, statement of agency policy, or notice of proposed rulemaking to interpret, implement, or administrater laws pertaining to the customs modernization provisions contained in title VI of the North American Free Trade Agreement Implementation Act (P.L. 103–182).
- (4) ACTIONS WITH RESPECT TO CHINA REGARD-ING INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY PROTECTION AND MARKET ACCESS.—A regulatory rulemaking action providing notice of a determination that the People's Republic of China's failure to enforce Intellectual property rights and to provide market access is unreasonable and constitutes a burden or restriction on United States commerce, and a determination that trade action is appropriate and that sanctions are appropriate, taken under section 304(a)(1)(A)(ii), section 304(a)(1)(B), and section 301(b) of the Trade Act of 1974 and with respect to which a notice of determination was published on February 7, 1995 (60 Fed.
